

Awards will be made to Murphy and Wright at a DeKalb banquet which will be scheduled later, Hammonds says.





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

JURY NEVER GETS CHANCE

A 35-member jury panel was summoned twice last week for a couple of Parmer County District Court cases but never got a chance to hear either of

The jury was dismissed by Judge E. A. Bills Thursday after the counsel for the defendant, in a case styled the State of Texas vs. Bill Rollins, failed to make an appearance.

Rollins, of Tyler, was present to face charges of theft with false pretext but his attorney from Dallas did not appear. The attorney will be charged with contempt of court, the judge said in postponing the case until a later date.

It was the second time in the same week that the jury panel had been summoned but never got a chance to hear a case. On Monday of last week, a 12-man jury had already been selected to hear a case against Everett Deaton of Friona but the judge ruled a mistrial.

Both cases have been rescheduled for a later session, probably in January, says Parmer County Sheriff Chas.



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

This scientific approach will help the farmer in getting the best fertilizer application for his money, Gunter said.

While there is a need for using more fertilizer, Gunter emphasized several times that this was only one phase of the overall farming program. He pointed out that "finger tip control" of water was just as important. "This is certainly true in cotton," he said.

Another point he made was that fertilization and irrigation should be backed up with good harvesting methods and other efficient production operations.

This rounded out the fourpoint program which was based on 'balanced fertility, soil and water management, efficient production, and quality harvesting and marketing."

Explaining more about the soil testing program was Valentine, the soil Chemist from the testing station which has just recently been opened in Lubbock. Valentine told how the soil analysis was made and how the soil samples should be taken from the fields.

He said that a composite sample of the soil from all sections of a field was needed, and the way to obtain these samples was by using special type probe, which he demonstrated at the meeting.

The samples should be taken by ziz-zagging across a given field, placing all the samples



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

We enjoyed the four days in Denver, attending the 42nd Annual American Farm Bureau Convention, along with about five thousand others from the forty nine states and Puerto Rico. There were to have been three hundred or more Texans there, but due to road conditions, several we know of didn't make it. Even the weather and roads were pretty bad on the way up, the weather during the convention was beautiful.

Messages to the convention were received from both President Eisenhower and Presidentelect Kennedy. President Shuman replied that Farm Bureau would give "full support and cooperation in all efforts to strengthen America, increase farm income, and advance the cause of individual freedom."

One of the most significant resolutions passed at the convention, we thought, is the one stating that "Action should be taken to prevent the Supreme Court from changing its long established interpretations of the constitution. Biblical Star Still Puzzles **Astronomers**

The mystery of the Biblical Star of Bethlehem has for centuries intrigued scholars and astrono-

Some scholars believe it may But for those who weren't have been a supernova, or exploding star. Others think it might have been a comet or perhaps a conjunction of the bright planets Jupiter and Saturn.

> If it was a supernova in the Milky Way, astronomers say, it would have unquestionably filled ancient stargazers with awe and the feeling that a great event might be taking place,

> A "nova" implies a new star, but actually is not. It is rather an old star that suddenly flares up in a display 20,000 to 50,000 times brighter than the sun. A supernova is about 100 million times

> > Guest Star

Japanese and Chinese documents report a "guest star," so bright it could be seen in daylight, appeared in July, 1054. This, no doubt, was a supernova, astrono-

Astronomers do not know what causes a supernova. One theory is that the star's supply of hydrogen becomes exhausted. As the star contracts, the core temperature rises to 110 million degrees centigrade. The incredible temperature sets off helium-fusion processes, and the star becomes a huge nuclear fusion reactor which eventually flies to pieces.

Thousands Visit Holy Land

Jerusalem and the Holy Land at this time of the year attracts thousands of Christians from throughout the world. They come by every means of transportation to visit the shrines and Holy places so important to the Christian world.

In Bethlehem they find the Church of the Nativity, traditional scene

of the birth of Christ, which is cared for by monks of many sects. From the Mount of Olives, where Jesus prayed and wept over Jerusalem, visitors can see the great beauty of the Holy City and the great wall that Herod built. Beyond it is the Dome of the Rock which tradition says marks the place were Solomon built his temple and Jeremiah hid the Ark of the Covenant.

The Garden

Near Jerusalem is the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus prayed the night before he was killed. Some of the olive trees are said to date from the time of Christ's entry into the Holy City. The garden is cared for today by Franciscan fathers.

The tomb of Mary, mother of Christ, is near here and attracts many

Visitors to Jerusalem today can not enter by the Golden Gate. It has been blocked and they must use the Dung Gate which leads into the North African Quarter.

The Holy Place

From inside this gate one can see the holiest places in Christiandom-the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, erected over the place where Christ was crucified and buried.

It was completed in the twelfth century by the Crusaders and many different Christian orders have shrines here.

