

TEACHING MACHINES: BEWARE!

Nobody but educators may be interested in buying a new book, Programmed Teaching, published recently by the Philosophical Library, Inc. of New York. But one chapter in the book provides a nice insight into the so-called educational marvelteaching machines.

The controversial machines, says the chapter's author, Robert B. Nordberg of Marquette University, have "six dangers and one advantage." His comments should be interesting to everyone who thinks that automated teaching devices can replace the teacher.

Says Nordberg of teaching machines' dangers-Teaching machines cannot think. They can only say what they are told to say. They cannot create or receive ideas. Stated plainly, only a qualified teacher can truly guide a child's thinking processes.

Machines cannot paraphrase. If a child does not understand a statement the machine has been programmed to express, the machine will not be able to repeatedly re-phrase the statement until the child can comprehend the real meaning.

Machines cannot encourage a child to be creative. In fact, warns Nordberg, machines may result in dulling any creativity a child may have. Thus, machines lack ability for meaningful teaching. Machines are dangerous also because they en-

He admits that the one advantage that he cites, however, weighs heavily in favor of the contraptions. Machines can help greatly in teaching rotelearned facts which do not have to be absorbed within the framework of some rationale. For an example, machines might help drill a student in multiplication tables. But they would be incapable of making sense out of an isolated step required to solve an involved algebraic equation. In simple drills the machines will permit a child to go as fast or as slow as he wants in learning simple, cut and dried facts.

The sometimes-expressed fear that teachers had better watch out lest machines take control is not the point in considering the use of these classroom robots, asserts Nordberg. The danger, he says, is that if teaching machines are used too much, teachers may come to approach human learners as if they were robots.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading "Section 63

"(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivi-sions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an elec-tion to be held within the po-litical subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may

require.

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,-000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the per-formance of functions of government.

development of their community. A local **attorney** should prepare the application for the charter and by-

laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The **local bankers'** support

non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other

towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist

industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.





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
