
The organization would be for men and women between 16 and 35.

Wreck Occurs Near Bovina Saturday

Auto Crash Critically Injures Three

Mrs. John V. Felps of Rocky Ford, Colorado remains in critical condition in Parmer County Hospital, and two men are in serious condition as the result of a head-on collision of two cars near Bovina last Saturday.

Mrs. Felps was injured when the car in which she was driving alone crashed head-on with one driven by Antonio Aviles Curz of Bovina just 60 feet southwest of the Bovina city limits Saturday.

Cruz and his passenger, Benito Cortez Arizmendez of Lake Worth, Florida, have been in serious condition at the hospital, although listed as "improved" by attending physicians.

The Felps woman was travelling east at the time of the wreck. She had been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Johnson of 1920 W. 18th Street, Portales, N.M., and was enroute to Colorado to rejoin

her husband, who had been attending summer National Guard Camp. Mrs. Felps, 16, sustained

broken bones in both arms and legs, as well as head and chest injuries. She was in a state of shock when admitted to the hospital, but this had subsided by Sunday. She still hasn't been able to communicate with any-

one a great deal. Cruz, 35, who worked for Donald Ray Verner at Bovina, received eight broken ribs, a broken leg and multiple severe lacerations, Arizmendez, 30, had been visiting relatives in Bovina. He suffered a broken leg, multiple contusions and lacerations.


Road Work End Near

FB Offers Assistance **To Fire Departments**

The Parmer County Farm Bureau is participating in a program to assist local volunteer fire departments in fire prevention and protection in rural areas, according to Harry Hamilton of Friona, presi-

dent. The local FB leader said the Farm Bureau will help defray the expenses for sending a limited number of volunteer firemen to a Fireman's Training School to be held July 21-26 at Texas A&M College. The Farm Bureau will pay \$45 of the \$50 registration fee for local volunteer fire departments to attend the school which furnishes up-to-date information on fire protection and fire prevention as well as fire fighting techniques. The \$50 registration fee also covers lodging and meals, he explained.

The Farm Bureau will also pay any local organized fire department for answering calls outside of the city limits to

Castorbeans Are Boosted As A New Cash Possibility

Some Texas farmers who are

looking for a new cash crop may try castorbeans this year. The demand for additional oil from the crop is good but a word of caution is advised: do not grow a castorbean crop unless you have a marketing contract

harvest. They also give specific information on growing the crop

and usually help make arrangements to harvest it. In 1962, Texas farmers ac-

counted for three-fifths of the castorbean output. In the nation as a whole, 235,000 acres of castorbeans were grown, producing 34 million pounds of beans compared with 37 million in 1961. Over 90 percent of the beans were grown under irrigation.

The average yield per acre in 1962 was 1,434 pounds compared with 1,029 pounds a year earlier. The record year was 1958 when the average was 1,765 pounds per acre.

Yields last year varied from 1,855 pounds per acre in some parts of Texas to 757 pounds in New Mexico.






