Another Case Of Screwworms Found In Sutton County


Still another case of screwworms, this on the Sears Sentell ranch, has been confirmed within Sutton County. The confirmation came Saturday, May 18, and release of sterile flies was expected to be made as soon as weather permitted, according to Clifton Clark of the Southwest Animal Health Foundation.

Sterile fly drops are now being made twice weekly over each infested area and the Sentell ranch, along with all other ranches south of U.S. Highway 290 found to house screwworms, will receive 25,000 sterile flies at each drop. Release will continue for a two-week period and ranchers are asked to maintain the limed marker for that period so that pilots can spot the tar-



Set For This Coming Sunday

The turnout for the two previous serum dosages has been excellent and was described as above the maximum expected, with more than 1,800 persons having received the Type 1 and Type III vaccine given on Sunday, March 3, and Sunday, April

The final dosage will be Type II and those who have had the two previous types still need to receive this type to insure complete immunization. This dosage may be taken even if one or both of the previous doses have not been received. Complete, life-long immunization is assured when the series of three serums has been taken, since each type works against a different type of polio virus.

It is urgently hoped that all those who have not yet received the Type II vaccine will be present to Sunday to take it, as an assurance of a polio-free com-





WIND UP-Regular session of the 58th Legislature ends Friday. That's three days earlier than the constitutional require-

Hundreds of the 1,500 proposed new laws submitted by the 181 legislators Other hundreds will become law when Gov. John Connally signs them. Rush of business at the session's end is pouring them into his office by the score.

All legislative proposals are mportant to someone. In a few cases, it is a single person.

One proposal would allow a newspaper editor to practice law. It was killed on the floor.

Another would permit practice of architecture, by a qualified person who failed to apply for a license before the deadline arrived. It died in committee.

But the major issues of the session appear to be fairly well

COURTS-An exception is judicial redistricting.

Rep. Henry Stollenwerck, a Republican from Dallas, vainly tried to move some rural district courts to the cities. This to follow the people who have moved into the population centers.

Stollenwerck presented statistics showing that some courts are handling only 150 cases a year, while others in major cities have towering caseloads even after disposing of five times that many cases a year. Bill was killed in committee.

Rep. Bob Johnson of Dallas persuaded the House to pass a bill under which a judicial redistricting board, made up of the fee will be furnished all old Lieutenant Governor, House Speaker and Attorney General, would reapportion district courts died in the Senate.

Speaker Byron Tunnell quipped, "From now on, when you folks have complaints about your bills, you can take your troubles to the House minority leader.' Houston then cast his first vote as G.O.P. leader in favor of extending the Veterans Land Program, while his followers cast votes against it.






