Sonora schools and football enthusiasts will join in observing Ozona Day here Friday. A special invitation has been extended the people of Ozona to attend the game here Friday night, coming early to visit with friends here.

Odds And Ends

Fire Chief Lee Patrick this week reminded citizens that their cooperation in leaving streets clear for fire trucks answering calls is of the utmost importance. Patrick brought in the following article which may point out to everyone the necessity for cooperation:

WHEN THE SIREN SOUNDS
First, call the telephone operator to find out where the fire is. This ties up the lines so that the operator can't give the fire department the location of the fire. This delays firemen in getting to the fire which might be on the property of your friends or neighbors. **MOST IMPORTANT**—the operator is prohibited by the phone company from giving the location of a fire to anyone other than firemen.

Next, jump in your car and try to beat the firemen there. If you can't do that, follow the fire trucks. Park very close to the fire and get out and see the excitement—IF you are still in one piece. You may have met a fireman headed for the station or one of your friends with the same idea you had. If you wake up in the hospital to find that the wreck you helped cause resulted in only two deaths and the fire was only a skillet of grease you didn't really miss anything. But that wreck was a lot more expensive than any fire.

If you do make it to the fire safely be sure to drive over the hose line. This will probably burst the hose and cut off the water stream to the fire. So you get to see a bigger fire than anyone had counted on and the hose will have to be replaced at a cost of \$2.75 per foot—the taxpayers footing the bill.

In cold, hard fact it is unlawful to follow within 500 feet of a fire vehicle or to park within 500 feet of a fire.

Sonora's firemen spend at least 4 hours each month drilling and studying the best methods of combating fires. Let's help these firemen out by staying clear of fire trucks and keeping out of the way when they are fighting a fire.

All Texas Air Tour Lands Sunday Will Make Sonora R. O. N. In 1961

Some 45 private planes carrying more than 150 passengers landed at eleven o'clock Sunday morning at the airstrip on the Stanley Mayfield Ranch for a tour of the Caverns of Sonora as guests of the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber also served barbecue lunch to the 12th annual All-Texas Air Tour before the group, joined by an additional five planes, took off for Fort Stockton, the next stop on their circuit.

Primary function of the tour is to promote general public interest in local airport facilities as well as to point out the utility of small planes in modern life, according to E. M. "Tex" Anderson, president of the 1960 tour and president of the Texas Flying Farmers and Ranchers Association.

The group annually supports a charitable cause which members boost at each stop on their route. This year, as in the past eight, the March of Dimes with its programs of polio, rheumatism and arthritis and birth defects, was selected as the cause.

Twenty Sonora plane owners and flying enthusiasts joined the tour at Temple, Kerrville and Fort Clark in an effort to encourage the group to R.O.N. (remain over night) in Sonora on the 1961 tour.

Stanley Mayfield, chairman of the Sonora delegation, reported that directors of the Tour met at Fort Clark and voted to accept the Sonora invitation for next year.

The Sonora Broncos took their sixth consecutive victory of the 1960 grid season here Friday night by defeating the Rankin Red Devils 31 to 6. It was the Red Devils' sixth loss in as many tries.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Broncos began their attack with Bobby Sosa scampering an impressive 81 yards for the first touchdown. The conversion kick off the toe of Primo Gonzales was good for the bonus point.

Again in the second period, Lester Schmidt scored on a run of about 30 yards but the kick for extra point was no good. The resulting kickoff by the Broncos was returned a whopping 80 yards by back Donnie Gryder for

the Red Devils' only tally of the night.

In the third quarter Johnny Fields plunged over from the one-inch line to score the Broncos' third touchdown. The conversion attempt failed.

The fourth and final period saw the Broncos rack up two more touchdowns with Schmidt galloping 53 yards for the first and Gonzales driving across from the two for the final tally.

