Interest is running high for the proposed plan to construct a new block-long section of downtown Bovina buildings.

Details of the project were announced in The Blade three weeks ago.

The plan, which involves nine property owners, has the endorsement of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. A chamber committee is currently working on the development and has been for the last month.

All of the property owners have expressed some interest in the project, Jim Ware, who is chairman of the chamber committee, tells us.

While some of them haven't as yet said they were ready to go along with the idea, most of them have said they would

might justify some more of that nation-wide publicity which we've written about here from time to time.

It's not every day, for instance, that you hear or read about a small town, or large one either, constructing a new downtown set of buildings.

We said a few paragraphs back that the plan would be wonderful for Bovina, There's little question about that.

Whether it would be good for each of the nine property owners involved is up to the individual, of course, and we don't have any ambitions to tell an individual what he should do about his business or pro-

If an individual doesn't think it's a good thing for him, that's his business, of course, and the project may or may not suffer because of it.

Be that as it may, the proposal has created quite a bit of conversation and concern in the community. We would like to see it come about, needless to say. But at the same time, there are other things we'd like to see come about, too.

We have heard that projects of this sort may become popular in towns in the area. Especially, this might be true if the project here, or somewhere else, proved to be highly successful. That's the opinion of only a few people, of course, and, frankly, we hadn't heard it mentioned prior to the areawide publicity which the project here received.

The situation here is unusual in that there is sufficient room behind the buildings----between them and the alley which runs parallel with the railroad ----to construct new buildings without tearing down with the old ones until the new ones are completed.

That is, the way we see it, the unique part of the proposal. In other words, there would be a minimum of lost business days because of construction. How that would work out in practice, remains to be seen. Certainly, the situation would be far free of handicaps and disadvantages, but it is possible.

If and when the property owners agree to begin the project, be plenty proud of it. And if an agreement is never reached in regard to this particular plan, we still have a pretty fair country town.

To make a long story short, if the property owners want to go ahead with the project, we'll cheer them on.

If they don't, we'll respect their judgement.

If the plan is put into effect, there will be advantages and disadvantages.

If it is disregarded, that action will likewise have advantages and disadvantages.

The entire deal is up to the property owners. At least (Continued on Page 2)

The final payment was slightly over \$500 with three per cent interest charges shoving the total to about \$521.

Councilmen also considered a bid on a similar machine from Plains Machinery Co. in Amarillo which was approximately \$1,000 higher.

The new machine was bought on alease-purchase agreement. Payments, or leasing fee, will be \$210,42 per month for 48 months. At end of that time, the machine will become property of the city. The monthly payments include insurance and

Browning-Ferris representative who met with the council promised that delivery would be made in "less than 30 days."

The old machine owned by the city has proven unsatisfactory for past several months and councilmen figured that a new street sweeper was necessary to protect the city's investment in some 80 blocks of payed streets, about half of which has been completed in past fe

In other business, the board heard from H.K. Kendrick of Friona who is interested in installing a cable television system here, (See story elsewhere in this issue).







Deposits at three Parmer County banks were 3,6 per cent of the Farwell bank, credited below the total for the corresponding period a year ago,

according to quarterly statements published by the banks this week. Deposits at Farwell, Friona

and Bovina totalled \$12,590,-318.34 on June 29, as compared to \$13,058,553.94 on June 30 of 1962, a decrease of \$468,235.60. Most bank officials in the county indicated that the deposit total was pretty good, considering the recently completed wheat harvest in the county,

the slimmest from an income standpoint in several years. Mid-year deposit figures were naturally down from the first quarter's total of \$14,-827,095.85, which was an alltime record for the county.

The First National Bank of Bovina, center of the area which was hardest hit by hail damage to wheat, showed the largest decline in deposits, both by percentage and actual total.

Deposits on June 29 at the Bovina bank were \$1,508,340,-24, which were \$278,817.85 less than the \$1,787,158.09 at the same time a year ago. Another reason for Bovina's drop was due to the switch in the county depository from the Bovina bank to Friona State Bank since the June statement of 1962. The county's deposit, which rotates in the three banks, is approximately \$400,000.

The next-largest decrease, although having the most deposits at the present, was by Security State Bank of Farwell. Deposits on June 29 totalled \$5,575,230.48, which was \$147,-008.91 below last June's total of \$5,722,239.39.

last fall's excellent crops with playing a major role in keeping the deposit figure fairly stable. "Also, some of our wheat wasn't too bad. A strip north of Farwell made some pretty good wheat," he said.

County Bank Deposits

Deposits at Friona State Bank, thanks perhaps in part to the addition of the county's deposit, were less than one per cent below last June's total, which was an all-time high for June 30 at the bank.

Friona deposits totalled \$5,-506,757.62 on June 29, which was just\$42,408.84 less than the organ in Convention Hall, previous year's statement of Atlantic City (N. J.) contains \$5,549,156.46. Frank Spring, | 39,913 pipes . . .

Bob Anderson, vice president | president of Friona State Bank, agreed with Anderson that last fall's good crops were the major reason for deposits holding, since the wheat crop around Friona was considerably below normal.

Total assets at the three banks made a better comparison, totalling \$13,893,947.68 on June 29, They were led by Farwell's \$6,131,822.56, some \$100,000 below last year. Friona's \$5,986,876.16 was actually an increase in that department. Bovina recorded \$1,775,-248.96 in assets.

About 75 acres of the approximately 400 acres near Friona had been harvested as of the first of the week. The potatoes were making about 200 sacks per acre, according to Kenneth Neill, manager of Friona Growers and Shippers.



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

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


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
