Mrs. W. O. Crites, deputy at the County Clerk's office, reported that absentee voting was brisk as the Tuesday deadline approached for balloting in the second Democratic primary to be held Saturday.

Conservative Preston Smith will be pitted against liberal Don Yarborough in a runoff that at one time was expected to draw a light vote. Latest reports indicate a general heavy turn-out over the state. There's little question but that Smith is the better qualified by his 18 years of service in the State Capitol. Too, his conservative approach to state government would be a continuation of the system that has seen Texas prosper up until now. Smith, of Lubbock, is a West Texas man and better knows the problem of our area.

While Yarborough has never held office, Smith has served six years in the House, six years in the Senate and six years in the Lieutenant Governor's chair.

But the support that Yarborough rallied in the 1962 runoff against John Connally has prognosticators uncertain as to the outcome of Saturday's election. A majority of Texans voting Saturday would elect Smith. But if Smith supporters take a Memorial-Day holiday instead of showing up at the polls, they stand a chance of losing this important election by default.

For Smith to lose from the failure of his supporters to exercise their American rights would be a far greater defeat than if the liberal Yarborough group won because it truly represented the majority of the people of Texas.

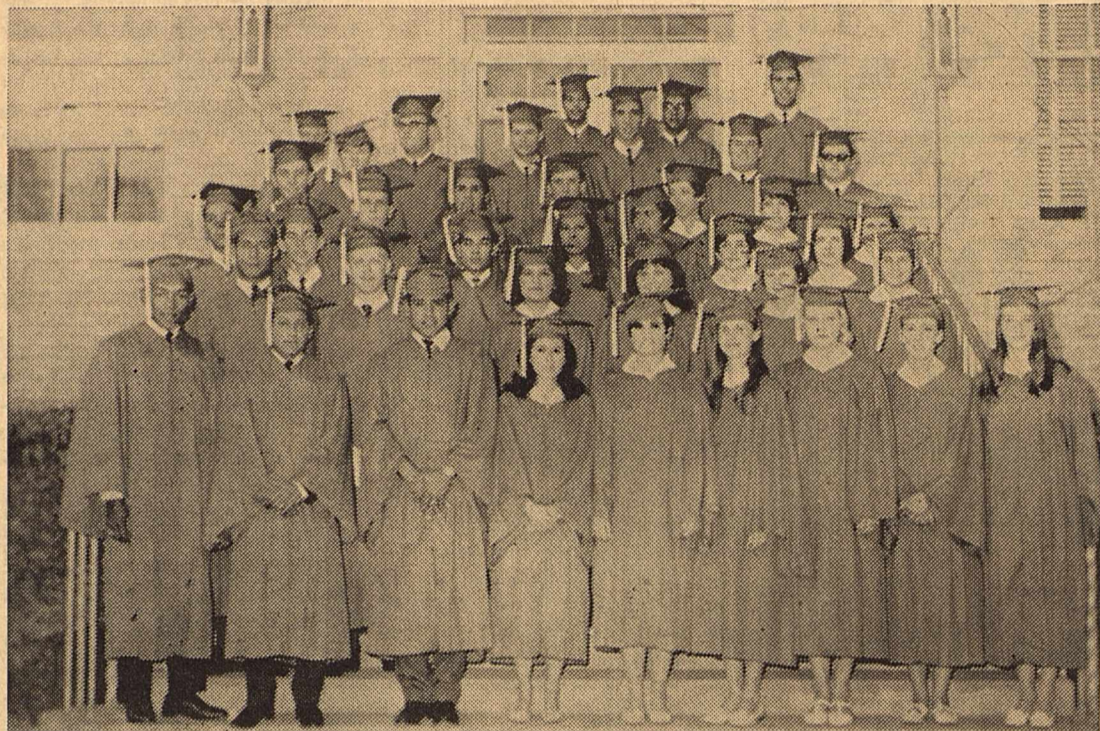

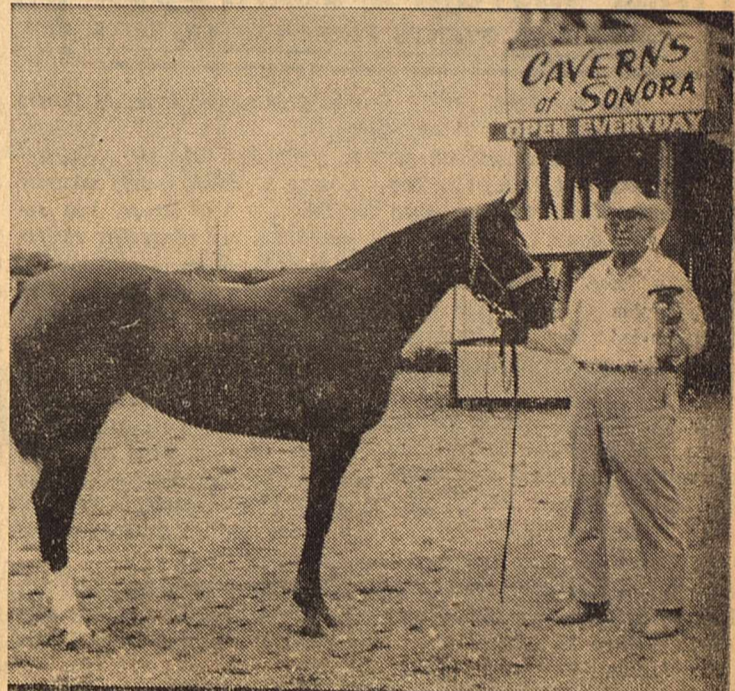

James A. Gray, Texas extension animal husbandman, is the show superintendent.

