tomato soup, then heat to serve. Top with sliced frankfurters or

Since the 37-mile to the Martins. route was all on dirt roads, he had to change to a horse and buggy when it rained. Often during bad weather he would leave the roads and travel across pastures.

During his years of service he used 38 automobiles, but he never received a traffic ticket.

Martin recalled that he had carried just about everything that could be mailed including baby chickens, honey bees, and a couple of alligators. Once he even helped extinguish a fire.
