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





- (10) Individual membership identification cards which will contain the following information: Name, date of birth, occupation, blood type, handicaps or infirmities, sensitivity to drugs, fall-out area assignment (within cave).

The Caverns of Sonora proposes to lease shelter space to individuals on a 50-year basis in order to finance construction and installations required to meet Civil Defense standards and specifications.