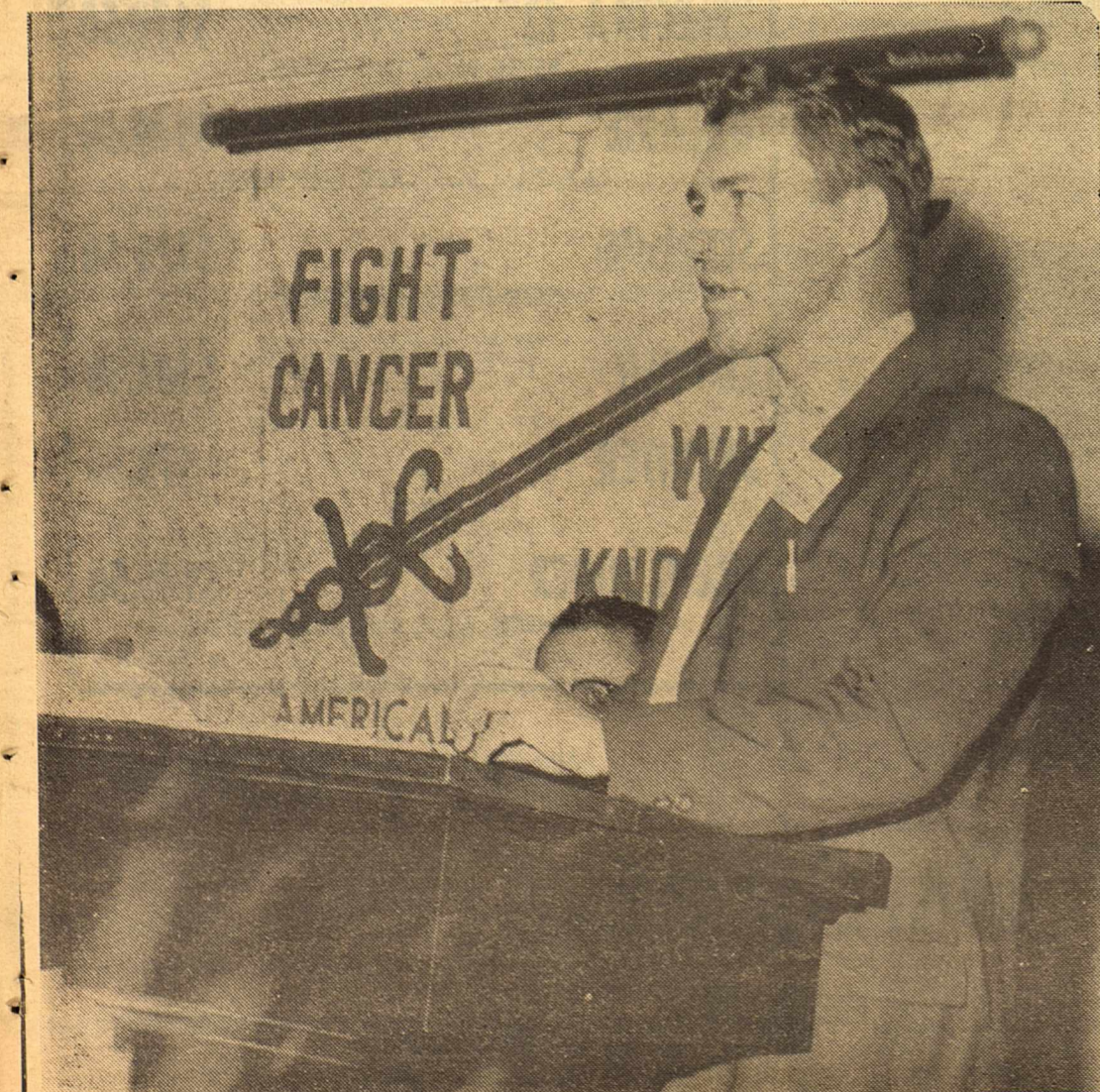

undefeated Broncos have amassed a total of 136 points to their opponents' 38.

