**THE NEWEST THREAT** to our American way of life is the metric system.

We know that most of you have by now heard at least a little about the proposal to change our American system of weights and measurements to the metric system, which is currently in vogue in Europe.

Frankly, we have seen few systems developed in Europe that it would benefit our nation to adopt, but our congress is rushing pell-mell into the conversion to metric, and unless they do an about-face, the metric system will be the next millstone to be draped over an unsuspecting public's neck.

Why should America—the nation who first landed men on the moon—be told that its systems of weights and measurements are antiquated?

Charles Lindbergh would undoubtedly turn over in his grave if he were to realize that some of his own countrymen were at this moment suggesting that he might have been better prepared to make his historic first crossing of the Atlantic Ocean by airplane if he could have figured his fuel requirements, aerodynamics, time, etc., by the metric system.

We know that some of you are going to say, "Why we didn't know that Bill was an old fogey. Everyone knows that the metric system is the simplest in the world, and that it converts our complicated system of pounds, ounces, feet, inches, miles, and degrees into a standardized system."

Well, maybe we are a bit of an old fogey, but we can't see why our government and its agencies should spend all of the money they plan to spend simply to convert miles into kilometers.

Just the other day we heard that it would cost the government (which means you and me, baby) something like 80 billion dollars to make the necessary changes on everything from road signs and maps to untold millions of books and pamphlets.

We are of the opinion that the 80 billion could be invested in a number of ways that would better serve our nation. Put it into energy research. Spend half of it to determine if we really do have an energy crisis. That would be better spent than printing volumes to inform us that 32 degrees Fahrenheit equals zero degrees Celsius. It's just as cold, either way.

In December of 1975, Congress went on record supporting the conversion to the metric system. It did not impose a deadline for the conversion for citizens and businesses, but indicated that agencies of the government will be required to make the conversion.

That is why we fear an avalanche of spending that won't move our nation a bit closer to perfection, if that is what they think the metric system is.

From what we read and hear, the system was not necessarily a cure-all in Europe.

So far, the fact that we still deal in such outdated terms as pounds and gallons has not necessarily hindered our nation's trade with other countries, and this is about the only valid reason for changing that has been advanced.

We feel about switching to the metric system the same way we have felt about the possibility of having to teach in two or more languages, and printing ballots and legal notices in more than one language.

Our nation has its universal language and system of weights and measures. If anyone wants to live here, it should behoove that individual to learn the language, along with our other customs.

## BETTY McCORMICK KILLED

# Former Bovina Man Faces Murder Charge

Robert McCormick, 46, a Lubbock resident, formerly of Bovina, is to face charges of first degree murder in the shooting death of his ex-wife, Betty Sue McCormick, of Bovina, last Thursday afternoon in the foyer just inside the Levi Strauss plant on the east side of Clovis, where she

was employed. McCormick was arrested by the Clovis police after he allegedly shot Ms. McCormick and another woman as they were preparing to leave the plant at approximately 3:30 p.m. Betty McCormick, 42, died in

Clovis Memorial Hospital at about 5 p.m. Thursday of gunshot wounds in the head and upper chest. Another Bovina resident, Judy Page, 39, suffering superficial wounds, was released from the hospital on Friday morning.

Also on Friday morning, District Attorney Bill Bonem said his office had authorized filing of first degree murder charges in Magistrate Court against McCormick. He further explained that, because of the acts charged, the maximum penalty that can be imposed is life imprisonment.

Police reported that McCormick drove to Levi Strauss with a .22 caliber hand gun at about 3:30 p.m. and waited at the front door for the two women to emerge from the plant.

## Griffin Named Bovina's New SWPS Mgr.

Eugene Griffin has been named the new manager for Southwestern Public Service Company in Bovina. The announcement was made by Jake Webb, SPS district manager in Hereford, and will become effective July 1.

Griffin replaces George Powell who has been transferred to Panhandle where he will manage SPS's properties.

Griffin is a native of Haskell, Texas, and a graduate of Amherst High School. He started his career with Southwestern Public Service as an apprentice lineman in 1962 in Amarillo. He was transferred to Muleshoe two years later as a 4th year apprentice and in 1966 became a journeyman lineman. He later worked in Littlefield and is presently serving as serviceman in Olton.

Griffin and his wife, Molly, are the parents of three children, two daughters, Carol, 16, Fonda, 14, and a son, Allan, 7. The family plans to move to Bovina.

two shots at Ms. Page as she ran away from the door and around the building. He then, reportedly, turned his attention to Ms. McCormick and cornered her in the foyer just inside the plant.

Assistant Plant Manager Al Shamblin explained that he saw McCormick shoot Ms. McCormick twice, once in the head and once just below the collarbone. The assailant then, apparently, went to the back of the plant, where employees had already locked the doors, and then he came back to the front of the building.

He stayed near the center of the parking lot as Officers Joe Thomas and Daryl Rice arrived. Officer Thomas said McCormick was holding the gun by its barrel when they approached and he dropped it when they ordered him to do so. Officer Rice then handcuffed him.

McCormick was transported to Clovis Police Department where he reportedly suffered an epileptic seizure. Admitted to Clovis Memorial Hospital under guard, hospital officials, as of Friday morning, said his condition was good.

The head mechanic at the plant, Wayne Morgan, said he began applying pressure to Ms. McCormick's wounds, but could find no pulse.

Clovis police noted that McCormick had tried to run his ex-wife off of a road earlier on Thursday and, also, he allegedly has a history of violence with the Bovina police. In addition, it was reported, Ms. McCormick filed a number of complaints against her ex-husband on grounds of intended violence against her.

Police also added they received reports from a Clovis bar where McCormick was drinking, about 30 minutes before the shooting. A witness at the bar said McCormick made comments to the effect that his wife had only 35 minutes to live.

Plant Manager Ben Donathan said McCormick visited the plant three weeks prior to the shooting to ask him to fire his ex-wife. Donathan said he had refused to do so.

## Rites Held For Betty McCormick

Funeral services for Ms. Betty Sue McCormick of Bovina, were held this past Monday afternoon in the First Baptist Church at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Derrel Lewis, pastor of the Bovina Church, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Billy Etheridge, minister of youth of the Calvary Baptist Church, Friona.

Ms. McCormick was fatally wounded last Thursday afternoon in the foyer just inside the Levi Strauss plant on the east side of Clovis. She had been employed by the company for the past three years.

The Clovis plant was closed last Friday so that all of her associates could pay proper tribute to her.

Born January 23, 1935 in Thornton, Ark., Ms. McCormick had resided in Bovina 23 years and was a member of the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

She is survived by two daughters, Pamela and Denise, Bovina; two sons, Jeff, Friona, and Gary, Lubbock; her father, Charles Easterling, Freda, Ark.; two sisters, Mrs. Della Yarberry, Wichita, Kansas; Mrs. Mary Ella Webb, Ferda, Ark.; two brothers, Edd Easterling, Liberty, Texas; Jarrell Easterling, Freeport, Texas, and three grandchildren.

A page of the "In Remembrance" pamphlet, distributed at the services, contained the following:

"God hath not promised Skies always blue, Flower-strewn pathways All our lives through; God hath not promised Sun without rain, Joy without sorrow, Peace without pain. "But God hath promised Strength for the day, Rest for the labor, Light for the way, Grace for the trials, Help from above, Unfailing sympathy, Undying love..."

Pallbearers were Edward Terry, Ken Horn, Kent Stanberry, Lowell Boozer, Dickey Clayton and Richard Morris.

Honorary pallbearers were Alvo Kersey, Weldon Crim, Jim Russell, Wayne Spears, Charles Gilbreath and Henry Spicer.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Singleton-Ellis Funeral Directors, Muleshoe, Texas.

## ASCS To Register Beef Producers

"The Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office will register beef producers June 6-17 to vote on the beef research and information order," said Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director. Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum.

