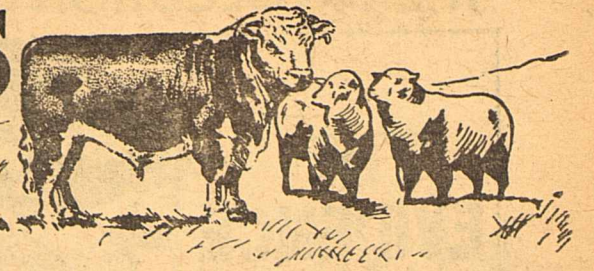

# Christmas Shopping Season To Get Kickoff Thursday

Sonora merchants in the downtown district will join in a special Christmas shopping season preview Thursday, December 1, under the auspices of the retail sales committee of the Sonora Chamber of Commerce.

The preview, in the form of a general open house, will begin at three o'clock Thursday afternoon and continue until seven o'clock in the evening. Visitors will register at participating business houses

for door prizes to be given away during the evening. They will see the merchants' new Christmas merchandise displayed and all stores are now putting the final touches on their holiday decorations.

Businessmen and women and their employees will be hosts for the occasion.

A special Christmas street program will begin at 6:30 with the band scheduled to play a concert of holiday music. A high school

chorus will sing Christmas carols and at seven o'clock Mayor A. E. Prugel will officially proclaim the 1960 Christmas shopping season open in Sonora. Christmas street lights will be turned on for the first time this season.

The drawing for door prizes will follow with gifts or gift certificates being presented winners whose names appear on the registration list from each of the participating stores.

## Deer Take Totals 475 Tuesday About 75 Turkeys On Storage

The 40 1/2 pound, 18-point buck tagged by Mrs. Mack Cauthorn on opening day of the 1960 hunting season still leads as largest killed in Sutton County this year. This 16-pointer killed by a San Angelo man, Raymond York, also retains the lead in the contest for the deer with most points. As of Tuesday of this week, some 475 deer, including 60 does,

and 75 turkeys had been turned in at local storage houses. This shows an increase of 135 over the total of 340 deer a week ago and slight increase in number of turkeys during the past week.

The Sonora Art Club will hold a bake sale in the old postoffice building Saturday, December 10. Offered for sale will be cakes, pies, home made candies and cookies.

