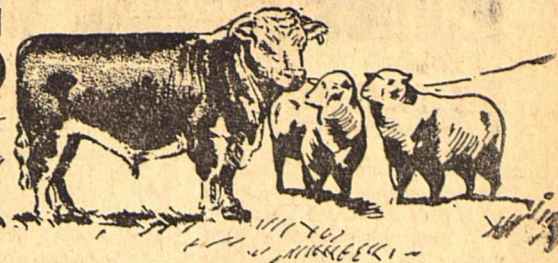

Mrs. J. D. Lowrey, 90, Sonora Resident For 63 Years Buried Here Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. J. D. Lowrey, 90, were held Tuesday afternoon, July 2, at the First Methodist Church here. The Rev. Doyle W. Morton of Beeville, former pastor of the church, officiated assisted by the Rev. Allen G. Roe. Mrs. Lowrey, a resident of Sonora for 63 years, died at her home here Monday morning, July 1, after an extended illness.

She was born Ellen Awalt April 4, 1873 at Round Rock. She attended San Marcos Normal and later taught school at Camp San Saba.

She and the late J. D. Lowrey were married in Mason County June 6, 1897 and moved to Sonora in 1900. They had made their home here since that time. Mr. Lowrey died March 22, 1962.

Mrs. Lowrey was a member of the First Methodist Church here for many years and held a Life Membership in the Women's Society of Christian Service. She was a Past Worthy Matron of the Order of the Eastern Star, Sonora Chapter, of which she was also a charter member and a Life Member.

Her survivors include a son, Grady Lowrey of Del Rio; two daughters, Mrs. R. C. Vicars of Sonora and Mrs. Mans Hoggett of Mertzon; five sisters, Mrs. L.

Mrs. H. G. Decker Dies In Houston After Long Illness

Funeral services for Mrs. Henry G. Decker, 60, were held at the First Methodist Church Sunday afternoon, June 30, with the Rev. Allen G. Roe, pastor, officiating assisted by the Rev. Arno H. Melz, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church. Mrs. Decker, a resident of Sonora for approximately 50 years died Saturday, June 29, at M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston where she had been treated for about three weeks.

She was born Gladys McClelland June 17, 1903 in Rannels County and moved to Sonora with her parents as a child. She was married to Henry G. Decker May 26, 1925 in Sonora.

She was members of the Methodist Church.

She was a member of the band; one son, Bill Decker of Stamford; one grandchild, Thad Decker; and two brothers, Ernest McClelland and John McClelland, both of Sonora. Another son, Johnny Mac Decker, died in 1933.

The Ladies' Golf Auxiliary will serve a barbecue supper at the end of play tonight with plates \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for children under 14.

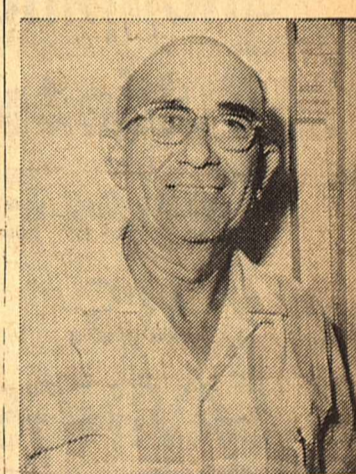
Golf balls will be awarded as prizes in the various flights.

County Remains Screwworm Free

No new cases of screwworms have been reported within the past two and a half weeks, according to County Agent D. C. Langford. Only three cases have been reported during the past month, those on the R. A. Halbert, Hensel Matthews and T Half-Circle ranches.

Incidents of screwworm infestation are down markedly from this time last year over the entire state, evidence of the growing success of the screwworm eradication program.

Langford reminds ranchers that any suspected cases of screwworms should be treated thoroughly, larvae specimens turned in to Pat Clifton at the Twin Oaks Motel, and livestock watched carefully and all wounds treated to prevent infestation.

Non-slip Scope Sight Ring Dust a little resin under the mounting rings of your scope sight to prevent that annoying

slip so often encountered when a heavy scope is used on a high-powered rifle.

Deer Savy

Buck tracks usually are more pointed than are does. They also more frequently leave dew claw indentations behind them.

These difference are not infallible.

To be sure of the size and sex of deer you trail, better check where spoor leads toward a low branch. If tracks pass under branch, the deer is a spike buck or doe. But if tracks turn aside before reaching branch, the deer is most likely an old buck, too canny to tangle antlers with low limbs.

Sighting-In Your Rifle

A good bench rest is almost a must for sighting in rifles for pre-season hunting. But benches seldom are available except at commercial ranges.

Fix your own rifle rest for use anywhere by using an ordinary folding ironing board.

The board is easily adjusted to the most convenient shooting height.

Burs on Clothes

Keep an old hacksaw blade handy in camp to remove cockle-burs from your hunting clothes when you come in from the field. It does a good job fast.

Hunting Without Dogs

It is possible to cover a field effectively without dogs when quail hunting.

Tie one end of a nylon clothes-line to your waist, the other end to your waist, the other end to your partner. Criss-cross field with line stretched between you, waist high. Birds hiding in between you will flush as the line passes over them.

Teach Dogs to Hunt By Nose

A young dog often refuses to use his nose when in training.

Take such a pup out at night and carry along a pocketful of his favorite tid-bits. Let him sniff a piece of it, then throw the piece away from you.

In the dark he can't see where you tossed the tid-bit and will be compelled to use his nose to find it.
