Principal Ralph Finklea advises that birth certificates are required for registration in kindergarten and first grades. Children who are five on or before November 1, 1962 are eligible for kindergarten. Children who are six on or before November 1, 1962 are eligible for re-

gistration in the first grade. Parents who registered for first grade last May during the first grade roundup and who presented birth certificates at that time need not register Monday morning. A fee of \$10.00 per month is charged for kindergarten. This fee must be paid in advance. Pupils entering from other schools must present their book and report cards at the time of registration.

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YOUR MINISTER SAYS

Luke 19:41 "And when He was come near, He beheld the city, and wept over it."

Last week we considered Jericho, the walled city. This week let us turn to Jerusalem, the blind city. Jerusalem is often referred to as the Holy City because it so long housed the sanctuary of Christian worship. It was a city that was proud of its temples, of its sanctimonious priests, of its religious holidays, and of its religious feasts It was a city that had housed some of God's greatest prophets. It was a city that had on numerous occasions been delivered from its warring enemies by the hand of God.






