

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

#### **Letter To Editor**

Dear Editor:

The U. S. Treasury Department has recommended changes in the Federal Income Tax Law which would take away the right to deduct the following expenses from your net income for tax purposes: (1) interest payments on home mortgages, (2) real property taxes, (3) interest charges on consumer installment purchases and personal loans, (4) church and charity contributions and (5) other state and local taxes.

All five items are presently fully deductible. Any attempt to alter this kills man's natural incentive to own his home or any other private property. Once enacted, such legislation would be here to stay as has been proven time and again both at the state and federal levels. This change should be prevented now while it is before the House Ways and Means Committee.

Encourage the following Texas Congressmen, by wire or letter to them, to protest the Treasury Department's proposals: Rep. O. C. Fisher, Rap. Ed Foreman, Rep. Omar Burleson and Rep. George Mahon. The address of all four is House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C.
