As any one of a bunch of Bovinians can tell you about now, getting ready for Bull Town Days is a lot of work. The celebration, which will be the third since it was started again in '64, will be getting underway about a week from now.

Much of that aforementioned work will come off between now and the start of the event. Still more will be done during the celebration. The work doesn't stop when the celebration. starts. As a matter of fact, there are probably as many man-hours put in during the festivities as there are before. The things to be done for a celebration of this kind are enough to scare almost anybody when they are viewed all at one time. Not until all the events are broken down into individual items can they seem feasible. For instance, how would you like to fix supper for 6000 people? That's a pretty tall order, we'd say, but that's just one of the many things which can and will be done for Bull Town Days.

Not only will all the duties require a lot of work; patience and intelligence will also be needed in great quantities.

The nicest part about the work is that the people who are doing the entertaining (work)have as much, or more, fun than do those who are being entertained. That makes it all seem worthwhile and then some!

If you don't have a job to do during the celebration this year, it's your own fault. There are several chairmen who can assign you a task real fast if you will make your availability known.

Final figures aren't ready yet, but Wayne Spears, who has been in charge of the concession stand at the ballpark this summer, indicates that the profits will probably be enough to pay off the ballpark note at First State Bank,

We don't know the exact amount remaining to be paid on the note, but it's something like six or seven hundred dollars.

The success of the concession stand, as well as the entire boys' baseball and men's softball programs, has, again, been through the cooperation of several people.

Mothers of players in the boys' program and wives of players in the softball league have donated their time in operating the concession stand. Their hotdogs, too, were free and brought in 100 per cent profit for the concession stand fund, These contributions, needless to say, have greatly aided in the success of the project. Without this boost, the profits would have been much less, as Spears is quick to

Remove the protective covers from pool and equipment. If you've left the water in the pool (many owners do), now is a good time to drain it and check walls and floor for damage if not in a water-short area. If you are, check with water utility to see if you can 'early fill' or 'off-peak' fill at night or on weekends. Examine all exposed valves, controls, and pipe for deterioration.



the pool is filling, check filtration equipment for operational readiness. The manufacturer's recommendations for oiling and cleaning should be followed before the filter is put into operation; this can be done as soon as the water reaches the filter intake pipe.

For efficient operation of a modern diatomite filter, circulate a slurry, or mixture of diatomite and water, into the filter to provide a coating about 1/16 of an inch hick on the elements. Combine sugar, cinnamon, Dutch Apple Dessert crumbs, and chopped raisins. Sprinkle about ¼ cup whole raisins in well greased 9-inch square baking pan. Separate refrigerator biscuits and place half of them on top of raisins in pan. Place a spoonful of Dutch Apple Dessert mixture on top of each biscuit with a dot of butter if desired. TIME TO HUNT SQUIRRELS—This tip is meant for the beginner who is taking his first squirrel hunt.

The time of day most bushy-tails are running actively is real early in the morning, just at sun-up, or at sundown, just before dark. And that's the time to hunt 'em.

This applies whether you are still hunting, or sneaking through the woods.

DRYING OUT SLEEPING BAGS-Sleeping bags are likely to get damp, or even wet, after a night's use. However, they may be dried quickly by opening the car hood and draping them over the running engine. Tie to the radiator ornament or hook to hold the bags in place. Turn the bag, or bags, now and then, as you would any other apparel.

CLEAN ROD FERRULES—Ferrules that are balky when you try to pull the rod sections apart, show that they need cleaning and lubricating.

Use a soft rag, moistened with gasoline, to swab both male and female parts of ferrule. Then lightly lubricate.

After this treatment you will find that the ferrule parts separate with nothing more than a little plop of resistance.

ROOFING IN THE DOGHOUSE—Your birddog deserves a dry place to run and sleep.

Cover the floor of his shelter with ordinary roofing material. Then pave the runway of the kennel with the same stuff. First be sure the runway is elevated with enough packed dirt to assure good drainage.

COLD NOSE IS OFTEN NATURAL-The belief is almost universal that a warm, dry nose on a dog indicates that the animal is sick. However, unless this dry condition continues for several days, there probably is nothing to worry about.

Short intervals of dry hotness can merely indicate that the nose glands that regulate the moist discharge are only temporarily off the job.


ICE FOR YOUR CAMP COOLER-Campers often are faced with the problem of not having enough ice.

Usually this is because the cubes they brought with them were soon melted. Ice can be made to last much longer if, instead of filling the chest with conventional cubes, you freeze water in 2-quart, or gallon, milk cartons.

These king-size ice cubes melt much more slowly. And they will last much, much longer if re-frozen in the deep freezer.




