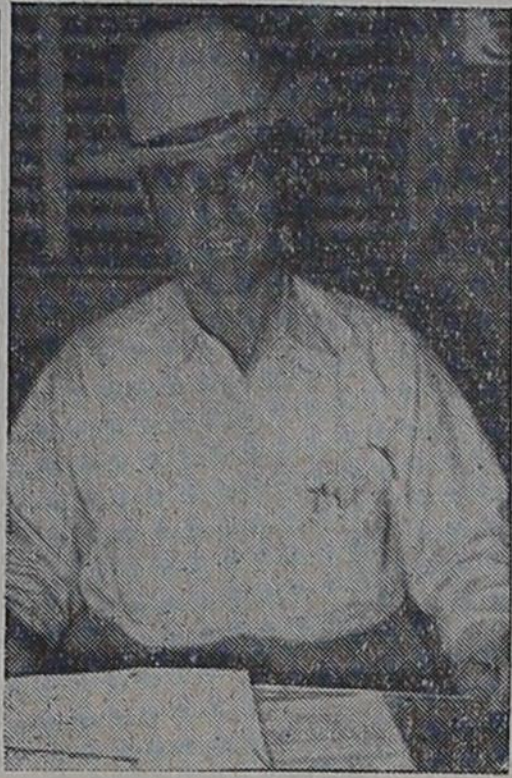

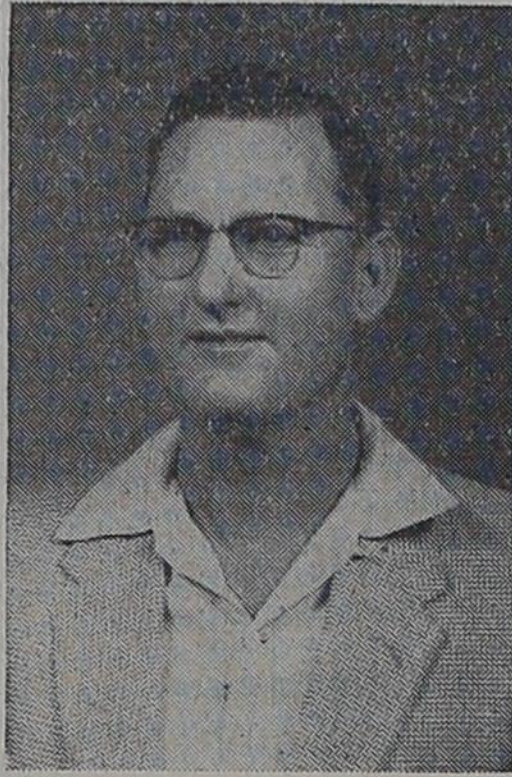

### Glasscock Is Defeated By 71-Vote Deficiency

J. E. (Jay) Sherrill, Jr. is the new mayor of Bovina. The decision was made by Bovina voters yesterday (Tuesday) when they voted at the American Legion Hall in Bovina. Sherrill got 96 votes.

Alvin Glasscock, Sherrill's opponent received 25 votes. O. W. Rhinehart, retiring mayor, received two write-in votes.

The election, figured to be close, turned out to be a landslide for Sherrill. He is the manager of Ciccero Smith Lumber Company in Bovina.

Rhinehart's resignation was effective April 2. Sherrill will begin his two-year term officially next Monday night when he meets with Commissioners Emmett Tabor and Paul Jones.

The candidates, originally four, were appointed to run for the mayor's post by the city commission. A. D. Cumpton and J. P. Macon dropped from the race early.

Rhinehart resigned so that the terms of the mayor and the commissioners would not expire at the same time. The commissioners' terms will expire next April. They, along with Rhinehart, were elected in April of 1955.

A total of 123 votes were cast. The election was held by A. B. Wilkinson, Hodge Rigdon, and Will Parker. Wilkinson was the election judge.

The new mayor and the commissioners will be faced with the problem of how to go about carrying out six recommendations that were recently made by the newly-formed city planning board.

