Devil Takes A Week's Holiday

on the Sonora Golf Course, located off the San Angelo Highway east and south of the Sonora Municipal Airport-Joe Ber-

ger Field, is progressing rapidly. The 600 loads of dirt donated by Carl Cahill have been of great benefit, as they covered 3,000 yards on the course, or 300 yards per green. Other donations include the six-inch pipes for casing under the road donated by the City of Sonora.

Local employees of El Paso Natural Gas have helped with a great deal of the construction. and the four-inch pipes for casing under the road were donated by Pioneer Gathering System.

The complete piping system consists of 2,000 feet of fourinch pipe, 1,500 feet of one-and one-half-inch pipe and 5,000 feet of two-inch pipe. 8,500 feet of water lines have been laid, and the laying of water pipes to every green was completed last week. Various members of the Sonora Golf Club have volunteered to be responsible for the





spring. Sonora has recorded 13.17 inches for the year, which is about normal, but some ranchmen east of Sonora have received around 35 inches this year. Heavy June and July rains quickly overcame the deficiency caused by the dry spring.

This marks the first straight year that annual rainfall has been normal or above, since the breaking of the long drought in 1957. Generally, more rainfall has been received during this period than for any five consecutive years since records have been kept.

Rainfall on the Edwards Plateau area of Texas is very erratic and uncertain. Ranchmen can do a great deal to lessen the effects of occasional dry years by keeping a good reserve of grass on the land at all times. Only a very few years occur when there is not sufficient rainfall to grow some grass-if it can be held on the land where it falls.
