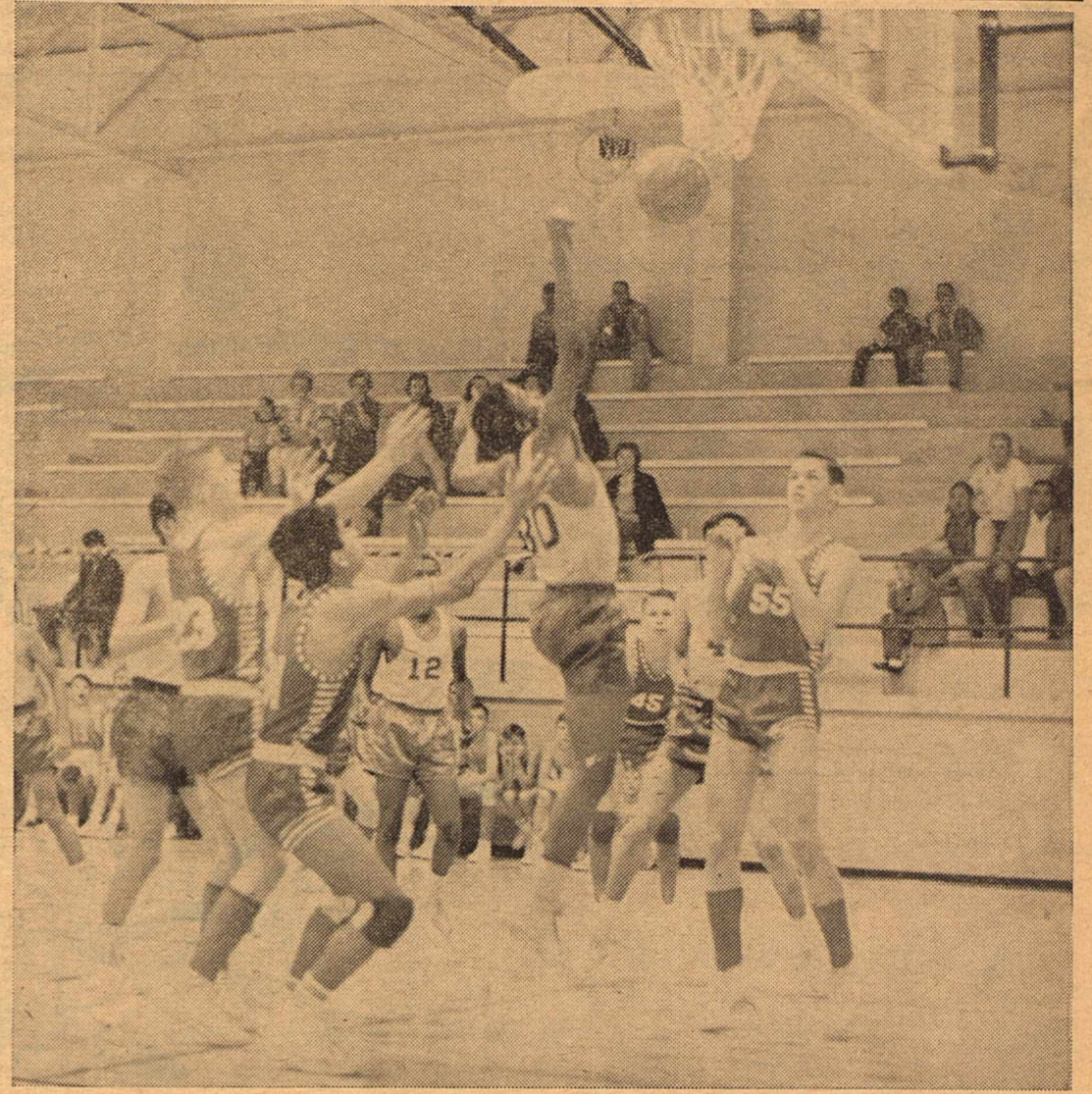
The tough Del Rioans took the

## DORSEY B. HARDEMAN Seeking Full Term As State Senator

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, whose four-year elective term won in 1966 was shrunk to two years by state-wide legislative redistricting, announced today his candidacy in the 25th Senatorial District for a full four-year term.

"I am deeply grateful to the people of the 21-county district for electing me in 1966 to a four year term and respectfully ask their continued support," Hardeman said. He was one of 15 senators who drew a two-year term following senatorial redistricting done in state compliance with the "one man, one vote" decision of the United States Supreme Court. Election this year will give Senator Hardeman a full four-year term.

