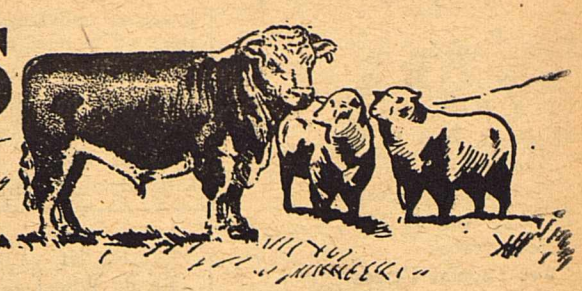

Monday Is Shipping Day For Stock Donated To Boys' Ranch Of West Texas

Ranchers in Sutton County who are contributing livestock to the Boys' Ranch of West Texas as fall stock drive, are reminded that Monday, August 15, is the date on which the stock will be delivered to the auction yards in San Angelo.

Vestel Askew, "Wagon Boss" for Sonora and Sutton County, urges ranchers to donate any kind or class of livestock. "Your contribution may be only one or two animals which you are not very proud of," Askew said, "or it may be sheep or cattle which will bring top market prices."

All proceeds from this First Annual Roundup sale will go to Boys' Ranch for the Ranch's operation. The animals are to be sold and not retained for the ranch.

Ranchmen are asked to bring their stock to the Sonora Stockpens on Monday. Stock will be congregated there and then hauled to San Angelo.

"Any kind or quality of stock will be gratefully and happily accepted," Askew concluded, "and all such donations will greatly aid in helping make a man out of an unfortunate boy."

Lyles And Davis Low Bidders On Flood Control Site 3

Bids for the last flood prevention structure planned on Dry Devil's River and Lowrey Draw were opened Monday by Judge J. W. Elliott. The structure, Site 3, is on Dry Devil's River located on the Ben Mittel ranch.

Lyles and Davis were the apparent low bidders, with a bid of \$153,998.54. The Soil Conservation Service engineers' estimate was \$170,150.54. Bids ranged upward from the low bid to \$249,781.70. Seven bids were submitted.

Lyles and Davis, Childress, Texas, are currently building Sites 5 and 6 on the ranch owned by Mrs. Pearl Martin. These structures are scheduled to be completed within the next 30 to 45 days.

Site 3 is located across the main channel of Dry Devil's River, and is below Sites 1 and 2. The structure will be 40 feet high, and contain 217,000 yards of embankment. A complete rock blanket on both sides of the dam will use 44,000 cubic yards of

rock.

The completed structure will detain 5,307 acre feet of floodwater at emergency spillway level. A rock bottomed emergency spillway, 400 feet wide, will be constructed. The emergency spillway is expected to function only once in a 170 year period.

The sediment pool, or area that can hold permanent water, will cover 51 acres, and hold 200 acre feet of water.

The contractor will have 300 days to complete the structure, after the contract is awarded.

With good weather, however, the dam will probably be constructed in considerably less time.

Six structures on Dry Devil's River Draw have been completed, two more will be completed next week, and work is in progress on four more structures. At the present time flood prevention structures would detain approximately 22,064 acre feet of floodwater. When all structures are completed some 37,778 acre feet of water will be detained at emergency spillway levels.

Entries are being received daily at the Chamber of Commerce office from eligible participants for the first annual Sonora Junior Rodeo scheduled for Friday and Saturday, August 19 and 20. Events are planned for boys and girls classes in three age divisions.

A parade through the downtown area and up Highway 290

is planned for four o'clock in the afternoon of the opening day. Riding in the parade will be participants and candidates for Queen of the event.

The parade will form at the Courthouse and will follow a route down Main Street, turning left on Concho. From that point it will continue down Concho turning onto 290 at the intersection with the Del Rio highway. It will travel up 290, turning back onto Main at the Crockett St. intersection and will continue up Main to the point of origin.

Girls aged 14 through 19 will compete in a contest to name a Queen of the Rodeo. Girls interested in being a Queen candidate may file their names with Mrs. Jim Hugh Richardson. They will be required to furnish ballot boxes and place them in advantageous places about town. Votes will be sold at five cents each, with proceeds to be used by the sponsoring Sonora Park and Horse Show Association for improvements of facilities.

Candidates will be required to ride in the opening day parade and to ride in the grand entry which will proceed each day's performance.

In rodeo events, boys aged 16 to 19 will compete in tie-down calf roping, ribbon roping and steer riding as will boys aged 13 to 16. For boys 12 years of age and under there will be barrel racing, pole bending, goat sacking and steer riding.

Girls in the same three age groups will participate in barrel racing and pole bending.

City Commission Lowers Tax Rates To \$1.20 Per \$100 Evaluation

The Sonora City Commission Monday voted to reduce the city tax rate from its \$1.40 per \$100 evaluation to \$1.20 per \$100 evaluation. The first tax rate reduction in five years was made at the regular monthly Commission meeting and annual budget hearing at City Hall Monday morning.

The last such cut in taxes was made in August 1955 at which the rate was reduced from its former \$1.50 per \$100 to the \$1.40 rate. The \$1.50 rate had been effect some six or seven years prior to its reduction in 1955.

