

# Plans Take Shape For Annual Celebration

Bovina's Third Annual Bull Town Days is now just eight days away and final preparations for the celebration, which is expected to attract as many as 6000 people, are being made.

Beef for the free barbecue which is scheduled for Friday, August 19, at 7 p.m., was purchased last week and processed Monday.

A total of nine head of cattle

were processed. Barbecuing of the meat will begin Thursday night of next week at the yard of Bovina Gin Co.

Eight of the cattle were purchased from Edwin Lide and one from Pete Davies.

Mesquite wood to be used for the barbecue fire was hauled from the east side of the Panhandle last week by a committee from Bovina Junior Chamber of Commerce assisted by

two men from Billie Sudderth's crew.

To publicize the celebration, a delegation from Bovina will appear on Cotton John's Show on KGNC-TV in Amarillo Saturday at 11:30 a.m.

The group, which will include queen contestants, talent, beard growers, cow callers, last year's fiddling champions and Cash Richards' Bull Town

mules, will depart from Bovina Restaurant at 9 a.m. Saturday. They will be at the TV studio at 10:30 to prepare for the 11:30 show.

Providing talent for the TV program will be Sharon Pierson and Margaret Jo Venable, a duet, and Benny McCain. The duet and McCain will be accompanied by Mrs. Doris Wilson.

Five more girls have entered the queen's contest since last week bringing the total number of entries to 10.

Those who have entered since last week and their sponsors are Pamela Grissom, First State Bank; Margaret Jo Venable, Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply; Sherril Hutto, Tide Fertilizer; Nancy Mitchell, Bovina Blade; and Karen Bell, Bovina Gin Co.

As any one of a bunch of Bovinians can tell you about now, getting ready for Bull Town Days is a lot of work.

The celebration, which will be the third since it was started again in '64, will be getting underway about a week from now.

Much of that aforementioned work will come off between now and the start of the event. Still more will be done during the celebration. The work doesn't stop when the celebration starts. As a matter of fact, there are probably as many man-hours put in during the festivities as there are before.

The things to be done for a celebration of this kind are enough to scare almost anybody when they are viewed all at one time.

Not until all the events are broken down into individual items can they seem feasible.

For instance, how would you like to fix supper for 6000 people? That's a pretty tall order, we'd say, but that's just one of the many things which can and will be done for Bull Town Days.

Not only will all the duties require a lot of work; patience and intelligence will also be needed in great quantities.

The nicest part about the work is that the people who are doing the entertaining (work) have as much, or more, fun than do those who are being entertained. That makes it all seem worthwhile and then some!

If you don't have a job to do during the celebration this year, it's your own fault. There are several chairmen who can assign you a task real fast if you will make your availability known.

Final figures aren't ready yet, but Wayne Spears, who has been in charge of the concession stand at the ballpark this summer, indicates that the profits will probably be enough to pay off the ballpark note at First State Bank.

We don't know the exact amount remaining to be paid on the note, but it's something like six or seven hundred dollars.

The success of the concession stand, as well as the entire boys' baseball and men's softball programs, has, again, been through the cooperation of several people.

Mothers of players in the boys' program and wives of players in the softball league have donated their time in operating the concession stand. Their hotdogs, too, were free and brought in 100 per cent profit for the concession stand fund. These contributions, needless to say, have greatly aided in the success of the project. Without this boost, the profits would have been much less, as Spears is quick to point out.

The bank note which is to be paid off probably this month is not the original one to pay for the cost of the field itself. It is one which was made later to build the concession stand-pressbox and make other improvements to the field.

While it will be nice to have the bank note paid, this doesn't mean that the financial future of the ball programs at the field will forever be rosy. But certainly it will be a help to get this debt behind us. Maybe other improvements can be made in years to come.

The expense of operating the boys' baseball program is no small item, as any past Lions (Continued on Page 2)

## Hail Damages Area's Crops

A hailstorm Sunday afternoon in some areas around Bovina "wiped out" several hundred acres of cotton and vegetables and severely damaged the grain sorghum crop.

The storm, which was accompanied by high winds and more than an inch of rain evi-

dently started west of Bovina in the Pleasant Hill area. It then moved around Bovina to the southwest and reportedly went on into the West Camp Community southeast of Farwell.

Cotton, which was in the storm's path, was considered a 100 per cent loss by farmers

in the "hail belt." Vegetables were likewise destroyed.

The amount of damage to grain sorghum is difficult to determine now, farmers report. Leaves on the stalks were shredded and some of the immature grain was knocked out of the heads. The percentage

of loss can't be determined until the crop matures.

