AN EDITORIAL

KEEP YOUR COTTON PICKIN, HANDS OFF!!!

During the past several weeks The Devil's River News office has been bombarded with letters and news releases sent out by the Texas Farm Bureau in its intensive brain-washing campaign pertinent to the forthcoming wool act referendum. The Bureau's aim is to defeat the referendum and with it the sheepmen's last hope of creating a strong demand for his products and thus rebuilding a dying industry.

The themesong of the Farm Bureau campaign is that the referendum tends to be socialistic in its "check-off" clause. Their methods of presenting their views through the use of half-truths, distorted facts and withheld information is to us as indigestible as Mr. Khrushchev's brand of propaganda.

, Let's contrast the American (and Texas) Farm Bureau Federation's "Facts" with straightforward and accurate information:

1. AFBF "FACT"-"The compulsory wool 'check-off' violates the individual sheep grower's freedom to spend his own money as he son scrimmage with Winters and desires. . It violates the basic principle of individual freedom of Lakeview high schools at San choice.'

1. THE TRUTH-The principle employed in the 1955 Wool Referendum is the very same principle used in the 1958 corn referendum concerning acreage allotments. Even though a smaller percentage of producers voted in the corn referendum than in the wool referendum the AFBF called the outcome "the will of the farmer." This same principle, based on a vote of the majority, is precisely the same principle as that upon which our democratic form of government is based. Wheat referendums, potato marketing agreements, school bond elections and many other phases of our modern society operate from this same principle.

2. AFBF "FACT"-"Although more than \$12 million has been deducted to pay for wool and lamb promotion since 1955 there have been no apparent tangible benefits to producers. Wool consumption and prices have gone down, the use of competitive synthetic fibers has increased, lamb consumption has gone down more than beef consumption and beef prices have gone up more than lamb prices."

THE TRUTH-This is misleading. The AFBF's figures are based on an overestimate of some half million dollars and their \$12 million includes an estimated \$4 million which is to be spent during the coming year. 3. AFBF "FACT"-"The outcome of the referendum does not affect the National Wool Act under which wool growers receive compensatory payments from the government".

heavily. If a horse turns the wrong way with tail toward the animal, he will be disquilified for that go-round with no score. A horse will be penalized one point each time he is reined or cued in any manner. For riding with a tight rein through a performance, a penalty will be given; for part of the time during the performance, less penalty. If a horse lets an animal that he is working get back into the herd, he will be penalized five points. When a horse heads any animal and goes past it to the point that he loses his working advantage, he will be penalized each time he does so. If a contestant quits an animal he is working when the horse is out of position, or the animal has an undue advantage of the horse, he will be penalized three points.