Possibly the most important of these recommendations is to "set up a permanent paving program for Bovina."

By having the terms of the mayor and the commissioners "staggered," there will always be some experience on the city commission. Rhinehart says that commissions in the past have been handicapped because their members have all been elected new at the same time and "too much time was wasted in getting acquainted with the duties of the offices."

## District 3-B Track Meet Will Be in Bovina Saturday

The annual District 3-B track meet will be held in Bovina Saturday, April 7, at the high school athletic field.

There will be three divisions—grade school, freshman, and high school. Teams from Bovina, Lazbuddie, Farwell, Adrian, and Vega will participate. However, Adrian will have no entries in the high school or freshmen divisions.

Farwell's Steers will be the high school division favorite because they have three entries in each event.

There will be eight events in the junior divisions and 14 events in the high school division. The meet will begin at 9:00 a. m. and will be over at 3:40 p. m. One hour— from 12 noon until 1:00 p. m.— will be taken off for lunch.

Bovina Coach Bob Willis will be the meet director. Fred Hinger, a coach at the high school in Portales, N. M., will be the meet's official starter.

Willis says he feels his teams best chances for first places will be in the pole vault, 880-yard run, and discus throw. Neil Smith, two time contestant in the state track meet, will lead the Mustangs in the pole vault. Junius Williams is the local star in the 880-yard run and Larry Ezell and Darrel Read will be featured in the discus throwing.

First, second, and third place winners will qualify for the region meet that will be held in Lubbock April 21.

"If the weather is nice, we expect to have a nice crowd out for the meet," Willis says.

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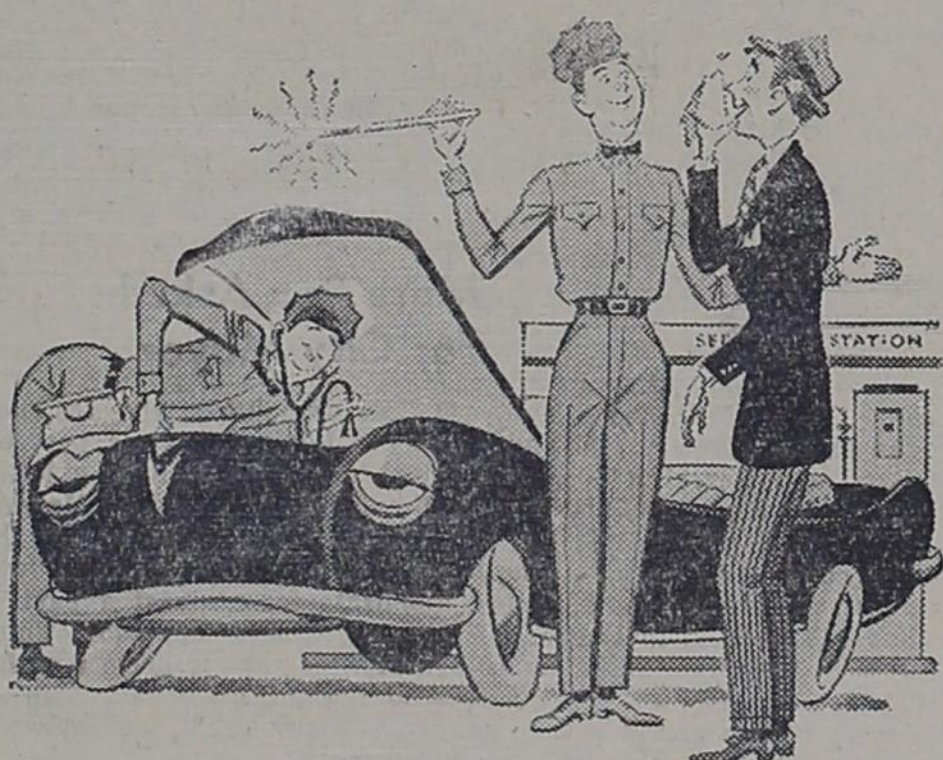

