



Census Takers To Count Inmates Of County Jail

Census enumerators in Sutton County will visit the county jail Friday, April 8 in a special drive to count persons who do not have a fixed address, District Supervisor Wililiam G. Stacy said Wednesday. Persons who do not have a fixed address are included in the population of the place in which they are located by the census takers.

The district supervisor pointed out that under Census law, all persons 18 years old and over are required to answer official Census questions. The same law specifies that personal information collected by Census takers must be kept confidential. The person who willfully refuses to answer the official Census questions is subject to a maximum fine of \$100 or 60 days in jail, or both.
