





She said she mailed the coupon to the development agency without realizing she had entered the swepstakes contest.


Mrs. Raymond pointed out that her family had been contemplating a trip to Texas and she was merely seeking literature describing vacation attractions in the state.

For most American-made vehicles, the anchorages are standard beginning with 1962 models. The vehicles may may be rejected during the inspection if: (1) the seat belts are not installed, (2) the belts are unsafe or unserviceable from wear or damage, (3) the attachment fittings are damaged or loose, or (4) the buckles are loose or inoperative

vehicles, including those with power steering. Vehicles are to be rejected if: (1) the steering wheel has more than two inches of lash measured on the outside periphery of the rim (lash is defined as the condition in which the steering control can be turned through some part of a revolution without front wheel motion), (2) if it is impossible to turn the wheel from full right to full left without jamming, or (3) if the fluid in the power steering is below the recommended level. Vehicles with power steering are to be checked

Wheels and rms are to be inspected without being removed from the vehicle. The vehicle will be rejected if: (1) the wheel has defective or bent rim flanges, or loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs, or (2) rims have defects and cracks to the extent that they might impair the safe mounting and proper retention of tires.

There are approximately 5500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, and each displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Motorists are urged to have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages and stations for ordinary maintenance, thus insuring that their vehicle is mechanically safe to operate over the streets and highways.

Businesses Close For Labor Day

Labor Day in Sonora will mark the last fling of the summer vacation season over the September 1-4 weekend.

Most local businesses will close on Monday, September 4. Sonora's schools will observe the holiday and not begin until Tuesday, September 5.

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that 45 persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the long weekend. Director Homer Garrison said

'The estimate of 45 traffic deaths could be a high estimate, but only if all drivers put forth every effort toward avoiding accidents." The most dangerous time during the period is estimated by the DPS to be from 6 p.m., Friday, until midnight, Monday.

Game Laws Change For Deer, Turkey

According to game warden No-Ian Johnson, some significant changes have been made in the hunting seasons for Sutton County.

Deer season will begin this year on November 11 and extend to January 1. Last year's season began on November 16. The new date will add an additional weekend of hunting at the first of the season.

Bag limit on deer will be three, of which no more than two may be bucks. The third deer must be antlerless and taken by permit only. Permits are obtainable through landowners and are based on acre-

Turkey season will run concurrent with deer season and two turkey gobblers or bearded hens are the legal limit.


Sutton's quail season will be from November 11 to January 31 and will allow 12 birds per day with 36 in possession.