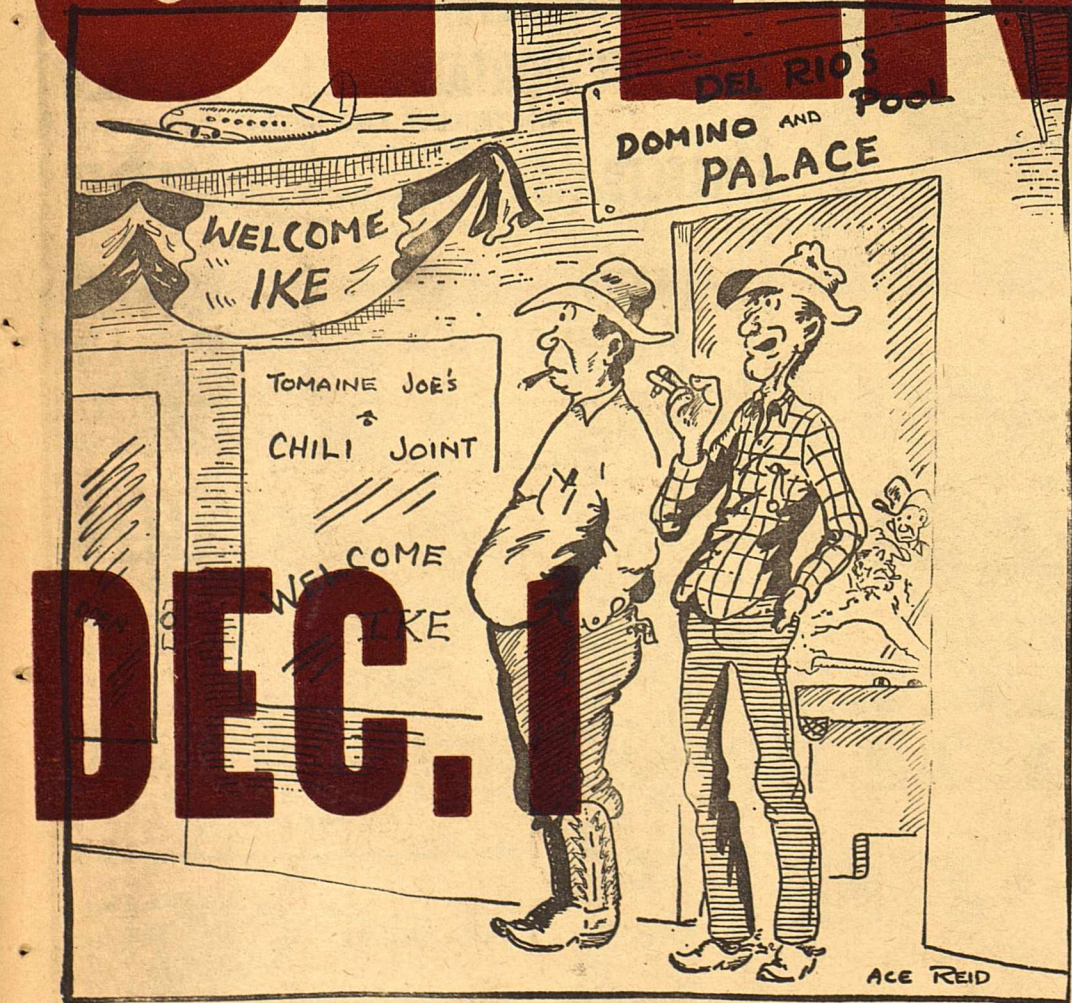

Mrs. S. M. Harvick of Ozona is state chairman.

