He was born in Cedar Gap, January 5, 1873, and made his first visit to Sonora in 1887. He had said that on that first visit, Sonora was just a tent city with only



'Only those employees in occupations in which they are principally engaged in such surveillance on the range, as defined, are included in the exemption. The primary duty and responsibility of such a range employee must be to take care of the animals actively or to stand by in readiness for that purpose. "An employee who is principally

engaged in range production will remain within the exemption even though he engages in such activities as fence maintenance or transportation as part of his duties. On the other hand, there is no basis for exemption. . .for an employee who is employed at the headquarters ranch in activities connected with range production, if he is not principally engaged on the range in range production activities which require constant attendance on the animals on a