The storm evidently started near the Texas-Mexico state line a few miles north of the Pleasant Hill highway which runs west from Bovina. It continued to the southeast for several miles.

The hail came within approximately five miles of Bovina.

Only a shower of rain fell in Bovina Sunday afternoon.

Monday night, however, half an inch of rain was measured

here. No hail accompanied that shower. There was high wind and blowing dirt in front of the rain.

Prospects are for more moisture this week.

Sixteen new barrels of storage space are being added on to Sherley Grain Company's storage space, Harry Johnson, employee of the elevator, announces. The barrel will be 24 feet across.

Construction of 200,000 bushels of storage space for Bovina Wheat Growers is scheduled to begin the latter part of this week, A. C. Teter, Wheat Growers manager, says.

J. T. Jones and four Bovina 4-H boys attended the county-wide 4-H camp last week in the mountains near Santa Fe. Attending from Bovina were Joe Jones, Ferman Kelso, Aaron Drager and Dave Lowrie.

SIX YEARS AGO August 10, 1960

Monday afternoon, flames were extinguished on a shop and grain storage building on the Harold Hawkins farm a mile west of Bovina.


Some 75 per cent of the building was saved, according to a report from the fire department. Origin of the fire was unknown.



### PREPARE YOUR POOL FOR SWIMMING


If the arrival of the swimming season has you casting longing looks at the backyard swimming pool, these tips from Johns-Manville, manufacturer of Celite filter aids, will help you get your pool in shape for the first plunge of the season.



1. Remove the protective covers from pool and equipment. If you've left the water in the pool (many owners do), now is a good time to drain it and check walls and floor for damage, if not in a water-short area. If you are, check with water utility to see if you can "early fill" or "off-peak" fill at night or on weekends. Examine all exposed valves, controls, and pipe for deterioration.



2. If all seems proper, turn on water to fill the pool. While the pool is filling, check filtration equipment for operational readiness. The manufacturer's recommendations for oiling and cleaning should be followed before the filter is put into operation; this can be done as soon as the water reaches the filter intake pipe.



3. For efficient operation of a modern diatomite filter, circulate a slurry, or mixture of diatomite and water, into the filter to provide a coating about 1/16 of an inch thick on the elements. A supply of diatomite should be put into the body feed apparatus if one is used.



4. Add chlorine and other chemicals necessary to fight the growth of bacteria and algae, before the pool is used. Now that your pool is ready for swimming, all you have to do is get the family together for a "safety briefing" before you take that plunge!



Do you enjoy "hitting the bottle?" Same here! But we're not talking about the indoor pastime of guzzling liquor. We prefer to build a dirt mound in front of the back stop--just dirt, no rocks--so that the target pieces will collect around the mound. There they can be picked up with ease and disposed of readily.

Note that we said "dirt mound." No rocks, or stones or metallic objects that might deflect a bullet and send it whining over the hilltop and injure someone.

A good feature of the dirt mound is that low or wide shots will imbed themselves in the dirt and stop there harmlessly.

Usually we will space the bottles on the top of the mound, 10 or 15 bottles to the row, and see how fast we can take them--one after another.

While glass bottles perhaps provide the greater thrill, metal cans last the longest. It takes quite a collection of both to provide an hour's entertainment for four or five shooters.

Youngsters like to collect these types of targets, especially if they are going to be in on the shooting. A little reward money will speed up the collection, too.

So be careful! Gather up a batch of old non-returnable beer bottles or cans. They make excellent targets.

Of course, you have to go outside--even out of town to partake of this pleasure. But surely you have a friend, or a friend who has a friend, who has some acreage, a farm, or ranch, or lake place where you can test your talents as a marksman.

Pick a spot where there's a high bluff, if possible, or a steep hillside, or a solid backstop of some kind. Don't shoot over water or at the water or where the bullets might at any time skip across a pond or lake. That's about as dangerous a stunt as you could pull.

A second precaution--don't load the gun until you're ready to fire. And don't point it at anything that you don't want to shoot.

Shooting can be a great pleasure, but it's no fun to injure someone through oversight or carelessness.

**HOW TO HAVE A SAFE HOLIDAY WEEKEND**



The time for horseplay—and planning—is before the drive begins. It's wise to have enough books and toys in the car to keep the children happy, and some cigars to help Dad relax while driving.

Whether you'll stay close to home or drive long distances over holiday weekends this year, these tips may help you increase your safety and make the trip more enjoyable, too.

1. **Borrow tricks from professional drivers.** Watch not only the car in front, but also the car ahead of that one. Watching the left front wheels of oncoming cars can help you anticipate surprise turns before the other guy swerves into your lane.

