Caverns Open New Season With \$70,000 Improvements



Of the many thousands of pictures of the Caverns of Sonora, taken by both amateur and professional photographers, this is patio. considered one of the most spectacular. In addition to the featured soda straws, it shows many other formations peculiar to the gifts and souvenirs for sale te

Visitors to the Caverns of Sonora this season will find many new improvements to make their trip even more enjoyable than in past years. Some \$70,000 has been put into buildings and improvements during the slower winter season.

\$60,000 CAVE BUILDING

Foremost among the new features is the \$60,000 stone, wood and glass building designed by the San Angelo architectural firm of Chakos and Zentner on a 'Old West Texas' theme. The building, which is 50 feet by 100 feet, is completely enclosed by porches ten feet wide.

The theme is carried out in the building's interior by use of rough cedar paneling on walls, wagonwheel light fixtures, and a rustic native stone fireplace.

NEW FACILITIES OFFERED Central feature of the new building is the snack bar at which the 1962 traveling public will be served hotdogs, hamburgers, sandwiches, coffee, tea and soft drinks. The snack bar serves both the building interior and the







Meet a fellow Texan: Preston Smith

Preston Smith's story is in the best Texas and American tradition-a farm boy who worked his own way to an education and a place of honor in his business and

Born in the heart of Texas, at Georgetown, he moved with his family to Dawson County in 1923 when he was 10 years old. He went to school at Sunset, Lamesa, and Texas Tech. In his adopted home town of Lubbock, with his wife Ima and their two children, he now carries out the full responsibilities of a typical Texas business and civic leader.

A steward at St. John's Methodist Church-member of the Salvation Army Board, the Kiwanis Club, the Chamber of Commerce, the Texas Farm Bureau—these are some of the activities close to the heart of Preston

He did not stop there. In his daily pursuits Preston Smith came to realize that business and government are closely related in the American system-and that without good government we cannot have a favorable climate for good business. A man of direct action. Preston Smith went into the business of government. He served six years in the Texas House of Representatives and six in the Senate.

Senator Smith has supported sound statewide legislation for better schools, roads, welfare and conservation. He took the lead in establishing a permanent building program for state colleges. 




