



To brighten up a dull afternoon, two men tied an oil can to a dog's tail and set the oil on fire. At the time it seemed hilarious. But the men did not laugh when they were hailed into court and found guilty of cruelty to animals.

Few of us today would quarrel with the court's ruling. Yet, until comparatively recent years, cruelty to animals was not a crime at all. The common law did protect the property rights of an animal's owner, but did not protect the animal itself. Thus:

Suppose A abused B's horse. B, having suffered an injury to his property, could collect damages from A. But suppose B abused his own horse. Or suppose the horse was a stray, with no owner to be concerned. Then the law kept silent. Nothing stayed the brutal

But if the common law did not condemn, common decency finally did. In a striking shift of public opinion, cruelty to animals-in itself-has now been branded every where as a crime.

Economics has nothing to do with it. When a man was fined for turning an old horse out to starve, the court spoke not of the dollar value of the horse but of the moral outrage to one of God's creatures.

True, we may still inflict harm on an animal for an honorable reason. Thus we may kill an animalhumanely-for food.

"Otherwise," a judge noted, "one could not slaughter a pig or ox for the market, and man could eat no more meat."

Futhermore, we may hit an animal in self defense. A man who struck a frenzied cat, which had a death grip on his hand, was held to have acted within the law.

Also we may chastise an animal as a matter of training-or perform surgery on it as a matter of health. Nor are cruelty laws carried to unreasonable extremes. Surely it is no crime to swat a fly or bait a hook with a worm.

What the law does denounce is conduct that affronts the modern conscience. One court put it this

"Animals whose lives are devoted to our use and pleasure deserve kindly treatment. The dominion of man over them, if not a moral trust, has a better significance than the development of malignant passions and cruel instincts. Human beings should be kind and just to dumb brutes, if for no other reason than to learn how to be kind and just to each other."

Golden Brown Tan Poses Hazards To Health of Skin

One skin specialist has predicted that suntanning some day will no longer be a status symbol and that people will quit baking their outer hides to a golden brown each sum-

Dermatologists have long known of the hazards of suntanning-premature aging of the skin and various freckles and blemishes.

But whatever the future brings, some Americans today still are suntanners, and thus doctors suggest that if you must tan, do it without burning.

Gradual tanning with a minimum of discomfort is possible for most people. Gradual exposure to the sun is the safest and simplest method of acquiring an attractive tan. As a general rule, begin with 15 minutes exposure the first day, and increase the time by a few minutes a day. The time of day is important, with the midday period, when the sun is directly overhead, being the hottest for burning purposes.

Continued tanning brings gradual changes in the blood vessels of the exposed surfaces. The connective tissue of the skin degenerates, causing wrinkles and a coarsening of texture. The "V" of the neck becomes permanently reddened and freckle-like dark spots appear on the skin. These spots can some-

times be the start of skin cancer.

Sun bleaches the hair, too, and over a period of time the sunbleached hair becomes brittle and unmanageable. However, the damaged hair will eventually grow out.

Physical benefits of tanning are almost nil. The only beneficial effect of sunlight, other than the psychological lift of sporting a good tan, is the formation of vitamin D, and the American diet already provides an ample supply.
