



Will Carelessness Cause Your Child's Death?

Your child inert and perhaps even lifeless, all because of carelessness on your part. It will never happen, one thinks, yet it did happen to 600,000 American children last year. Of this number 500 suffered the extreme consequences of poisoningdeath. Ninety percent were under five yars of age.

With these alarming statistics before us, it is time to stop and think. Congress has even taken a hand and by joint resolution approved September 26, 1961, requested the President to issue an annual proclamation designating the third week in March as National Poison Prevention Week.

These poisonings were in a variety of ways, but all were related to carelessness. One would not dare leave a loaded pistol within reach of a small child, yet medicines are often where they can be reached by inquisitive youngsters.
