Sutton County Rainfall Over 4 Day Period Varied From 2 Inches To 11 Inches

A stationary low pressure area which hovered over the Sonora area during the weekend dumped heavy rains, but moved eastward Tuesday to relieve a serious flood threat.

Rainfall for the four day period which began Saturday varied from some two inches on the Harold Friess ranch to over 11 inches on the W. F. Berger ranch. Most of the rain fell in intermittent showers with not enough falling at any one time to cause heavy runoff.

The eye of the storm apparently centered just west of Sonora. with G. H. Davis, E. M. deBerry, B. M. Halbert, Auther Simmons, L. P. Bloodworth, John Ward, and Ed Shurley all receiving 7 inches or more. The area near the center received up to 11 but fortunately the moisture fell in several hard rains rather than one flood producing deluge.



STUDENT FEE BILL OKAY-ED-A bill to require state college students to pay an activity fee passed both houses by very narrow margin.

Measure would allow the colleges to charge students up to \$30 a semester to support health services, book rentals, cultural

lications, parking, etc. Any college may exempt from

the fee up to 10 per cent of its enrollment in cases where the charge would cause "undue financial hardship."

Bill was hard-found. Opponents declared it would make "free public education" available only to the rich. Backers said the colleges had to have more money. It was estimated the bill could bring in as much as an extra \$1,000,000 a year.

BEACH BILL PASSES-Both houses passed and sent to the governor a bill guaranteeing public access to state-owned beaches.

It took a conference committee to work out the differences between House and Senate ideas on

As finally passed, the bill says the public shall have the right to come and go from public beaches. No one, it says, shall vent this.

Beaches that cannot be reached by public road or ferry are exempt.





Besides, by the time I get through paying for my equipment, my gas and oil and tires and repairs and clothes and taxes, I don't have anything left for a public relations expert.

Sept. 20 Deadline For Applying For **Gas Tax Refunds**

During the period July 1 to September 20, 1959 farm or ranch owners, tenants or operators may file a claim for a refund of three cents a gallon federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes.

This refund covers purchases of gasoline between the period from June 30, 1958 to July 1, 1959. Also included may be gasoline used on his farm or ranch by other persons cultivating the soil or raising or harvesting any agricultural comodity.

County agents, deputy collectors, and the U.S. District Director of Internal Revenue can furnish the required form 2240 and instructions for preparing the form.