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 68 beef producers, from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or

by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produced beef during calendar 1976 are eligible to register. This includes feedlot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity—such as family, partnership, or corporation—is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she produced beef independent of the family operation.

From June 6-17, the ASCS county office will daily post a list of producers registered to vote in a conspicuous place. A final list will be posted June 22. Anyone may challenge the eligibility of any producer listed.

# The Beef Referendum: What Is It? Facts Given

The Beef Referendum. What is it? There has been an lot of publicity lately on the proposed Beef Research and Information Plan that will be voted on in early July. Here are some facts about what the program is and who is eligible to vote.

The program is designed to allow the establishment of projects for advertising, promotion, education, supplying of producer and consumer information with respect to use of cattle, beef and beef products.

Similarly, the program would allow for the establishment and conducting of research, market development projects and studies with respect to production, growing, sale, processing and distribution, marketing or utilization of cattle, beef and beef products.

The program also would include development and expansion of foreign markets.

It will be financed, administered and controlled by cattle producers. If passed, the national Beef Board will be organized with 68 representatives from across the country. Based on cattle numbers, Texas will have seven producers on the Board. This Board will determine what needs to be done and who will carry out the needed program.

Every producer will pay his fair share. Whenever cattle are sold, three tenths of one per cent of the sale price will be set aside--to be collected ultimately at the point of slaughter. If someone doesn't want to participate in the collection

program, he can request, and receive, a refund on his contribution.

More than 90 cattle producer groups have officially endorsed this "Beef Research and Information Act". These groups represent cattle breeders, calf producers, stocker operators and feeders.

Producers eligible to register and vote are those who owned cattle during the past 12 months, prior to the referendum, including 4-H and FFA members, men and women. There is no age limit or minimum requirement of numbers of cattle owned in order to qualify to vote. Any questions about bonafide ownership can be resolved by tax records, sales slips, registration papers or any other valid papers showing ownership of livestock.

A partnership, cooperative, corporation or similar business is considered as only a single entity for the purpose of voting in the referendum. Where a husband and wife own cattle jointly, this will be considered a single entity and only one may vote. If each owns cattle separately and has documented proof of ownership, this is considered as two entities and each may vote.

In the event that a person owns cattle in a county other than where he lives, or if he cannot make it to the polls during the registration of voting period, it will be possible to write or telephone the county ASCS office for an absentee ballot.

Eligible producers should contact the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office to receive a registration form. The

county ASCS office will conduct registering and the referendum.

The registration period is June 6-17. The voting period is July 5-15.

At least 50 per cent of the cattle owners who register must vote--and two-thirds must vote affirmatively--in order for the referendum to be valid.

If the program becomes operational, the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA would monitor it, or serve in effect as a referee, to assure that it stays within the legislative authority and accomplishes the goals of the program as voted on by producers in the referendum. Should producers approve the program, the initial board meeting might be held in the late fall of 1977.

Thus, it likely would be 1978 before a research and information program for cattle and beef could be fully developed and first assessments begin on sales of cattle.

## ---Letters To The Editor---

To The Editor:  
Within a matter of days, July 5-15, every cattle producer in the United States will have a chance to determine the future of the beef industry. On these dates, we cattlemen will be voting on whether or not we want a national program on beef education, research, promotion and market development.

I personally will vote "YES" on this national Beef

Referendum--authorized by Congress last year. Why? I've got several good reasons:

(1) It's needed. The cattle industry has lost millions of dollars during the past three years. We need an aggressive program to promote our product and to work for better markets.

(2) It will be financed, administered and controlled by cattle producers. If passed, the national Beef

Board will be organized with 68 representatives from across the country. Based on cattle numbers, Texas will have seven producers on the Board. This Board will determine what needs to be done and who should be contracted with to carry out the needed program.

(3) It's fair. Every producer will pay his fair share. Whenever cattle are sold, 3-10's of one per cent of the sale price will be set

aside--to be collected ultimately at the point of slaughter. If someone doesn't want to participate in the collection program, he can request, and receive, a refund of his contribution.