The budget for the coming fiscal year was approved as presented and will find the tax income apportioned at \$1.05 for maintenance and support of the general government. The remaining 15 cents will go into the interest and sinking funds.

Other business transacted at the meeting included approval of city bills of the past month.

Brucellosis Testing 75% Complete, Crews To Finish By August 20

Testing of cattle in Sutton County for brucellosis (Bangs disease) is about 75 percent complete this week, according to estimates from the State crew conducting the tests.

As of Saturday, August 6, some 6,292 cattle, representing a total cattle population of 11,411, had been tested. These came from 154 herds within the county.

A total of six herds were found to be infected and an additional 12 were found to be suspect. Infected herds will be tested in toto within 60 to 120 days from original date of testing. Suspect herds will be re-tested within 30 to 60 days from original date of testing and its immediate environs who have cattle, either milk cows or beef cattle, are urgently requested to notify the testing group so that they can be given the brucellosis test. All work is done free of charge to the cattle owner and all such cattle are required to be tested.

Devil's River Philosopher Advises City People Not To Take Expert's Advice To Move To The Country

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River disagrees with an advice columnist this week, his letter reveals.

Dear editar:
I was sitting under my favorite shade tree out here on my bitter-weed ranch the other day, the one that's lined up with two other trees spaced so accurately that as the afternoon wears on and the sun moves along, I can stay under the first tree and still be in the shade all the time without changing positions, as one tree picks up the shade from the other—it's a great peace of mind for a man to know he can take a nap and not wake up to find his shade has gone and the sun's in his face, although this isn't to say he can't wake up even in the shade and find a hydrogen bomb hasn't gone off somewhere in the world—at any rate, to get on with this sentence, which is getting to be as long as

a two-minute nominating speech that runs for an hour and half, I did wake up from a nap and I was still in the shade so I pulled out a newspaper I'd been saving and fell to reading an article on advice to people thinking about changing jobs.

As it explained, a man and his wife were thinking about giving up their job and home in town and moving to a ranch, and the advice columnist was tackling the problem, inside his air-conditioned office.

"My opinion," he said, "is that only a fool and his brother could expect to move from the city and operate a ranch at a profit."

If my brother, who also lives on a ranch, hears about this, I'll let him figure out which category he belongs in, but what bowled me over was that the columnist didn't stop there, he went on and said that despite this, "more city couples ought to try ranching. This spirit is what has made the country great."

It is my opinion that this columnist has been reading too many farm-plank promises by too many political parties.

Advising a city man to move out into the country and operate a ranch is about like advising a rancher to move into town and open up a super-market. It's a fine spirit, but it's not what has

made this country great. It's not what has made ranching boom or super-markets flourish.

Anybody in the city figuring on moving to the country to ranch to make this country greater, ought to revise his standards of greatness. By leaving, he might improve the city, but he won't improve himself or ranching either. What he'll do is go broke.

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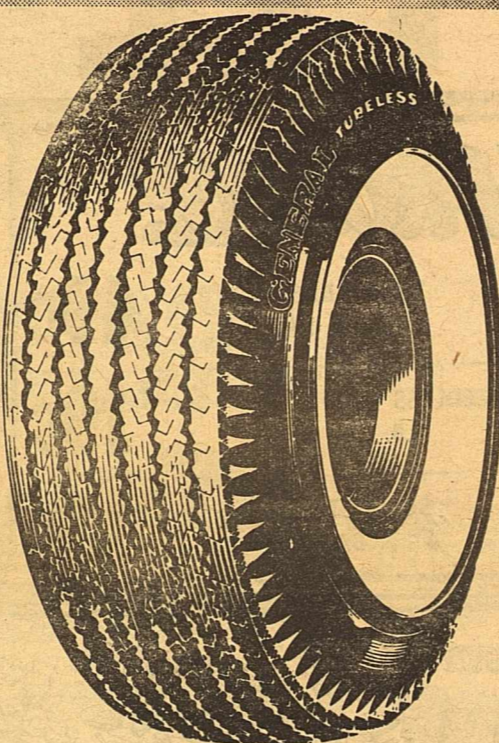

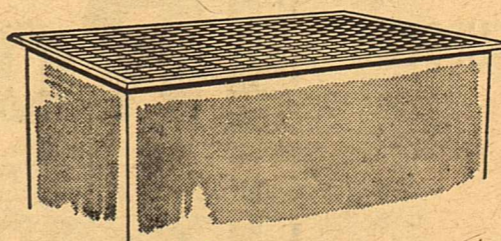

Front Crosses County Wednesday Leaving Up To 4.5 Inches Rain

A rain producing front moved across the Sonora area early Wednesday morning, leaving precipitation that varied from .54 at Sonora to 4.5 inches on the Epps ranch some 20 miles southeast. Most of the rain fell very slowly, but draws were running where rains of 3.5 to 4.5 inches fell. Ranges were beginning to brown rapidly as moisture from

Carroll's problem is this: There is a tendency among parents to put off requesting copies of their youngsters' birth records until the last moment. When too many parents delay in this manner, the results are obvious: a work overload.

