This test seems to indicate vitamin A does play an important part in calving, although research results with vitamin A vary.

The dietary source of vitamin A is carotene, which comes from green vegetation. In dry years such as this one, or in dry regions, mother cows may be deprived of green vegetation for several months before the calf is born. This causes two conditions:

1. The vitamin A supply of the mother cow may be depleted, thus limiting her reproductive performance.

2. A limited supply of vitamin A in the newly born calf. This is worsened by the fact that there will be little vitamin A in the cow's milk since her supply of the vitamin is low.
