Planting time is just around the corner so let me remind you we should plant cotton with the soil temperature as the guide instead of the calendar. Get you a soil thermometer and check the soil temperature at a depth of eight inches at 8:00 a. m. each morning. When the soil averages 61 degrees over a 10 day period at this depth go ahead and plant. Your seed will be placed at a depth considerable less than this, but

more shallow depth. portant that we hold our stand of cotton this year due to the feed grains program. In the past we have been able to fall back on grain sorghum when we lost our cotton, but this will not be permitted if you cooperate in the feed grains program. So make plans now to get and hold a stand of cotton.