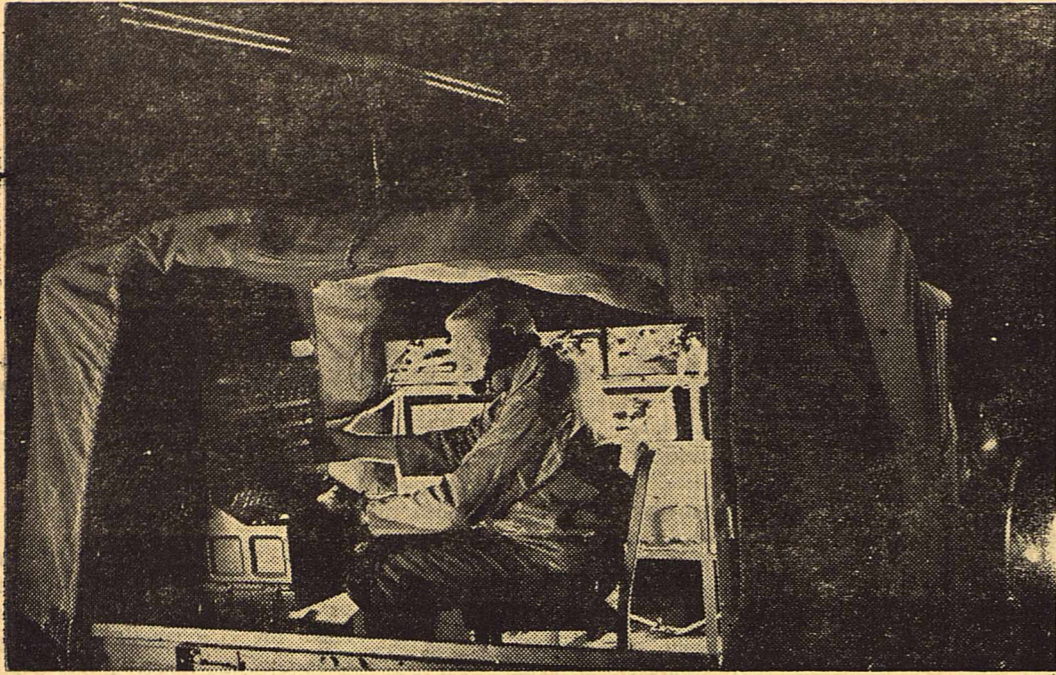

In other 8-A competition this week Junction meets Eldorado. Big Lake is idle.

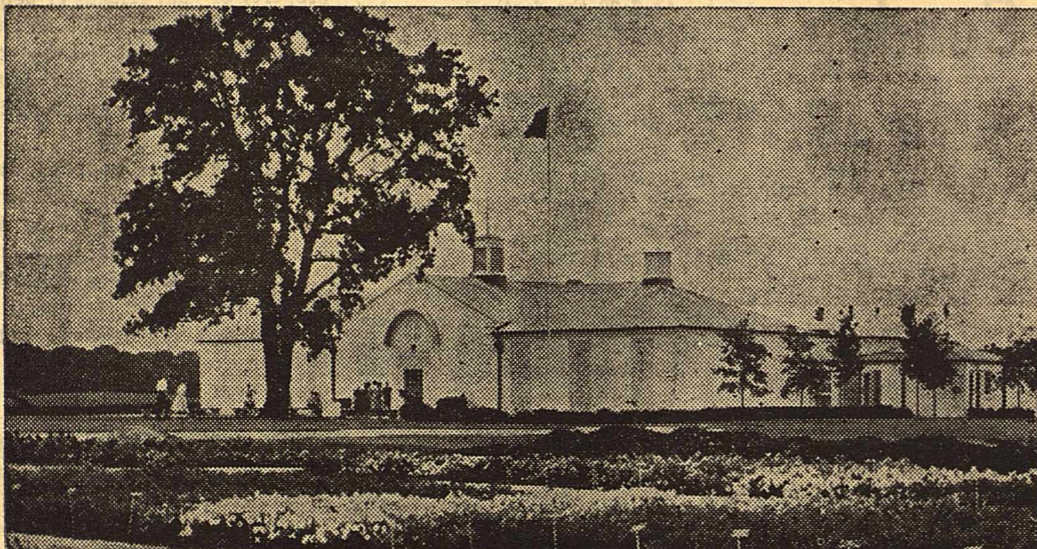
Radio Central to Provide Switched Radio Service...