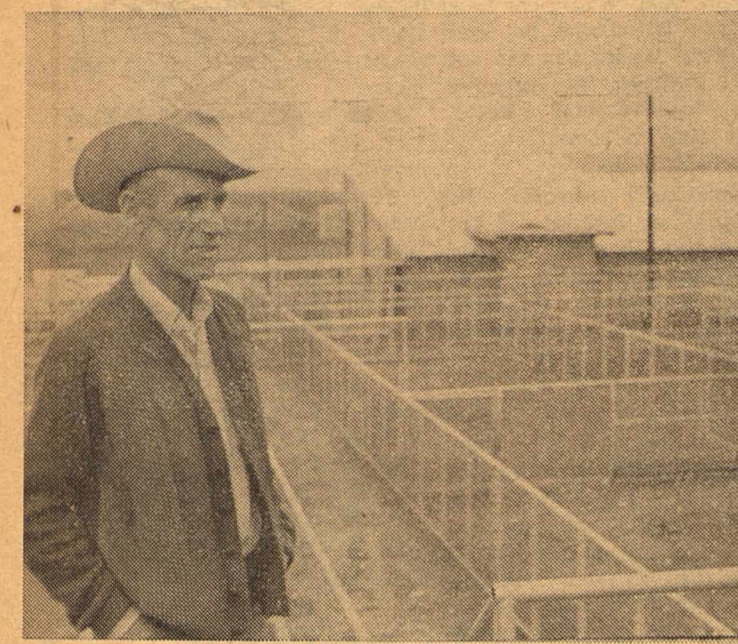
Hardeman said he will counsel with the people throughout the district before the Democratic Primary May 4. "It has been my purpose, at all times, to help maintain a sound, responsible and responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch," the senator said. "This I will continue to do."

A practicing attorney, highly respected as an authority on constitutional law, Hardeman is married to the former Geneva Moore, daughter of the late Lawrence Moore and Mrs. Moore of Schleicher County. The Hardemans are members of the Church of Christ. Their sons, Mark and Bryan are students at The University of Texas and Angelo State College, respectively.

Hardeman is presently vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee which provides funds for state-supported institutions and educational facilities; is chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee which reviews all revenue measures, and is serving as a senior member of the Budget Board, the vital legislative research arm on finances to fulfill state needs. During 11 regular and 11 special sessions of the Legislature, Hardeman has served as chairman or as a member of all major Standing Committees of the Senate, giving him experience and seniority valuable to the people of the 25th District in particular.

Hardeman's interest in constructive legislation for the district, for West Texas and the state is well known. He sponsored legislation providing that landowners, acting as agents for the state, shall share in bonuses, delay rentals and royalties from the leasing of mineral classified land for sulphur. This same policy in leasing of such lands for oil and gas has contributed to the more than \$700 million.

Powers said that his company would provide public weighing scales, cutting chutes, drenching and branding facilities, yardage and rail shipping facilities.

Powers said, "With these extensive facilities we would like for buyers and sellers to make this their headquarters."

## Former Sonoran Promoted at Mobil

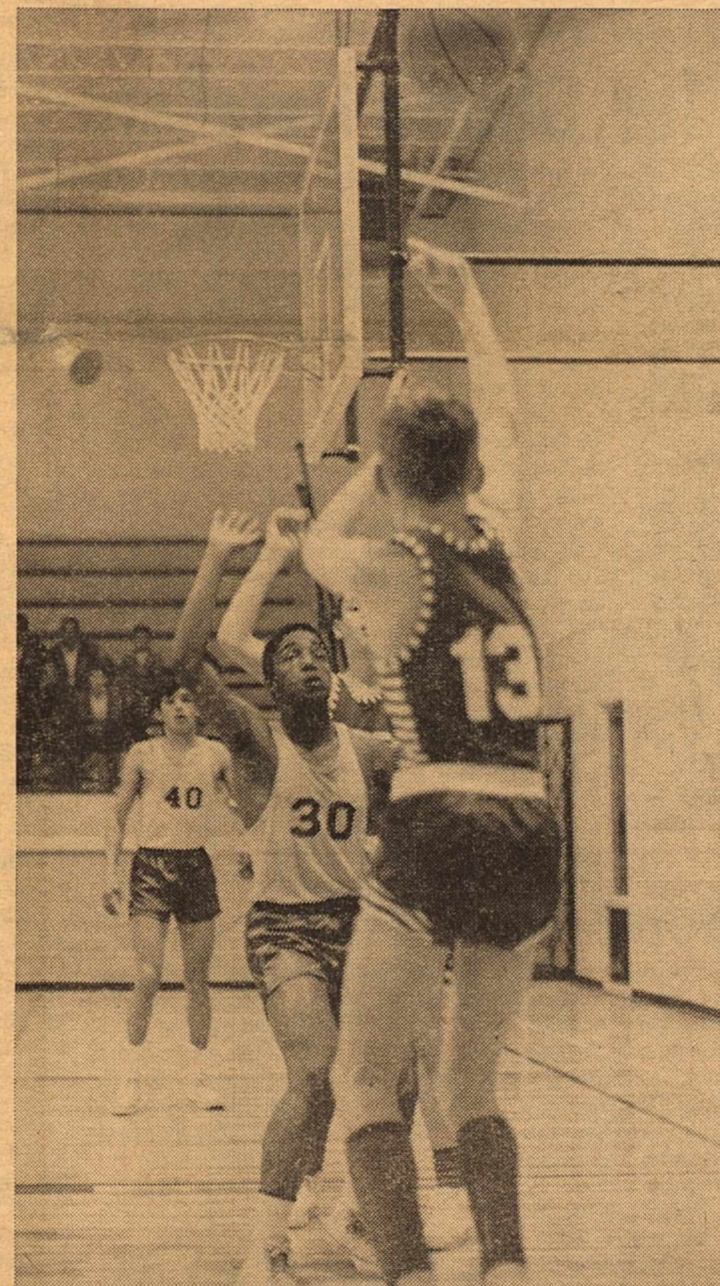
E. B. Tipton Jr. has been named to the position of LP-Gas Marketing Manager of Mobil Oil Corporation in Houston.

## USDA Proposes New Brucellosis Controls

Texas cattle producers may soon find themselves in a tight spot with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

A proposal is expected to be published by the Department soon to restrict the interstate shipment of cattle from counties not affiliated with the brucellosis eradication program. Over 30 counties in the state are not yet under the program.

Publication of the proposals is scheduled to appear in the Federal Register, a document reflecting the daily record of the USDA. After publication, persons interested in submitting changes to the proposal have 60 days to do so. Publication date was planned to be January 1, but has been delayed.

The expected date of restriction is between May 1 and January 1, 1969.

While Sutton County is rated as a modified — certified brucellosis county, any proposal of this magnitude could be important to local producers. Buyers would also be concerned over the proposal.

## Fire at Zola's Destroys 4 Courts

Fire destroyed 4 units and inflicted other heavy damage at Zola's Courts Tuesday night. The fire was discovered about 1 a.m. and was extinguished by 4 a.m.

Although cause has not been definitely established, Pat Jungk, owner, said that a flaming butane-equipped truck fed the fire and added the chance of explosion. The hot metal of the truck had to be cooled before the fire on the truck could be extinguished.

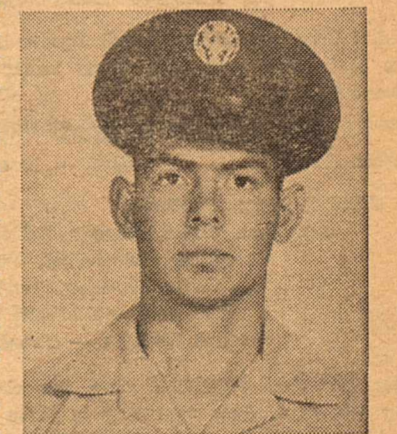
## Sanders Completes Naval Training

This week I received a clipping from the San Angelo Standard concerning the visit of Vice President Humphrey to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. This was sent by my family and the article stated a lot of non-

sense about what went on at Haile Selassie I University.

The Vice President's meeting with HIM Haile Selassie lasted much longer than was scheduled and he arrived at the Ambassador's Residence at approximately 3:40 P. M. and he was to speak to the American Community at 4 P.M. The reason I know this is that I was there and was introduced to both he and Mrs. Himpfrey. The Ambassador's wife had asked me after Christmas if I would be her sort of "Maitre d" for the formal seated dinner given at the Residence under invitation from the Vice President and Mrs. Himpfrey for the Emperor with a guest list of 70.

This was the biggest challenge I've ever been offered and I was flattered to be asked. I had 33 servants and 6 American ladies working with me.

It is true there was a demonstration planned at the University

but it was strictly a tongue-in-cheek sort of affair. University students everywhere seem to think they must do things of this type to show how intellectually independent they are.

This doesn't go to say I approve of it in any way. Since the Vice President was running late he just decided to skip the brief stop he had planned and the students were terribly disappointed. One of my friends had business at the University right during this time and drove right through the handful of (not 300) demonstrators and all of them were wreathed in big, happy, friendly smiles. It really amazes me how hard these newspaper and magazine people have to stretch their imagination to get a story written.

As a sidenote, after the dinner was over that Saturday night and the Emperor had gone, the Vice President and Mrs. Humphrey sent for me and my other "scully maids" to come to the living room. We were each personally thanked by both of them with as much sin-