2. **Seek wide-open spaces.** The old rule of one car length for every 10 miles of speed is okay on city streets and ordinary roads—but stretch it on high-speed highways, where rear-end collisions are a common hazard.

3. **Check often for tire cuts and bruises.** Though nylon tire cord isn't damaged by water penetrating into cuts and bruises, other fibers are easily affected if the rubber coating is cut. Check for cuts every time you check tire pressure.

4. **Keep in mind driving comfort.** To combat frayed nerves which can result from highway motoring, frequent restbreaks are good. One good way to help Dad relax while driving is to keep a package of cigars in the glove compartment for him. The sense of well-being that comes with smoking a good cigar can contribute to his driving enjoyment. A back rest, gloves and a good pair of sunglasses may also add to the driver's comfort.

5. **Always give the right of way—especially if the other driver's wrong.** If he's at fault, he's probably a faulty driver—and the best place for a faulty driver is out of your way!

6. **Use your seat belts.** If you don't have them, get some—but accept only those certified as meeting the safety standards of the Society of Automotive Engineers. Fasten your seat belt even when only going around the corner. Two-thirds of fatal accidents occur within 25 miles of home.

There's nothing like a good picture to rekindle the excitement of a trophy hunt or record fish haul.

And with film as cheap as it is today, there's no reason why the average outdoorsman can't record every trip afield or afloat.

Handiest for recording these outdoor highlights is of course the movie camera. But it has serious limitations. Especially so for the man who wants to have a batch of still photos printed up to send out to his friends.

So in this column we'll discuss the still camera.

A good twin-lens reflex or a 35mm, with adjustable focus and aperture settings, can be purchased for less than \$70. Although these cameras won't satisfy a professional photographer, they are adequate to give you a lifetime of enjoyment.

Such cameras as these, properly used, will reward you with clear, sharp pictures. And with proper composition the photos can be made suitable for publication in newspapers.

Contrary to popular opinion you don't need a flash gun for good hunting and fishing photos. That is unless the picture taking is done at night.

Even then, by using high speed film such as Tri-X, which is obtainable at most drug stores, you can take good natural-light photos from a little after sunrise until just before dusk.

A small inexpensive gadget called the light meter is the secret to success for natural or available light photography. It's quite simple to use and it's inexpensive. An adequate one can be purchased for less than \$10.

Just what are some of the advantages of natural or available light photography?

Most obvious advantage is that the resulting photos come

out exactly as seen with your eyes. Shadows fall naturally in the photos and quite frequently the results are beautiful pix with an artistic quality. These are photos that folks will look at again and again because they are so pleasing to the eye.

Consider briefly a picture of your gang trying those big black bass over a campfire. If you happen to use a flash, chances are the faces of the folks close to the camera will have a "washed-out" or chalky appearance. Those in the background will appear dull and dark. The flash might even cause the heads of folks in the foreground to cast crazy shadows over the people in the background.

Suppose you're in a deer blind and you want a few pictures of that big buck before shooting him. Available light photography is the answer. If you tried this with a flash, the buck would bolt when the bulb goes off and you would never get a shot with your rifle.

Another big advantage of taking available light photos in the outdoors is that you can get completely away from those pictures that have the "posed" look.

Your AL photos take on new depth in reality because they can be snapped when your subjects are acting naturally. You get pictures without "ham" in them.

You can get candid shots using a flash if you're able to pop them when no one is expecting to be photographed. But once that first flash beams forth, folks become camera conscious and you end up with pix of people looking posed and stilted.

Such pictures must be avoided if you want to obtain natural looking hunting and fishing photos.

Good photos are treasures that will allow you to re-live many times those exciting moments afield or afloat.

Especially in the courts, where the public's property rights, personal liberty, and even life itself are involved, an accurate record is of utmost importance, for appeals are based, and decided, upon the stenographic record. Certification would assure the public of the continuing competency of the court reporter," Rogers stated.

The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

## 4-H's Vie for Best Community Projects

LIVELY interest in the 4-H Community Beautification program prompted the sponsor to substantially increase 1966 state and national awards, the National 4-H Service Committee has announced.

This year The Sears-Roebuck Foundation will provide six national \$500 scholarships in place of two given last year. Trips to the national 4-H Club Congress in Chicago will be increased from eight to 50, one per state.

The current 4-H program ties into the Youth for Natural Beauty program launched last year from Washington, D.C.

Many projects are undertaken by the club as a whole. However, the scope, time and money involved often enlists aid of the entire community. But 4-H boys and girls plan and carry out the ventures.

The 1965 prize-winning 4-H projects included cleaning up, dressing up and lighting up a small Oklahoma town of 194 residents; tearing down unused farm buildings to make way for landscaping; and transforming an old home into a community showplace.