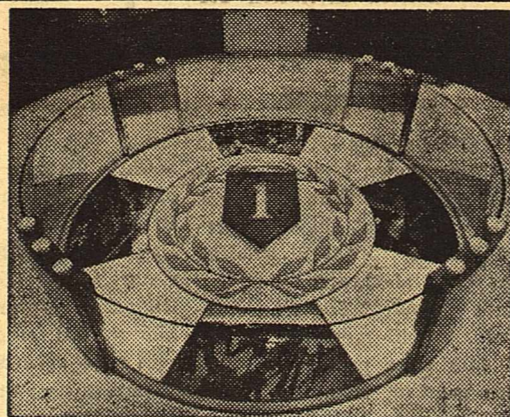

Joe B. Ross, board chairman, explained the District law and the method of electing landowners to operate each district. The State soil conservation board, which administers the law, is also composed of elected landowners, Ross said.

E. B. Keng, SCS conservationist, gave a brief report on progress in construction of flood prevention dams. "Two structures, Sites 5 and 6, are scheduled for completion this week, and Site 2 should be finished next week", Keng said. This will complete 10 dams, and leave only three to be completed.

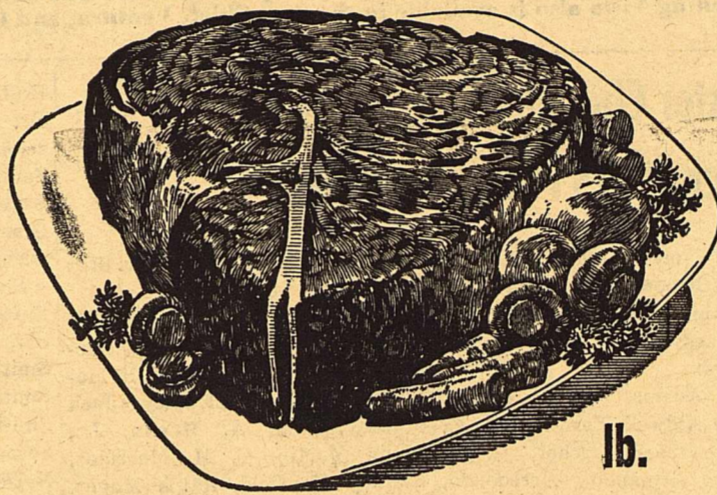
Sites 1 and 4 should be finished this year, and the final dam at Site 3 should be completed early in 1961. As of now, structures would hold back some 20,000 acre feet of floodwater, compared to 37,000 acre feet to be detained when all dams are complete.

Now, therefore, I Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the week beginning October 9, 1960, as Fire Prevention Week."
In the last decade, fire has killed more than 100,000 persons, and burned and disfigured many hundred thousands more. Each year over 11,000 people in the United States die needlessly in fires, and more than twice that number are severely burned or disfigured for life.
Property losses are high, too. More than \$1 1/2 billion is the estimated value of property destroyed in 1959.
The theme of National Fire Prevention Week is "Don't give Fire a Place to Start." A clean house seldom burns. Keep your home and premises free of fire hazards by regular inspections. Burn trash regularly, in small quantities, in a safe place and at a safe distance from buildings.
Fire losses can be deduced. Each family should train for safety. Plan at least two ways

