UNLESS THE TEAM gets to the national finals, you rarely ever hear of many of them, or of their coaches. More is the pity, as concerns Al McGuire, coach of the national champion (basketball) Marquette team.

Since his team did get into the final four, we began to see quite a lot of material on McGuire. Enough to realize that he is quite a character, in a time when our nation can use a real "character." It's too bad that McGuire had decided to retire, even before winning the national title.

McGuire has made a habit of taking a group of hand-picked ghetto fighters and winning over 20 games a year. It is said that at one time his players would celebrate victories by cutting down the basketball nets—with switchblade knives.

If you watched his team play during the final two weekends, you no doubt got to see a lot of McGuire's expressions that he puts on during a game. It would have been entertaining if the TV cameras could have stayed on his face for the entire game.

He expresses his opinion—on virtually every call by an official. But he is also a good sport, as evidenced by the time he called time out so the opposing player who had crashed into the crowd could be helped back onto the court, and made sure he was all right.

We didn't even know where Marquette University was located prior to the NCAA playoffs. We're still not too sure. But we enjoyed seeing and reading about their colorful coach.

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On the subject of sports, if you haven't seen the Bovina Fillies track team in action, you are missing a real treat.

The Fillies, you recall, placed second in last year's state track and field meet, being edged by just three points by Paducah, also of Region I. Like Bovina, it is said that the Paducah team returns all of its stars for 1977.

At the start of the season, Coach Joel Nelson decided that if he was to be in contention for a state meet title, he had to have a three relay team. Last year, the Fillies had only the mile and 440-yard relay teams. Relay victories count 20 points each, and that adds up faster than individual events.

His strategy is already paying off. The newly formed 880-yard relay team has won every time out. At Friona last week, Bovina's three relay teams scored an impressive sweep, good for 60 points, against a select field of some of the best girls teams in this area.

If you don't get to the out of town meets, Nelson is planning to bring one to Bovina on Thursday, April 7. Better get out and watch these girls. They are looking more and more like state meet material. And they're still out to improve last year's standing in state by one place.

## Polls Open Saturday For City And School

Bovina voters will go to the polls on Saturday, April 2, to designate their choices for school and city officers. Voting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., with city election held at American Legion Hall on Third Street, and school voting in the foyer of the main school building.

Seven candidates are on each

ballot, vying for two positions on the city council and three vacancies on the school board.

The school tax assessor-collector's office and city hall reported at 11 a.m. on Tuesday that 17 absentee ballots had been cast in the school board election and 10 for city council

candidates. The deadline for absentee voting was 5 p.m. Tuesday.

Elsewhere in this issue of The Blade is a report of an "open meeting" with some of the potential school trustees and a brief resume of each of the seven nominees for the city council.

## School Candidates Featured In Forum

The Bovina Parent-Teacher Organization sponsored an "open meeting" Friday night, March 25, to give interested voters an opportunity to question school board candidates and allow all present to air their views.

Four of the seven nominees, Tom Ware, Dale Berggren, Don Spring and Lawrence Kriegel, were present, and, to a small group of parents and teachers, each gave a generalized statement on why he is running for the board.

Ware said he wants to continue working for a more improved educational system, noting that he has children in school and he attends at least 75 per cent of all school activities. He spoke about complaints about the high school heating system and vowed that he will be accessible to all who want to talk to him.

Spring desires closer cooperation between the schools and community and feels there is not enough interest in education. He wants to see young people play an active part in civic activities and will strive to make decisions that are good for the students.

Berggren sees a crucial need for higher education in a complex world. According to him, students need a better chance for a good education and he wants to help accomplish that objective.

Kriegel promised he will try to do a good job, whatever might come up,

and take positive action for the welfare of the students. He mentioned the agriculture department has grown, and is certain other departments can do likewise.

In a give-and-take session, one parent stated that an expanded vocational program is a must for those not going on to college, and asked about the possibility of such an expansion.

A number of answers were given. Home economics and agriculture are about the only vocations taught in Bovina schools. The school is too small to have much else. A diversified program would be expensive. Group county effort is necessary for effective action. Expenses have to be justified. Local taxes and, to some extent, state funds, are the only sources of revenue.

Concerning the amount of time board members will be able to give to school problems and functions, the answers varied.

Ware is positive he can give all the time that is required and went on to say better communications is a must on all levels, with a closer rapport between the schools and The Bovina Blade. He believes all meetings of the school board should be publicized, including date, time of meeting and the agenda.

Spring stated he will have the time for local activities, but is doubtful about out-of-town meetings.

Berggren echoed Spring on this question.

