... sometimes even the hardiest surf fishermen want to cast beyond the surf without getting their feet wet. This time comes to all of us when the air and the water temperature both are too

Ability to fire that lure or bait far beyond the seaward breakers rests not in the physical build of the fisherman but in the build of

In good surf casting all the work of whipping out the lure is done by the rod. Like the little motor that starts your car engine the fisherman merely puts the casting act

Before the advent of glass rods, true surf rods were frequently seen in use along the Texas coast. Just about every rod was made from a calcutta pole and ranged in length from nine to 12 feet.

These calcutta rods had a lot of whip. Unfortunately, however, they had a bad tendency to take a set. INSIDE AND OUT And even the most beautifully wrapped calcutta was never a rod of true beauty in appearance.

Attractive glass rods simply knocked calcutta into oblivion.

Except for fly-fishing, most glass rods were five to seven feet in length. They were ideally suited for general bay, pier and boat fishing. But not for surf castingwhere a combination of a whippy a long cast.

Fortunately, rod makers again are catching up with the specialized needs of fishermen today. A number of reputable companies now make good surf rods - glass ones ranging from nine to 13 feet in length.

Conventional free-spool reels will cast nicely with a surf rod. But the casts will not be as long as those with the open-face salt-water spinning reel

One-piece rods are great except for the problem of hauling around. If you buy one of these longies the best thing to do is to have some rubber rod-holders attached to the roof of your car. Then carry the long rod on top where it's less likely to be broken. One thing for sure, it's dangerous to drive around with one of these long rods sticking out a car win-

Two-piece surf rods solve the portage problem. They can be broken down to fit nicely inside the car. But, remember, the two-piece rod isn't without its drawbacks. It doesn't have as much springlike action. And you have those metal ferrules to consider. They take a beating from the salt water.

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


