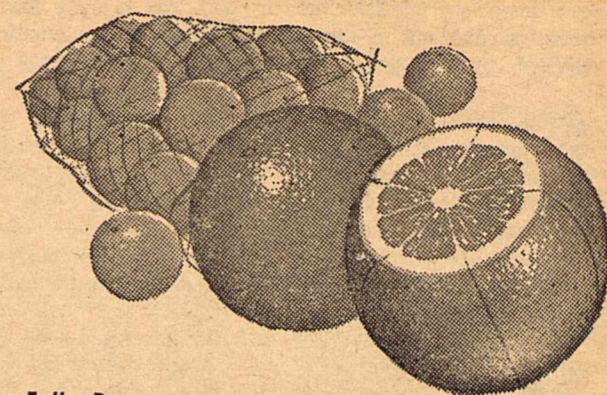

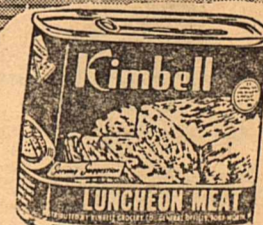

A Parson's Eye View of Sonora

 You have often heard it said to a rancher who complained that it had not rained sufficiently to suit him, "You ought to pay the preacher." Only the church treasurer pays the preacher any more—and, sometimes, the groom at a wedding—and that is the way it should be.
 Our treasurer's report indicates that the offering in the Methodist Church was up Sunday; but regarding its relation to the rain that fell Sunday—we do not know whether it was cause or effect.

Animal Health Bill
Introduced in House
 The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association is backing an animal health bill introduced in the Texas Legislature by Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo and Rep. Tom Holmes of Granbury.
 The bill would allow the Texas Animal Health Commission to permit importation of sheep from scabies-free states into Texas with only an inspection and proper certificate.
 Present Texas law requires dipping of all non-slaughter sheep coming into Texas, whether from a scabies-free state or not.
 A hearing was held in Austin Thursday, February 16, before the livestock and stock raising committee of the House, said Rep. Holmes.
 This bill would liberalize entry of sheep from scabies-free states and extend to those states the courtesy most of them already extend to Texas. Few states require dipping of Texas sheep.
 The bill also would close a loophole which has permitted importation of slaughter sheep without inspection but has not provided a follow-up to insure that they actually went to slaughter and not to the range.

