Emergency Feed Applications Ready Applications are now being ta-

ken in the county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee here for the Department of Agriculture's Emergency Livestock Feed Program, according to Mrs. Lea Roy Aldwell, office manager. Mixed feed containing maize


can be purchased here and whole grain, corn and maize, will be available at the government warehouse in Eden in the near future. The feed may be purchased by producers after eligibility requirements are met and the application approved, Mrs. Aldwell said. Maize for mixed feed can be purchased on a warrant issued by the county ASCS office and delivered to one of the feed dealers. Up to 90 percent maize may be used in the mixture and the rancher will pay the feed dealers for the additional ingredients and

mixing charges. Delivery prices for maize from local dealers on primary livestock (breeding livestock) will be \$1.7370 per hundred pounds. Costs of maize for secondary or other than breeding stock will be \$2.21-95. Bulk corn delivered in Eden will be available for \$2.0892 for EL primary stock and \$2.6697 for secondary livestock.

Individuals with outside income or in partnerships are required to file a financial statement with their application as will ranchers with more than 500 animal units. FR Applications filed for over 500 animal units will have to be approved by the state office of the ASCS. KI The authorized period for the feed program will end September 30, 1967, Mrs. Aldwell said.