The condition does not result from any lack of effort on the part of Carroll's staff. "Our limited Vital Statistics Division staff, despite long hours of night and week-end work-can process just so many requests before school begins," he explains.

More than 262,000 children are expected to enter elementary schools of Texas for the first time this fall. The estimate is based on calculations made by the Texas Education Agency.

A good many parents-some of whom may have waited too long in past years-have already requested and received birth records on this year's new scholars, but ten of thousands of additional records will have to be processed between now and the time that first school bell rings in September.

More than one youngster has been forced to postpone his first days at school simply because

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6, 7, and 8, and providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations, providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby, amended by adding the following Sections which shall read as follows:

"Section 6. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated limitations, providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

"Section 7. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District co-extensive with Hidalgo County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided in Article IX, Section 5(a), of the Constitution of Texas, as it applies to Hidalgo County, except that the maximum rate of tax that the said Hidalgo County Hospital District may be authorized to levy shall be seventy-five cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District, subject to district taxation.

"Section 8. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a Hospital District to be co-extensive with the limits of County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, Texas.

"If such District is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the District; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of seventy-five cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the Commissioners Precinct

No. 4 of Comanche County. "If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the District shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the District to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said seventy-five cent (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid to that District by paying a part of the expense of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County.

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published in the manner and to the extent provided in the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of interest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature, then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

"A number of people will be going on vacation during August", he said. "Some of them are just careless; others think because there is only a month left of the present season they can get by without getting a \$2.15 fishing license. Every month they find this to be pretty expensive because wardens have been asked to make careful check on fishermen without licenses."

The director also warned against rushing the hunting season. Dove shooting in the North Zone will be permitted after September 1. New hunting licenses also will be required. They will be available at local sporting goods stores the last week in August.

He also pointed to the change in white-winged dove regulations this year. The season will be September 9, 10 and 11-three consecutive days instead of three alternate days as previously. Whitewings may be taken in several counties in the Rio Grande Valley. The limit will be 10 per day and 10 in possession. During this three day shoot hunters also may take mourning doves. They can kill 10 whitewings and five mourners the first day. But they must not have in possession at

the end of the second day's shoot more than 30 doves-10 whitewings and 20 mourners.

WANTED BY THE FBI



SMITH GERALD HUDSON

One of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," Hudson is sought for his August 2, 1957, escape from the Pennsylvania State Penitentiary where he was serving a 10- to 20-year term for the brutal 1951 shotgun slaying of a Pennsylvania man. A Federal complaint charging Hudson with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder was issued on August 26, 1957, at Scranton, Pa.

Hudson is a white American, born at Rostraver, Pa., on March 1, 1928. Approximately 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighing about 183 pounds, he has brown hair, blue eyes, a medium complexion, and a medium-stocky build. He has a 1/2-inch linear scar on the first joint of his left thumb, a 1/2-inch scar on the outer edge of his left eyebrow, and an appendectomy scar.

He has worked as a coal miner, farm-hand, laborer, and truckdriver and likes most sports, particularly swimming.

Previously convicted of interstate transportation of a stolen motor vehicle, murder in the second degree, and involuntary manslaughter, he is regarded as belligerent and often violent when drinking to excess. He is considered armed and extremely dangerous and capable of killing without hesitation.

Anyone receiving information concerning the whereabouts of this fugitive should immediately notify the nearest FBI office, the telephone number of which can be found on the first page of local telephone directories.



Pupils who will be six years of age on or before November 1, 1960 are eligible to enter the first grade. Children who will be five years of age on or before November 1, 1960 may attend kindergarten. Kindergarten fee is \$10.00 per child per month payable in advance.

Children entering grades two through seven should bring last year's report card and book card. Finklea stated he would appreciate being advised of children who attended Central Elementary last year or who have been pre-registered for the first grade and who have moved away from Sonora during the summer months. This information is needed in order to determine the number of pupils in each grade, he said. The office phone number at the school is 22051.

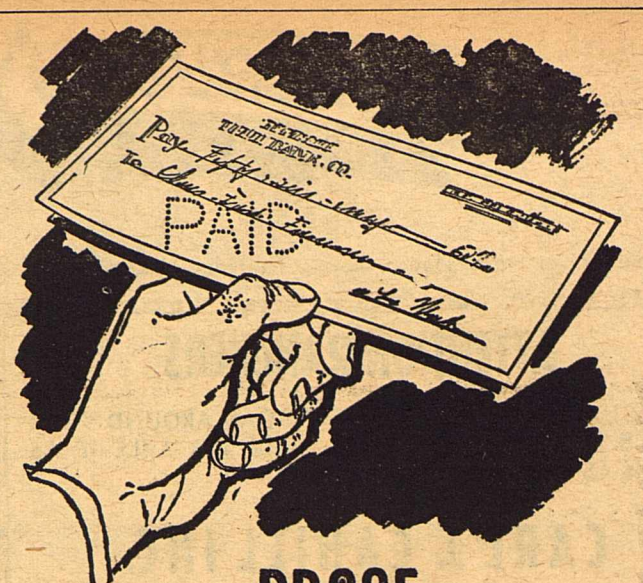