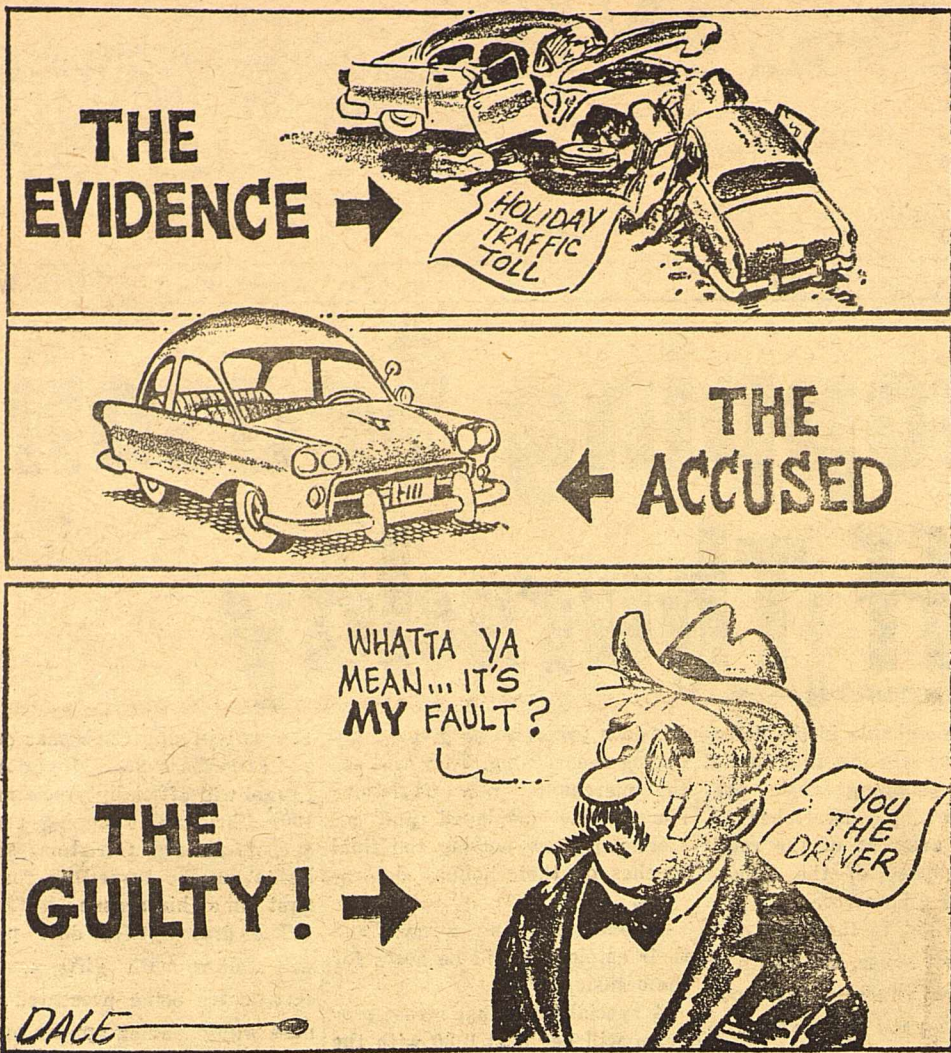

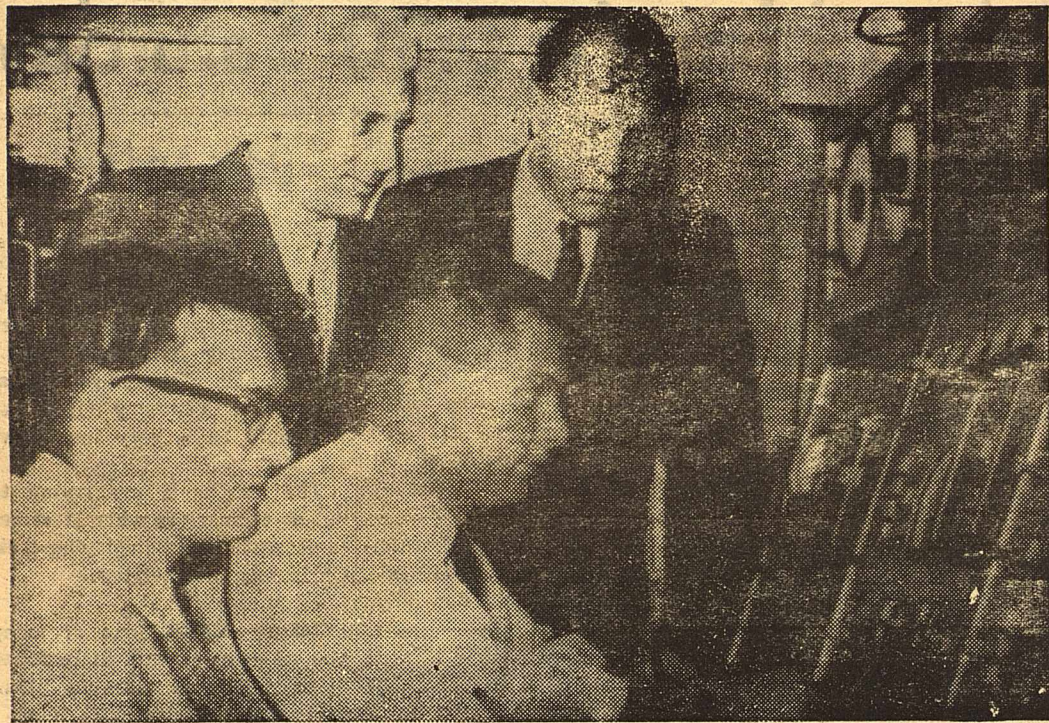

**Devil's River Philosopher Finds Problem That Doesn't Worry Him - The Precise Length Of A Second**

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River is taking an unscientific attitude toward a scientific problem, his letter this week reveals. Dear editor:

**It's Easy To Tell A Deer From A Cow**

There is just as much difference between a beef steak and a venison chop as there is between a cow and a deer. But it's a lot easier to recognize a cow at a glance. At least, this is the theory of Capt. E. M. Sprott, director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

He's been evaluating stories coming into the office about deer hunters shooting cows on farms and ranches.

He says the cow shooting by hunters falls into three categories. First, there is the hunter who just shoots when he sees something more. Then, of course, there is the night hunter who shines a flash light into a cow's eyes and pulls the trigger on the wrong kind of animal.

Then the captain admits, there are some who just don't seem to know the difference.

All three are a menace to other wildlife and all hunters, according to the captain.

"Many more landowners would be willing to permit hunting on their places with some assurance their prize livestock wouldn't be killed off," he said. "But it seems every day, somewhere, our wardens are given information about the shooting of livestock."

share of things to worry over, but that's because there are more problems in this world than he's found out about. Actually, there are a lot more problems he could worry about if he knew about them.

Nearly anybody, if you pin him down, will claim he has his full. For example, take a second of time. For years now I've been going along not paying much attention to the length of a second, figuring 60 of them made a minute and that's all there was to it.

But all this time there have been people worrying over how long a second actually is. As I

understand it from a newspaper article I read last night during a commercial on television, there's a serious question in the minds of scientists over whether the present second is accurate. For centuries man has been basing his measure of time on how long it took the earth to go around the sun, but some scientists are now claiming this isn't accurate enough, and time ought to be based on the pulse beat of an atom.

