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This Year Is **An Ideal One** For Wildlife

This is a big year for animals of all species, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration, Game and Fish Commission. Good rains and excellent vegetative growth following the dry years are responsible.

"There has been plenty of food and cover for nearly all of our wildlife," said the director. The cycle that followed has brought on an increase in population of all animals, small and large.

The small species such as the birds, rabbits, rats and mice, found enough food and cover present to take care of larger families. So, they had larger families. This increase in small animal populations encouraged an increase in the larger animal populations such as the mountain lions, wolves, coyotes, and

One indication that animals naturally produce larger litters when conditions are good, is the recent discovery of a bobcat with


five unborn kittens. Just three days after this find, the same trapper killed another cat. This one would have given birth to seven bobkittens, had it been spared. The average litter for

Cage Brothers has 235 calendar days to complete Sites 9 and 10, but completion will be expected considerably sooner, if weather is favorable. The dam at Site 9 will also be started within a few weeks.

Several days will be required to clear the dam site and sediment pool of brush. The area to be occupied by the dam will be cleared of roots and a core trench excavated to rock. Actual work of hauling and compacting the earth fill will then be started.