One of the many traditions of the church is that the keys are kept by a Moslem of the family of Nusaibeh. This custom has been in practice since the time of Saladin, who was Sultan of Egypt and Syria

Supposedly by letting the family of Nusaibeh keep the keys to the church it will keep peace among the many Christian factions. These are but a few of the many shrines and Holy places that have attracted millions of pilgrims throughout the centuries and will continue to do so for centuries to come.

Modest Gifts In Good Taste

Formed last year by a group of sales managers interested in clearing the air relative to the subject of business gift buying. the Business Goodwill Advisory Council has taken the first significant step in this direction.

In a folder entitled "Business Gifts At Christmas-Good or Bad?", the organization set forth seven basic "Keys to Success" in the selection and distribution of business gifts. The rules developed by BGAC are:

1. Keep your gifts of modest value in relation to the importravagant gifts smack of bribery 2. Choose your gifts individual-

ly, considering the tastes of each group of recipients, or preferably, 3. Choose only high quality

Personalize each gift, if possible, with the recipient's name or initials.

5. Package each gift attractive-6. Accompany each package with a personal note, greeting

card or at least a special gift la-

7. Deliver each gift with a flair, if possible-personally or by special messenger - and preferably to each recipient's home rather than to his office.

The organization makes a strong point of the fact that "as a result of occasional abuses . . . some businessmen have made the mistake of forbidding their employees to accept business remembrances before realizing that such a public statement bares basic mistrust of the employees and inevitably results in very poor employee and public rela-

On the other side, detailed surveys have shown that "business giving is generally on the upswing; that the practice is definitely worthwhile, but it does depend on how it is done."

"The giving of well-chosen remembrances can be a highly rewarding practice," the survey concludes. "Goodwill generates easily and it generates best when the remembrance is presented in a truly thoughtful manner as an honest token of appreciation."

Clement Moore **Gave Popular** Image Of Santa

MUST DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

That jolly, rotund, little man, know as Santa Claus, was born in the United States-the product of the imagination of Dr. Clement Moore who wrote "A visit from Saint Nicholas."

There was, of course, a Saint Nicholas. He is the patron saint of children and known for his miracles and generosity. But for the American people Dr. Moore transformed him into a jolly, plump, rosy-cheeked little man with reindeer and sleigh.

In 1882

The story of Santa's "birth" begins in the afternoon on Christmas Eve, 1822, in Dr. Moore's

home-Chelsea House. Christmas Eve was always an exciting time in the Moore household. Late that afternoon Mrs. Moore reminded her husband that he still had some Christmas presents to deliver to friends in nearby Greenwich Village.

Dr. Moore pulled on heavy winter boots and overcoat, called for Peter, an old Dutch handyman on the estate, hitched up a horse and sleigh and the two were off on the Christmas mission.

In an hour or so they were done and on the way home at a gay tempo with jingling bells which were fastened to the horse's har-

Inspiration

During this ride Dr. Moore had his inspiration. In Peter's round, ruddy face and sparkling eyes he had seen Santa Claus. The sound of bells in the clear crisp air produced a vision of reindeer flying through the wintry night.

during the rest of the ride he composed the gay jingle.

First Reading

That evening, by the fireplace, he read the poem to his children. poem has been printed in many millions of copies. It has been translated into scores of languages, and into Braille.

It was in this manner that Saint Nicholas, a serious Fourth Century Bishop of Myra, in Lycia, Asia Minor, became a happy, laughing little man who flies through the sky in his sleigh pulled by reindeer, dressed in furs, smoking his pipe and going down chimneys to give little boys and girls goodies and toys.



ing stuffing. No matter what method you select to cook your turkey, you will find carefully prepared savory stuffing a popular part of your menu. Turkey without stuffing is like a cake without frosting. Every family has a FAVORITE recipe for stuffing turkey or other fowl. We would like to share a

stuffing recipe with an exciting taste . . . a special holiday treat. Here's how you go about it; but be sure to remember that stuffing expands during the roasting process. So be careful not to over-stuff the bird:

Wild Rice 'n Franks Stuffing 16 cup chopped onlen 4 thispns. butter

16 lb. skinless frankfurters


1 cup chopped mushrooms

16 tepn. thyme

3 cups par-boiled wild rice 1 tepn. salt 2 beaten eggs NOTE: You may use fresh.

canned or dried mushrooms. Dried mushrooms should be soaked overnight and thoroughly washed before using. Par-boil wild rice until it is

almost soft. Drain thoroughly. Roasting time will be sufficient to make rice completely palatable. Saute onion in 2 tablespoons butter until lightly brown and set aside. Cook the mushrooms in remaining 2 tablespoons of butter for about 5 minutes, stirring constantly, and remove from pan. Beat eggs slightly. Slice SKIN-LESS frankfurters in strips, and brown lightly in drippings. Remove from heat and toss all ingredients, including sausage, onion, mushrooms, wild rice, beaten eggs and seasonings. Stuff bird between crop and tail. This will make about 5 cups, enough for a 10-pound, ready - to - serve