(4) It's accepted. More than 90 cattle producer groups have officially endorsed this "Beef Research and Information Act." These groups represent cattle breeders, calf producers, stocker operators and feeders. They have worked hard to get this program before us and they

agree it's the best solution to our problems.

(5) It will benefit Parmer County. We are the second largest fed cattle county in Texas, with a capacity of 250,000 head. At the present time we are between 50 and 60 per cent capacity. With corn being used as the major grain in most rations, the more cattle on feed means more corn consumed, which would ultimately mean a higher price for corn at the elevator. I urge every cattle producer--that includes dairymen--to register at your county ASCS office June 6-17 and then vote "YES" in the Beef Referendum. It's up to us.

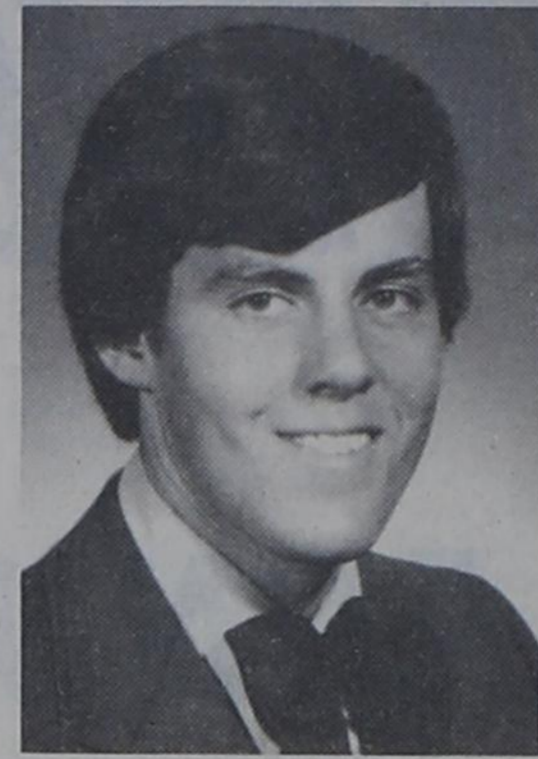
## Dan Nelson Earns Outstanding Award

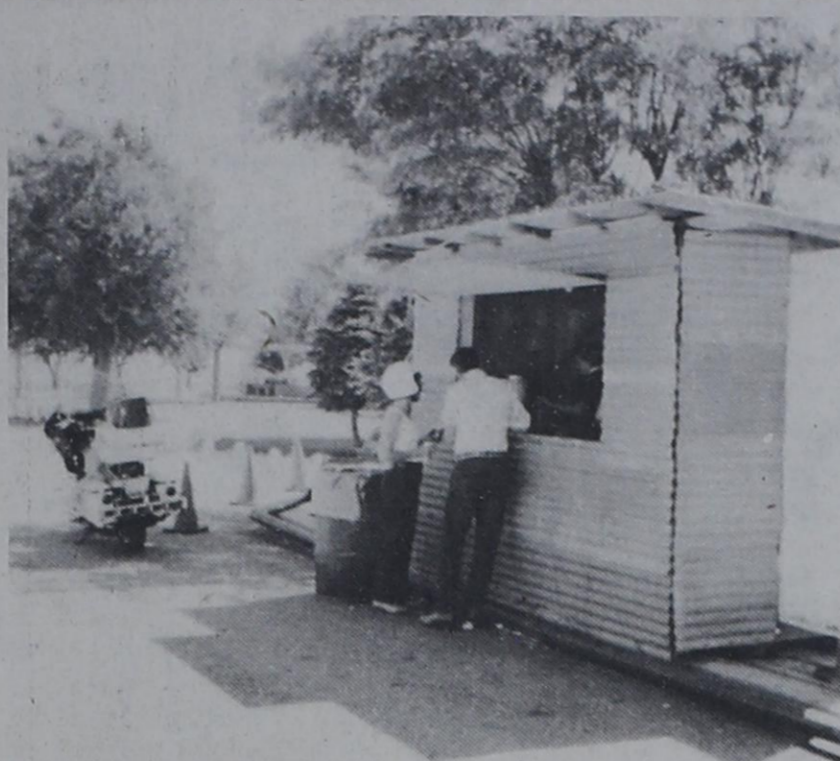
## Jaycees Set Campaign

The Jaycees are encouraging everyone to take advantage of this opportunity to clean-up their property and have the refuse moved at no charge. Almost any type of