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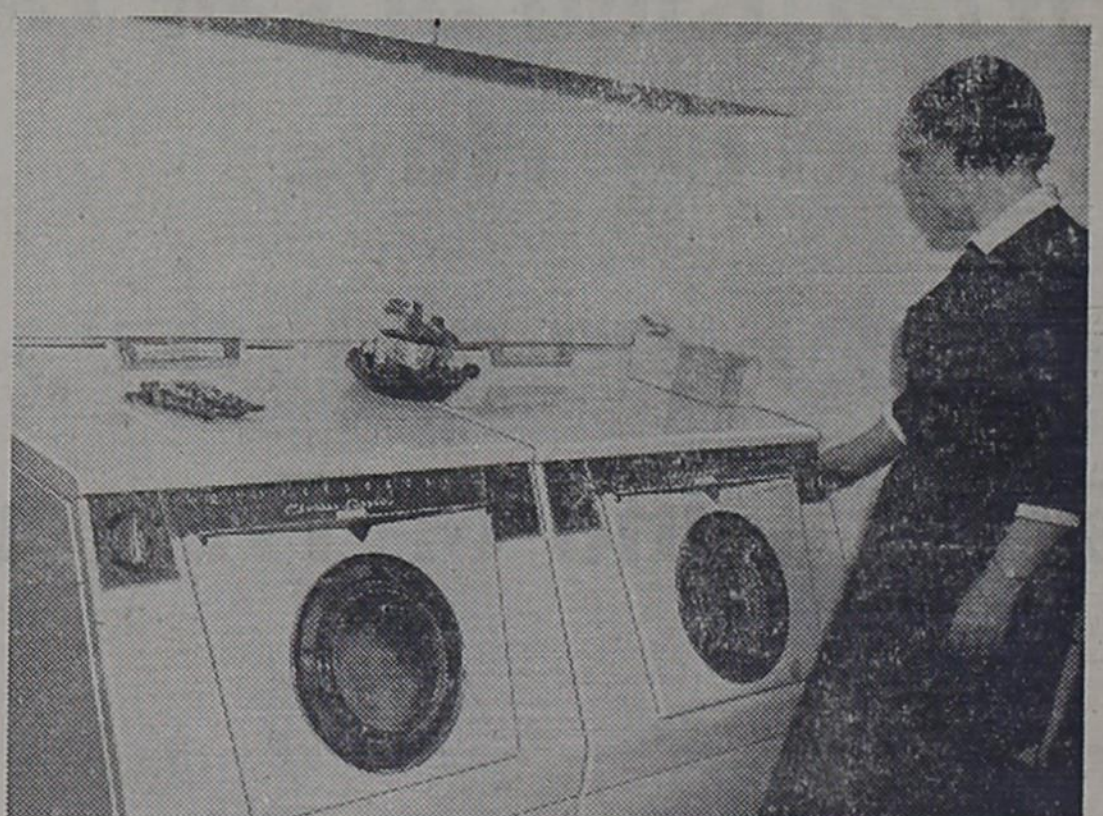

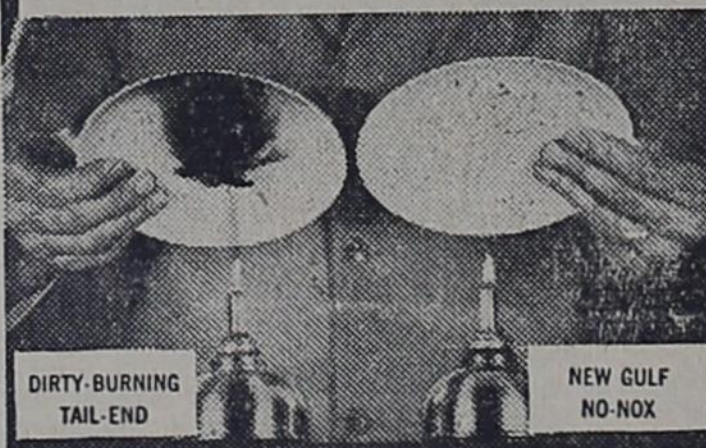
