Texas Safety Assn. **Names Three Major Traffic Threats**

Three major threats to traffic safety at this time of yeare were described today by J. O. Musick,

"One threat is reduced visibility," he declared. "It's obvious month are the shortest of all the year. Add to this the everpresent possibility of bad weather, the poor condition of some vehicles' lighting systems, and the dark clothing worn by many pedestrians, and you can see that a driver really can't afford to relax vigilance one moment."

The safety official said another threat is posed by inadequate

"The fellow on foot is far more likely to slap and fall these days than in summer, and the fellow behind the wheel must be constantly alert against skidding hazards," Musick observed.

"The third threat is that presented by quick change in temperature," he added. "Icy or rain soaked highways greatly increase traffic hazards. The defensive driver takes these conditions into account and reduces his speed, lengthens distance between moving cars, starts signalling turns sooner, and makes his stops more


