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

Pamper Your Budget Make a rib-sticking omelet after the manner of the Chinese by using 2 cups of cooked rice with 1 cup of grated cheese and 3 eggs. Seasonings include salt, pepper, paprika and dry mus-

What about a thick soup like bean chowder, cream of corn soup or an oxtail and vegetable variety? Served with thick slices of homebaked bread and butter and fruit, this gives an economical meal.

Stuff vegetables with meat and rice mixtures, using leftover roast. Moisten with tomato soup, sparked with herbs. Good vegetables for stuffing include; green

peppers, eggplant and tomatoes. Food budget stretching wouldn't be complete without chili con carne (canned or homemade) in a skillet covered with cornbread batter and baked, then inverted to serve as an upside down cake.

There's old-fashioned heartiness in baked beans served with frankfurters cut diagonally into 1-inch pieces. Add to beans just to let them heat through. Lasagna's hearty, too. Make

Teens, Automobiles and Grades

A great deal of research has been done in probing the impact of the mobility the automobile is giving youngsters in high school. Much of the research has come from sources concerned primarily with accident statistics rather than the impact teenage driving has had in other areas of the teenagers development.

Statistics compiled by Allstate Insurance Company point out that parents are allowing the automobile to become the No. 1 standard for social acceptance for their children. According to their findings this attitude have proved harmful in the child's development.

Aside from the accident statistics that state that two out of every five teenagers are involved in accidents each year, other problems are jeopardizing the future of the teenage driver.

The accident problem is one matter; another problem is not as readily identifiable. This problem concerns the detrimental effect the automobile has on high school grades. Allstate found that students who had driver's licenses made poorer grades that those who did not. Worse still, are the grades of students allowed to drive the family car to school. The grades of students who own their own cars were worst of all. Statistics indicate that 29 percent of all the "F" students are car-owners.

The worst mistake a parent can make is to let his youngster work toward buying a car. This goal can divert his interests to the extent his school work suffers. The Allstate study showed that the "job-auto" combination is disastrous. Only 18 percent of these students get "B's" or better as compared to 35 percent in the "no car-no job"
