An individual with enough nerve to try all the cigarette bumming he could get away with at such an occasion could probably secure enough cigarettes to open a tobacco shop. And certainly he would have ample varieties of cigarettes


The idea of postponing that smoke is forgotten and smokers are probably unaware themselves of whether they are or are not smoking during an exciting contest on the playing floor.

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# Man, That's SORGHUM



"I think it's good seed and I plan to plant more next year than I did this year." That's how Roy Dodson, who farms seven miles north of Bovina, feels about P. A. G. Hybrid Sorghum.

Dodson planted P. A. G. 515 June 8 after another variety failed to come up to a stand. Harvested last of October, yield was 6600 pounds per acre. "That was best yield I had this year," Dodson says, "but it was pre-watered and then watered three times and was only part of my crop to get more than two waterings." He fertilized with 100 pounds of ammonia.

Dodson also had another field of P. A. G. 515 which was planted earlier and had a good yield. It was cut with another variety and there was no way to determine the exact yield of the P. A. G.

Dodson is one of many farmers who have found it profitable to plant P.A.G. Hybrid Sorghums.





Last week we ran two recipes for stew in this column and promised you two more. These recipes were lifted from Marshall Formby's booklet "Good Texas Eatin'."

TEXAS SON-OF-A-GUN STEW To make stew for 6-8-10 people, the following ingredients should come from one calf. The stew will be better if from a calf still on its mother's milk. However, the ingredients can be purchased from a slaughter house.

All of the tongue from the calf (the tongue to be boiled for 30 minutes then scraped good. If you are not fond of tongue, use half of it or throw away as I do.)

til the last 30-45 minutes, as it does not take brains long to cook. Sweet breads also cook more quickly than the other in-

TEXAS CHILI 3 lbs. venison or heef 6 tablespoons chili powder 3 cloves garlic (minced)

6 tablespoons flour 3 table spoons chopped suet 2 small onions (chopped) 3 tablespoons salt

6 tablespoons fat I quart hot water Do not grind the meat, but cut in small chunks. Mix the

meat with garlic, flour and chili powder. In a deep pot, melt the suet and fat. Fry the onions antil tender, then add meat mixture. Cook for 20 minutes. Then add salt and gradually pour on the one quart of hot water. Then simmer for one hour or until the meat is tender.

If you haven't killed a deer this year, just use cheaper cuts of beef for this chili. If beef is used, forget about the suet. If you just have to ruin this good chili by adding beans, then add Mexican style beans with chili gravy.

#### Will Snug Shoes Stretch?

Shoes that are a trifle narrow may give enough to become comfortable. Shoe repairmen now have a chemical solution that helps stretch leather.

The need however is usually for added length since feet grow longer rather than wider. The chief obstacle to successfully stretching shoes lengthwise is a steel shank which is put in a shoe to strengthen the arch of the shoe (not the foot). A stretcher that would stretch the steel would pull the shoe apart.