The Sears-Roebuck Foundation will offer a certificate to the 10 most outstanding clubs in the state, and a \$25 cash prize for the best beautification job done in a single county. The money is to be used for additional projects.

Besides state and national awards for club members, there will be handsome community beautification medals for county winners.

Among other projects suggested in a recent 4-H publica-

tion are: revive Arbor Day, and remove dead or diseased trees; clear away trash and weeds; conduct home and community clean-up campaigns; repair and paint rural mail boxes, road signs, fences and outbuildings; help landscape school and church areas, fairgrounds.

Enrollment last year totaled 173,450 boys and girls in 50 states, and of this number, 1,149 qualified for county medals, according to the Cooperative Extension Service, which names all winners.

# Sorghum Producers Ask Acreage Release

## Reason: Reserve Stocks Depleted

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has called on Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to release at least 10 million acres of feed grains from the Government program for the production of corn and grain sorghum for the 1967 crop.

The Association, through Executive Vice President Bill Nelson, made the appeal in Washington last week and presented the following reasons for the appeal:

- (1) Severe depletion of reserve stocks.
- (2) Prospects for a short feed grain harvest this fall because of reduced acres and deteriorating crop conditions.
- (3) Increased feed grain use at home and abroad.
- (4) And the need for rebuilding adequate stocks.

In reviewing the feed grain stocks situation, the Association executive pointed out that as of July 1, 1966, Commodity Credit Corporation inventory of corn was only 91 million bushels compared to 477 million just a year ago. In reference to grain sorghum, Nelson said that July stocks in all positions were 534 million bushels, down 19 percent from the 659 million bushels figure just a year ago. Of the current stocks of grain sorghum, CCC owns only 355 million bushels as compared to 560 million in July, 1965. Nelson said that on casual observation it may appear that since grain sorghum stocks are equal to almost one full year's production that stocks would be adequate but he indicated that many people are overlooking the fact that we have new dis- appearance and use figures to look at. For instance, livestock feeding in the sorghum belt is up 45

per cent over a year ago, while the increase is only 11 per cent nationwide and in addition exports of grain sorghum during this marketing year ending September 30, are likely to be at least 100 million bushels larger than that of a year ago. He said that these facts coupled with the fact that since there is a shortage of wheat -- and grain sorghum is the nearest grain in supply that can be substituted for wheat along with the fact that there is a shortage of corn -- and grain sorghum is the nearest substitute for corn, that it can be reasonably expected that in the months ahead there will be a "run" on grain sorghum stocks.

In consulting with USDA officials, GSPA indicated that the Association and individual farmers recognize the delicate balance between releasing an adequate amount of acres to obtain the desired production for use and reserve while maintaining a price structure that will maintain and strengthen income of grain producers.

GSPA President Elbert Harp at his farm near Abernathy indicated that this early appeal is being made to USDA in order that farmers may play next year's cropping systems and so that commercial firms serving the feed grain industry may be prepared for any expansion that may be forthcoming, particularly it is recognized that the seed industry will need to take the utmost care in preserving and distributing seed stocks, and the equipment and fertilizer industry alerted early to increased demands placed on these important segments of the grain producing industry as well as long range planning by country and terminal elevators.



## Stresses Importance -- Keep Pesticides In Original Container

Always leave pesticides in their original container until you are ready to use them, says Cricket B. Taylor, Parmer County HD Agent. "Keep these containers closed and air tight; transparent tape will help keep the label on the container." "Unlabeled products can be deadly," she emphasizes. This includes pesticides and many other products that you have in and around your house. Pouring dangerous products into old milk bottles, soft-drink bottles, measuring cups, pails or pots and pans is a dangerous habit to acquire. The original container is designed to hold the product safely until you are ready to use it or until it is opened by you or someone else. Why is it important to keep the pesticides in their original containers? When children are involved -- your own, your neighbors or your grandchildren -- you are immediately

faced with a situation of association. You have taught the children to associate cups, soft-drink bottles, fruit or jelly jars, bowls and other cooking utensils with food or drink. Remember that the very young have not developed their sense of taste and smell and they will taste anything. It should come as no surprise then, that they think anything in a soft-drink bottle is a soft-drink and will drink it. They are only trying out what you have taught them, so don't confuse them by substituting some dangerous material in a common food-type container. There is another good reason to use only the original container. It has the important label information that you will need each time you use the product. "If you find a container without a label, or with part of the label missing, the best thing to do is GET RID OF IT."

The Parmer County team went into the consolation


bracket after dropping a first round game Thursday to Morton, 5-2. Morton was the eventual tournament champion.
