About Your Social Security

Ranchers are reminded that the cash wages of most ranch employees must be reported for social security purposes by January 31, 1959, according to Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo social security office.

These wages must be reported if the ranch worker was employed by the employer for twenty days or more in 1958 and was paid on a time basis—this is, by the hour, day, week, etc., or, if the employee was paid \$150 in cash by the employer in 1958, regardless of the days of work. Ellington stated further that the social security tax for 1958 is 4½ percent of the wages, 2¼ percent to be deducted from the

employee's wages, and 2¼ percent to be paid by the employer. This applies to earnings up to \$4,200 in the year. The tax must be paid to the Director of Internal Revenue. Taxes on wages paid in 1959 will be slightly higher: the employer will deduct 2½ percent from the employee's wages and pay a similar amount himself. After 1958, earnings up to \$4,800 in a year are taxable for social security purposes.

Devil's River Philosopher Amazed To Find The Government Winding Up Year In Same Shape He's In

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River is reviewing his and the government's financial conditions as the year draws to an end, his letter this week reveals.

Dear Editor:

As the year winds to an end, I am amazed but still finding a great deal of comfort in learning that me and the Federal government handled our finances in about the same way the last 12 months.

At the start of this year, Washington announced that the national budget could be balanced this year, due to the fact 1958 was going to be unusually good and in addition to getting more income tax money, expenses could be cut too.

Well, I started the year in about the same frame of mind. Like the Federal government, I knew I was living beyond my means, but I figured my income would pick up and my expenses would drop off, and I'd wind up in good shape.

Unfortunately, me and the government miscalculated.

According to an article I read last night, the government went in the hole by about 12 billion dollars this year, and it was easy to explain. The short recession knocked 7 billion dollars off of anticipated income tax revenues, and expenses went up 5 billion instead of coming down.

I'm winding up the year in about the same shape, although you can knock off a good many zeroes from Washington's figures to get a picture of mine.

Now the trouble with this is that I would have figured Washington would have known better. It's all right for me to operate on an optimistic future, it's the only way to keep going out here on this ranch, but you'd think Washington would take a little more realistic view of things. I've known for years that there rarely is a crop worth as much at selling time as I figured it would be at breeding time, but that's the basic principle we ranchers use to maintain a surplus year after year, but my advice to the government is that they'd better let us ranchers use this principle and the government figure out a different one. Any time the government tries to balance its budget ahead of time on the strength of what I might earn in the next 12 months, well, all I've got to say is that the government's not taking any practical view of the matter. I hope the government does better next year. Personally, I intend to do about the same as this year.

Sutton County Allocation For '59 Program Year

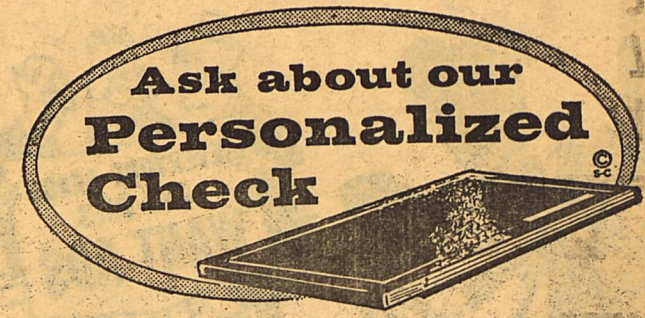

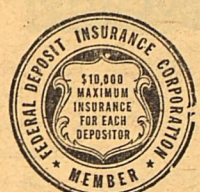