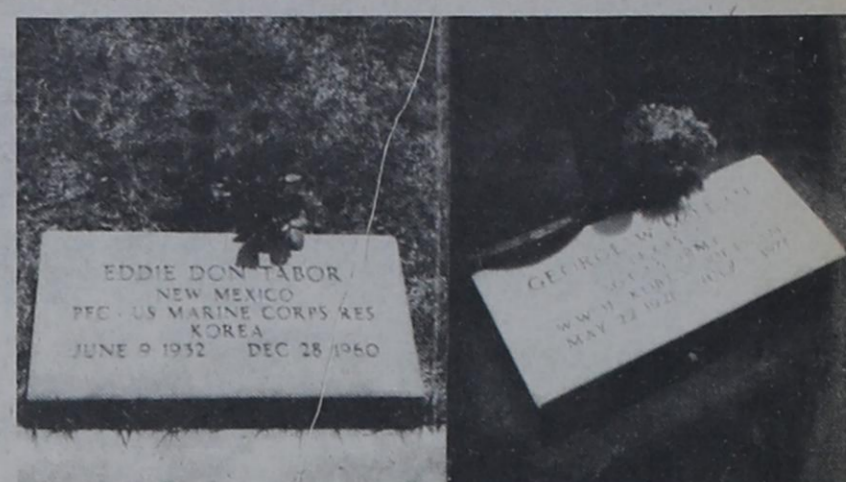
refuse will be hauled off, including junked vehicles. Details will be forthcoming as to how arrangements may be made to have these items picked up.

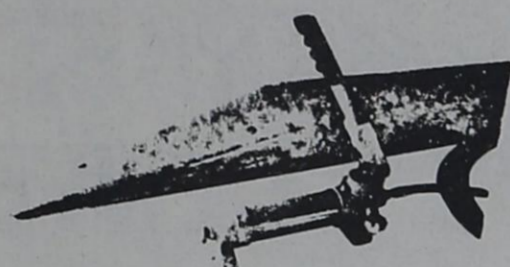

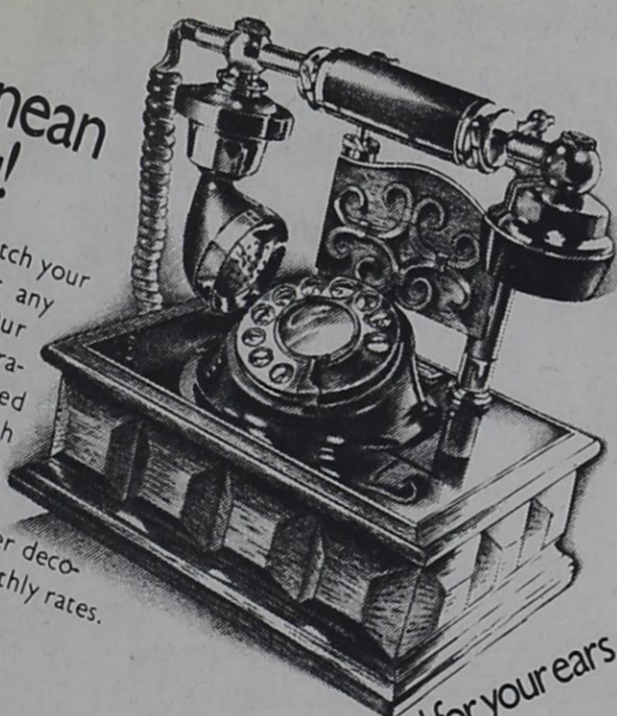

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