Kriegel feels that if the job is important enough to run for, it is important enough to do the job right in the matter of time expended.

The candidate agreed that the PTO is good for all concerned and there was debate on the issue of how many grade levels should be included in the organization.

During a discussion concerning emphasis on sports versus educational curriculum, a little-known fact was brought out. The recent spelling bee contests stirred little student interest, with only one representative from junior high and nine from the lower grades.

As to questions or complaints from parents, high school teachers are available each school day from 8 to 9 a.m. and appointments can be made for those who are unable to be at the school in the morning.

Can a complainant talk to the school board?

Ware wants the board to cooperate with the PTO and individuals and the other aspirants concurred in general.

Rules and regulations took up a share of the meeting, with Ware stating they should be plain, simple, cover not only school conduct, but all school activities and be accessible to students and parents alike.

Again, there was general agreement among the candidates.

Stanley Klimek, before the session ended, expressed the appreciation of all present for the cooperation of the four nominees who had made themselves available.

The primary theme throughout the discussions appeared to be that better communications at all levels is absolutely imperative.

## Sam Aldridge's Services Held

Services for Sam L. Aldridge, 69, former Farwell mayor and attorney for Parmer County, were held Monday in Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell with the Rev. W.T. Perry, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home. Aldridge, 69, of Farwell, died at 8:45 a.m. Friday in Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona after a long illness.

Aldridge was born December 15, 1907 in Parmer County. He received his law degree in 1933 from the University of Texas. He opened his practice in Farwell with his brother, John Aldridge, who died in 1968. He continued his practice until Tuesday of last week.

The lifetime Parmer County resident served as the county attorney from 1946-1954. He was appointed by Gov. Allen Shivers as a member of the Texas Department of Public Safety from 1952-1956. He also served several terms as mayor in Farwell.

He was a member of Delta Theta Phi law fraternity, and was an active attorney in state and federal courts. He was elected as a life fellow of the Texas Bar Association in 1976, and was elected as "General Practitioner of the Year" of the State Bar Association in 1970.

He served with the FBI in World War II. He was a graduate of Farwell High School and New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, N.M.

Survivors include his wife, Dollie; two daughters, Pat Cramer of Pallas Bends Estate, Calif., and Jean Ann Wilkens of Farwell; a son, Bob Hart of Allen; and eleven grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Bob Finney, Tom Lovelace, Jesse F. Landrum, Charles F. Aycock, Johnny Atkinson, Hurschel R. Harding, Jim Berry and John Lee. Honorary pallbearers were a number of old and dear friends.

The family asked that memorial contributions be made to Parmer County Community Hospital in Aldridge's name.

Following is a brief resume of each candidate for election to the city council. The election is scheduled for Saturday.

**KEN HORN**—Incumbent councilman, has served on the council for past two years. He moved with his family to Bovina in 1954; is a veteran

of Vietnam; an independent insurance agent; past president, Bovina Jaycees; past state vice president, Texas Jaycees; vice president, local Chamber of Commerce; member, First Baptist Church; sponsor and coach of Little League; member, Bovina Booster Club; graduate, BHS; past president, BHS Ex-Student Association. Horn is married and the father of one child.

**RADFORD VENABLE**—Bovina native; a member of the V.F.D. and the local Jaycees; graduate, BHS; operates a 24-hour wrecker service and has been in business for himself for the past two years. Venable believes it is necessary to have a physical cleanup of Bovina; an effort should be made to pave all streets, and a sustained drive to attract new industry and business to the city is mandatory.

**JIM CAREY**—Owner-operator of Bovina Restaurant; born in Thompson, Ga. and came West in 1955; spent eight years in service, discharged with rank of master sergeant; veteran of Korea; is married, with two sons, one married, one in college; has been in restaurant business most of working life, with the exception of service time; member, First Baptist Church. Carey feels all citizens should work toward bettering the city and said he will do the best he can for Bovina, if elected.

**NORMA WHITTEN**—A native of Pampa, she came to Bovina in 1966, is a member of Bovina Woman's Study Club, the United Methodist

Parmer County's agency Center" (a misnomer), has been renamed "Parmer County Community Services Center at Bovina" at their regular monthly meeting

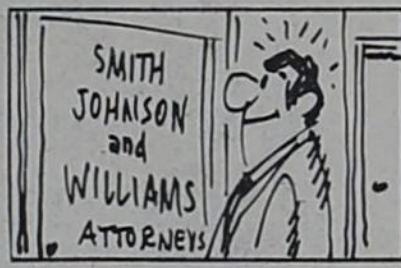