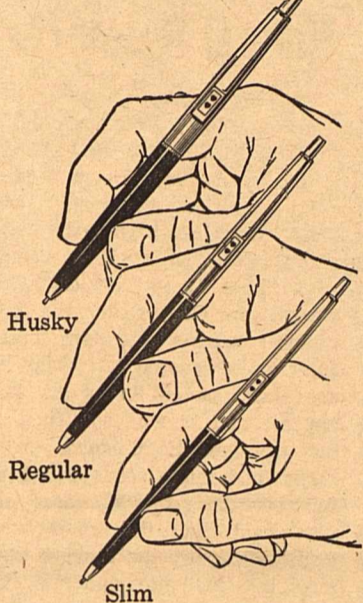

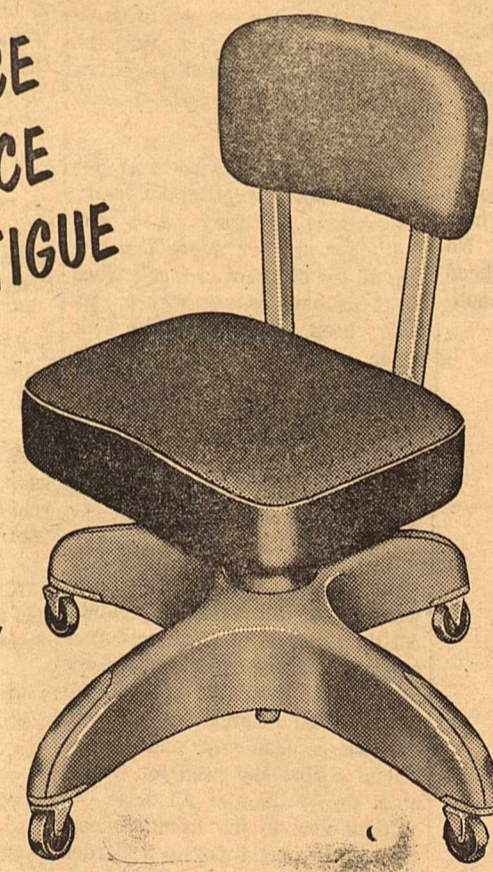

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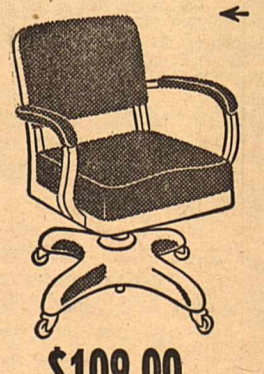

1040 U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q— Are you going to put a table showing what my 1966 tax should be when the 6 percent surcharge is added in?

A— The 6 percent tax surcharge proposed by the President does not affect 1966 income tax returns. Therefore, the tax tables and schedules in the 1040 instructions need

not be changed for this year's returns.

Q— I'm over 65 and I've heard that starting this year my medical expenses will not be fully deductible. Does that affect my 1966 return?

A— No, it does not. Allowable medical expenses for taxpayers 65 and over will be fully deductible on 1966 returns. The change will come next year when you file a return on 1967 income. Then the medical expenses of older taxpayers will be treated the same as those of taxpayers under 65.

Q— My wife is visiting her mother for a few weeks. Can I file our return without her signature as most of our income is from my salary?

A— No, your wife's signature is required as well as yours on a joint return. Failure to have her sign the return will hold up processing and any refund due.

Q— I was off the job for about 2 months last year because of illness. Doesn't some of the pay I received during this period qualify for the sick pay exclusion?

A— Yes, it very well might. There are two rules governing when and how much sick pay may be excluded from income for federal tax purposes.

First, if the amount you received as sick pay is more than 75 percent of your weekly rate of pay, there is a 30 day waiting period before you are entitled to a sick-pay exclusion.

If the amount you receive is 75 percent or less, the waiting period is 7 days unless you are hospitalized for at least one day during your absence from work. In that event, there is no waiting period.

The exclusion under both rules is limited to \$75.00 per week for the part of the first 30-day period in which you are entitled to the exclusion. After that, it becomes \$100.00 per week.

Q— Where should I list the all-monomy income I receive?

A— Use line 7 on page 2 of Form 1040. Prizes and awards, state tax refunds and other miscellaneous items should be entered here.

Q— My wife and I are filing a joint return and the Social Security withheld from both our salaries exceeds the maximum. Can we take a credit for this?

A— The maximum applies to the Social Security tax withheld from each taxpayer. Only the amounts in excess of \$277.20 withheld from your salary, or your wife's, may be claimed as a credit against income tax liability.

Q— I just completed my return and sent it in. What records should I keep in case I'm audited?

A— Keep whatever you need to substantiate the income and deductions on your return. Cancelled checks, paid bills, Forms W-2 and 1099, bank books and similar records will be helpful.

Q— My salary was about \$6,000 last year and my wife earned about \$1,500 doing part-time office work. Which return would be the best for us to file—a joint return or separate returns?

A— Based on income alone, your question is impossible to answer. The deductible expenses each of you have are the determining factors.

Generally, joint returns are more advantageous for married couples. Compute your tax both ways and then file the return that results in the lower tax.

Q— Can I use my 1966 income as the basis for a declaration of estimated tax?

A— Yes, this is one of the methods that may be used in filing a declaration of estimated tax. You may also use your 1966 tax or an actual estimate of 1967 income as the basis for filing estimated tax declarations.

Q— How do I figure my state gas tax deduction?