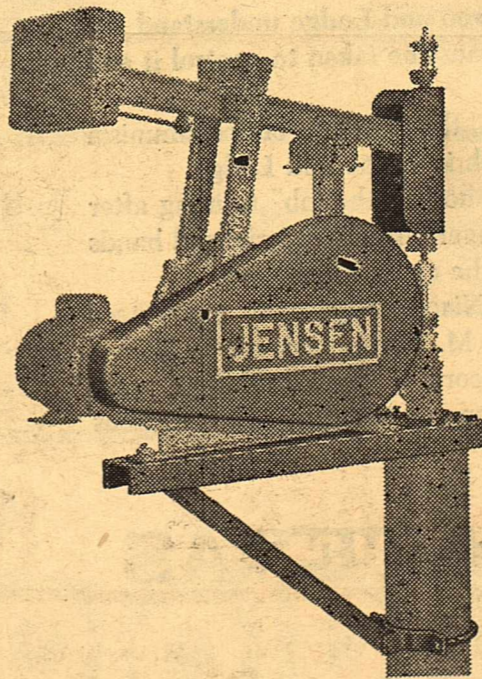

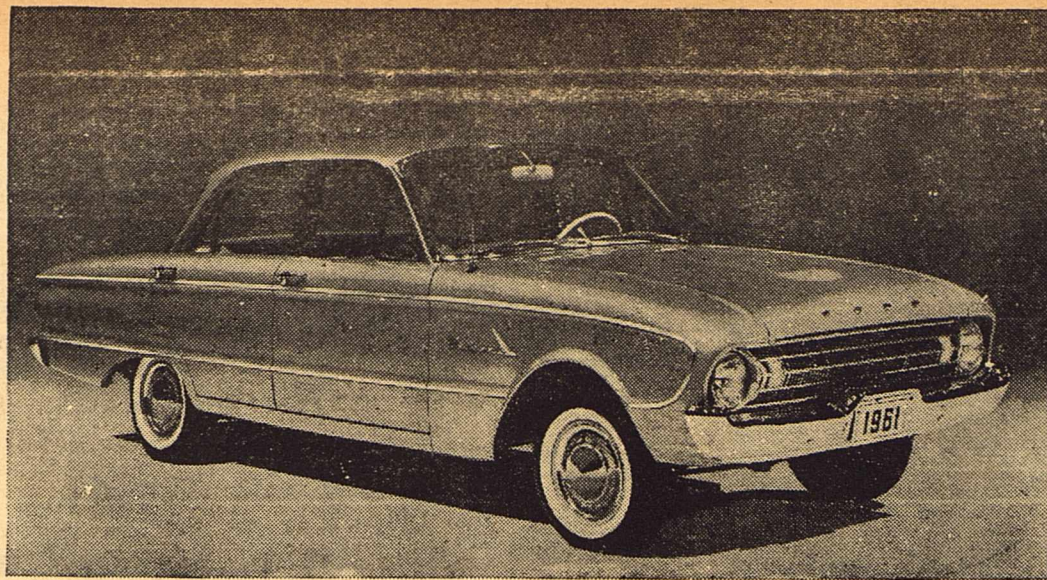

Member cities are Ballinger, Bangs, Brady, Bronte, Brownwood, Coleman, Eden, Eldorado, Junction, Mason, Menard, Miles, Ozona, Santa Anna, Sonora and Winters.

Deer Hunters Need Permits To Hunt Does

"Hunters must have special permits to kill doe or antlerless deer," warns the assistant director of law enforcement, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "There seems to be some confusion on this subject," he says. "However, it's very simple. If you don't have a special permit issued by the Commission, you can't legally shoot or take doe or antlerless deer in any county of the State."

The general law states that it is unlawful to kill doe, fawn or spiked buck anywhere in the State. However, in regulatory authority areas, in order to maintain a healthy balance of the deer population in those areas, biologists recommend that surplus doe and antlerless deer be removed by hunters.

In such instances, landowners or operators are issued a quota of permits based on deer census reports and observations by the biologists and wardens of the Commission. Hunters then must contact the landowners and obtain their permits to hunt doe or antlerless deer.

Permits also will be required of all hunters who wish to take pronghorned antelope this season. When a hunter purchases his privilege to hunt on a piece of land, the landowner will give him a permit to hunt and take either a doe or buck, depending again on the condition of the herd and biologists' recommendations.

"The best thing to do if you are in doubt about game laws, seasons, or bag limits," said the assistant director, "is to check with your local game warden before going hunting."
