## **Lyles And Davis Low Bidders On Flood Control Site 3**

Bids for the last flood preven- | rock. tion structure planned on Dry Devil's River and Lowrey Draw were opened Monday by Judge

Lyles and Davis were the apparent low bidders, with a bid of \$153,993.54. The Soil Conservation Service engineers' estimate was \$170,150.54. Bids ranged upward from the low bid to \$219,781.70. Seven bids were sub-

Lyles and Davis, Childress, Texas, are currently building Sites 5 and 6 on the ranch owned by Mrs. Pearl Martin. These structures are scheduled to be completed within the next 30 to

Site 3 is located across the main channel of Dry Devil's River, and is below Sites 1 and 2. The structure will be 40 feet high, and contain 217,000 yards of embankment. A complete rock blanket on both sides of the dam will use 44,000 cubic yards of gency spillway levels.

The sediment pool, or area that can hold permanent water, will cover 51 acres, and hold 200 acre feet of water.

The contractor will have 300 days to complete the structure, after the contract is awarded. With good weather, however, the dam will probably be constructed in considerably less time.

Six structures on Dry Devil's River Draw have been completed, two more will be completed next week, and work is in progress on four more structures. At the present time flood prevention structures would detain approximately 22,064 acre feet of floodwater. When all structures are completed some 37,778 acre feet of water will be detained at emer-

If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and Habilities of the County in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County.






