To our knowledge, it is the first such instance involving deaths of young children in such a manner. You hear of this happening in a large city occasionally, but we had never had to report such a thing in Parmer County during our career in the newspaper business.

Such an event as this should set everyone to looking around his or her place to make sure that such a potential death trap does not lurk around their residence, and be a threat to their own or someone else's children.

We go to extremes to provide healthy conditions for our youngsters, including the medicines they need, proper food, etc. Sometimes, however, we overlook the very things that can be the most dangerous, and it takes a tragic event such as this one to call them to our attention.




5 YEARS AGO -- SEPT. 22, 1966

The Eagles have been given a slight edge in Friday's game, but by all indications, the scrappy Mustang team could cause it to go their way. Probable starters are:


