mes Abound with Potential Poisons, AMA Official Warns

Children, supposedly "safe at home," are poisoning themselves at the rate of nearly 1,500 a day. "When you consider that

more than a quarter million home-used products on the market contain toxins, it is not difficult to understand why more than 500 children die each year from self-administered poisons," said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vice-president of the American Medical Association.

Children are naturally curious, especially the very young ones. They are prone to stick into their mouths anything they can get in their hands. It doesn't even have to taste good or look

Most accidental poisonings occur in children under five. Two-year-olds are the most poison prone, with one-year-olds close behind. At this stage in Jife their curiosity is at its height and their sense of fear not yet developed, Dr. Blasingame explained.

Medicine, especially aspirin, heads the list of items children seem to like to sample, accounting for nearly half of all accidental poisonings. In fact, too much of virtually any medicine can produce serious conse-

Among the supposed non-edibles that frequently find their way into children's stomachs are cleaning and polishing agents, detergents, shoe polish, cosmetics, waxes, insecticides paint, turpentine, chalk, bleaches, plant foods, plaster, perfume and decorations.

"The Chosen People of God had broken their sacred vows," cried Hosea. Andthese words were especially painful to the prophet, to be sure. For his own wife, Gomer, had been unfaithful to him. She had entered one of the pagan temples herself and defiled her marriage vows.

Yet Hosea could still love Gomer, and take her back into his house even though she had humiliated him. He told the faithless Israelites that if they too would turn back, God would receive them in love and would not turn his back on them.

This is the heart of the Christian message. In Christ the promise is given that whoever turns away from wickedness and unfaithfulness is received as a groom receives his bride. Our own sins are many. Yet the promise is there for us. Return to



A good bench rest is almost a must for sighting in rifles for and other items before leaving pre-season hunting. But benches seldom are available except at commercial ranges.

Burs on Clothes

Tie one end of a nylon clothesline to your waist, the other end your partner. Criss-cross field with line stretched between you, waist high. Birds hiding in between you will flush as the line passes over them.

Teach Dogs to Hunt By Nose A young dog often refuses to use his nose when in training.

Take such a pup out at night and carry along a pocketful of his favorite tid-bits. Let him sniff a piece of it, then throw the piece away from you.

In the dark he can't see where you tossed the tid-bit and will be compelled to use his nose to find it.