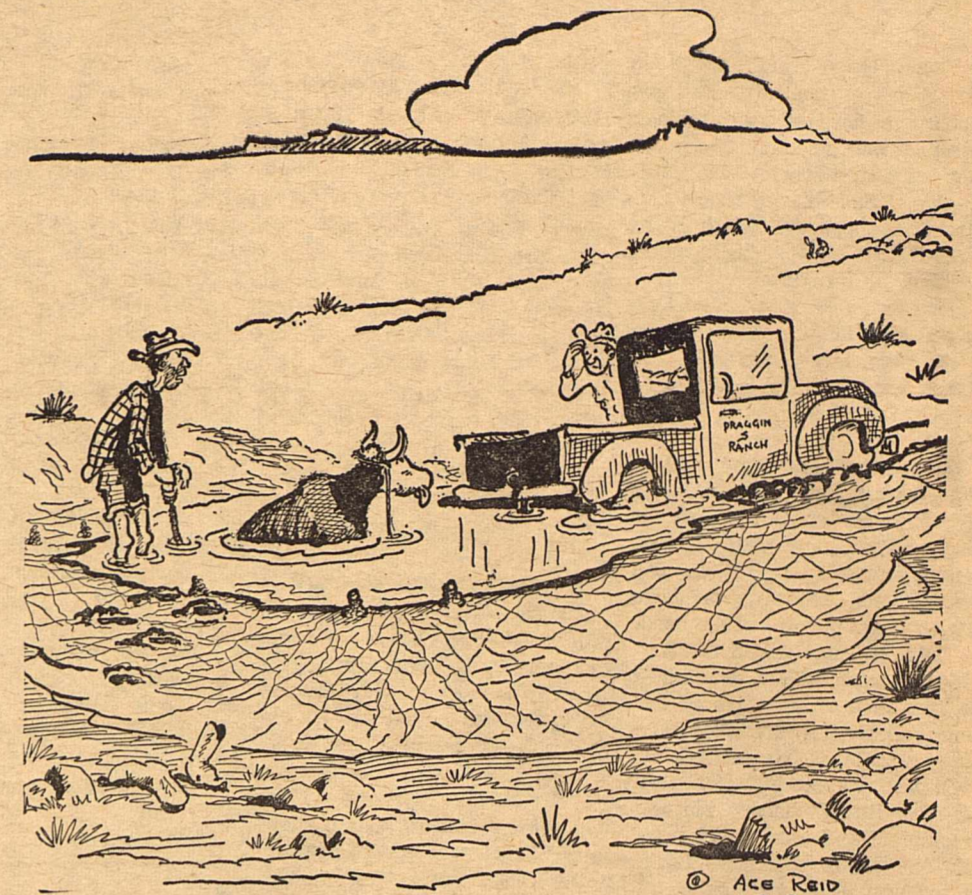
A— Page 9 of the 1040 instruction booklet contains a table that may be used to figure this deduction.

Q— I had a capital loss in 1966. Can I carry it over to next year if I don't use all of it this year?

A— Yes. Capital losses can be carried over indefinitely until they are absorbed. The loss when carried over retains its original character so that if it was a long term loss it remains a long term loss while a short term loss remains a short term loss.

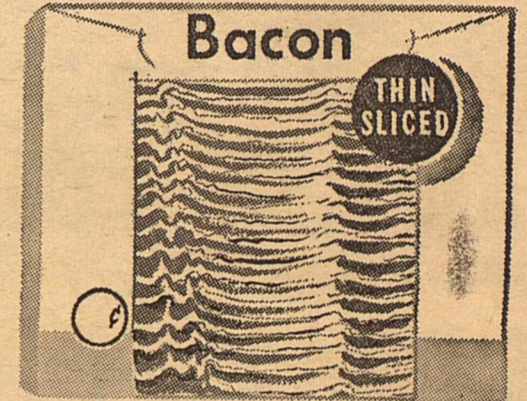