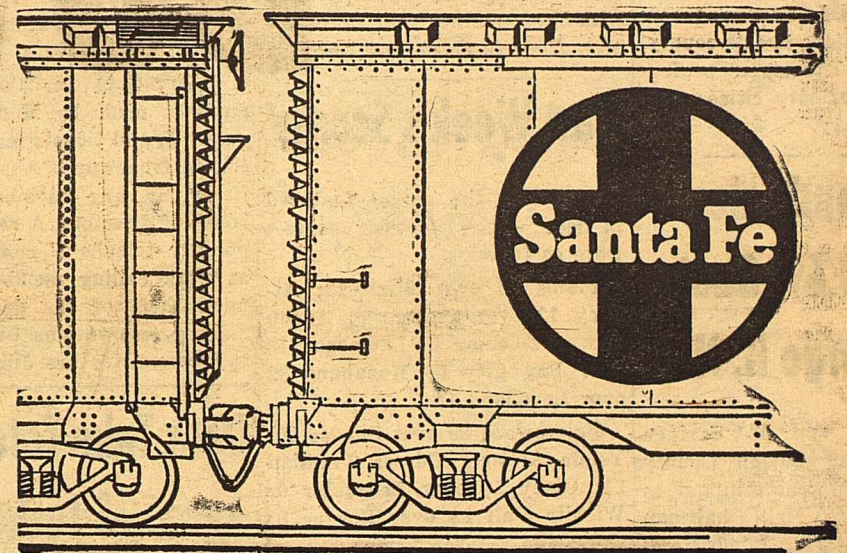
This is the sort of problem I'm glad I escaped worrying about for all my years up to now, and I'm not sure I can swing much worrying to it even after I've heard about it.

I mean, I don't really care how long or short a second is, or whether a second today is the same length it was yesterday. When a man has got himself in a position where seconds are important to him, he's left me behind by several years, although

not really. It's sort of like a four-minute mile. I've never heard of a four-minute mile race yet where the winner didn't wind up exactly in the same place he started from, and that has always struck me as an awful waste of energy when you can attain the same spot by sitting still four minutes. It's like having supper in Paris and breakfast in New York. That's going to a lot of trouble to have the same fried eggs I have every morning right here at home without traveling more than 20 feet.

Maybe the scientific world need a more accurate standard to define the length of a second of time, but the way the operations are geared on this bitterweed ranch, a calendar is about all I need, and even if I lost that, I believe I'd still get around to lighting a fire when it's cold and opening a window when it's hot. ## TSGRA Convention Slated Dec. 5-7 In San Angelo

Harold Josendal of Casper, Wyoming, President of the National Wool Growers' Association, and David Hamil of Washington, D. C., Administrator for the Rural Electrification Administration, head the list of speakers for the 45th annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association here next week.

The convention opens Monday, December 5, and runs through Wednesday, December 7. Attendance is expected to be about 400 members.

Other speakers are U. S. Representative W. R. Poage of Waco; State Senator Dorsey Hardenian of San Angelo; Walter L. Pfluger, Eden, Vice-President of the American Sheep Producers' Council; and Desmond Barry of Houston, President of the Galveston Truck Lines.

The only pre-convention activity is to be the meeting of the Budget Committee December 4. Monday, the opening day, is to be devoted to registration and committee meetings and caucuses of members from the various districts for election of directors.

Josendal, Hardenian and Barry are to speak at the Dec. 6 morning session; Pfluger is to speak at the afternoon session the same day, and Hamil is to address the membership banquet the evening of Dec. 6. Poage's address is to be given Wednesday morning, December 7.

Lucius M. Stephens of Lometa, TSGRA President, and Tom Wallace of San Angelo, Executive Secretary, will make their annual reports Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 6. The annual meeting of the Texas Sheep Council is also set for Tuesday afternoon. The annual dance will be Monday evening in the Hotel Cactus ballroom.

Presentation of awards to state winners in the TSGRA sheep and goat and wool and mohair contest and range management demonstration are to be at the Wednesday morning session with Poage's address following. A panel discussion, with authorities from Texas A. & M. College serving as members, on disease control and eradication research is also set for Wednesday morning.

Election of officers, directors, selection of the 1961 convention city and the first quarterly meeting of the board of directors are all scheduled for Wednesday afternoon.
