THE TEXAS OFFICE of Traffic Safety shares the following, which provides thought-provoking ideas

concerning driving and its history: What's the worst polluter--the

horse or the automobile?

Well, cars certainly use far more of our energy resources, and our eyes water every time we drive into some of that Houston or L.A. smog...but things weren't so hot in the good old days, either. Get a load of this:

Before the auto and truck, horses provided the main means of street transport. In the 1880's booming New York City had an estimated one million nags on its streets. All of this horsepower produced 30,000 tons a day of what a modern bureaucrat would call "negative environmental impact." It took a small army of street cleaners just to stay even; and often they didn't. There were even multi-story stables back then, just like parking garages...

CONSUMER TIP? A used car can often be a better buy than a new one, says a major U.S. transportation company. Hertz Corp. reports that it compared ne... and used cars driven 10,000 miles a year for three years and found that the used cars cost drivers just half as much to keep on the road. The used car expenses averaged 17.3 cents a mile; the new cars averaged 30.1 cents. The survey included all relevant costsdepreciation, fuel, insurance, maintenance and repairs.

HERE'S SOME grim clockwork: Last year motorists drove over a hundred billion miles in Texas...and there was a traffic accident every 63 seconds. Someone is injured in a Texas highway accident every three minutes and fifteen seconds. And every two hours and twenty minutes someone is killed.

L.M. Boyd reported this one: Just 84 years ago there were only two cars in the whole state of Ohio. They ran into each other.

LOUIS B. STRONG, president of the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, has some interesting comments concerning gasoline

rationing:

"Those of us who lived and drove cars during World War II remember gasoline rationing very well. According to polls I have seen, the majority of Americans think gasoline rationing might be a good way to help relieve our oil supply problem. I personally cannot work up much enthusiasm for gasoline rationing for the following reasons:

1. During World War II we had about 24 million automobiles. Today we have over 100 million. Also, by the end of the War, with only 24 million cars, the black markets were

2. During World War II, we had great popular support for everything related to the War effort. Today the majority of Americans don't believe we have an oil problem and blame either the oil companies or the government for what is happening to gasoline prices. So when the inequities, unfairness, and the bureaucracy required to run the system became evident, I think the great majority of Americans would soon become disillusioned with the process.

3. I can't quite envision the size and cost of the bureaucracy required to run it, nor can I envision how all the differing circumstances affecting the need for gasoline can be made to fit fairly into any system.

A veteran Panhandle area farmer from Bovina has been employed to assist the Agriculture and Livestock Committee of the Texas House of Representatives.

He has been active in the American Agriculture Movement both in Washington and Texas. He is married, to the former Donna Actkinson, and is active in the Methodist Church. The Romings are parents of a daughter, Diane, and a son, Doug.


Since coming to West Texas State University, Yung's Buffaloes have been co-champions of the Missouri Valley Conference, during the 1977 season.

his infectious enthusiasm. "I'll always hope to be enthusiastic in coaching," he said shortly after arriving on campus.



#### Crops, Livestock Census Taken

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry-agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for

advising farmers and ranchers. Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperatives Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.