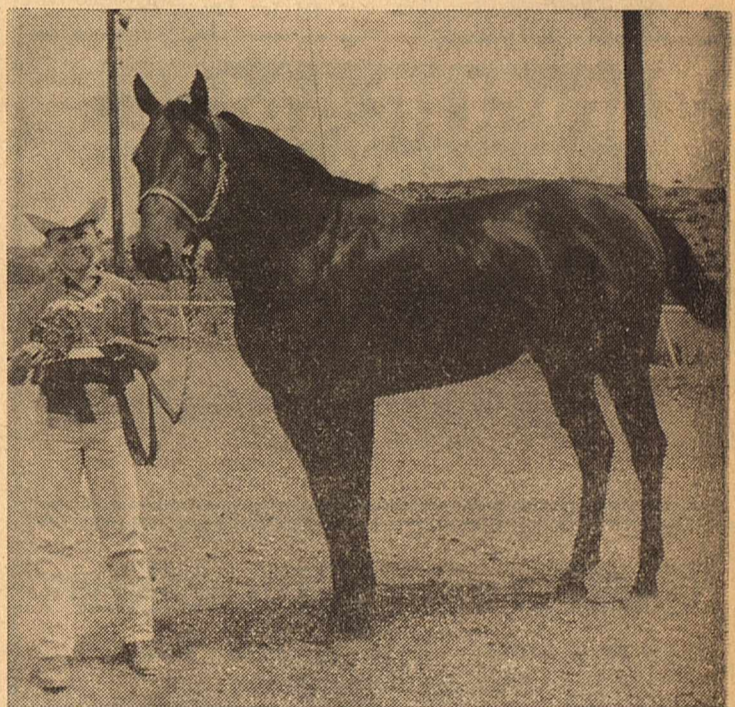
DPS OFFICE CLOSED

The Drivers License office will be closed Thursday, May 30 and Monday, June 3, according to Mrs. Donald Jones.

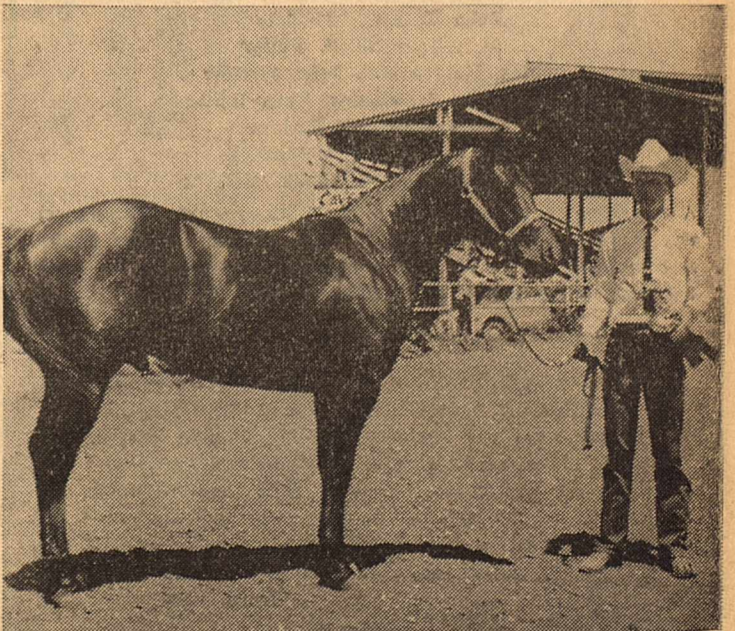
Mrs. Jones said the office will be open Friday, May 31, when Patrolman Ray Garnett will be in the office.

Smith Best For Texans

On every count, the man most qualified to be chosen as the Democratic candidate for governor in Saturday's balloting is Lt. Gov. Preston Smith of Lubbock. In terms of experience, it is no contest. Smith has served his fellow Texans for 18 years; his opponent has never held office. Smith was elected to the House of Representatives in 1944 and served three two-year terms, voluntarily leaving office in 1950. Six years later he re-entered politics and was elected to represent the 11-county district centering on Lubbock in the state Senate. Twice the district re-elected him, and he completed six years in the Senate in 1962.

That year, Preston Smith first sought statewide office as a candidate for lieutenant governor and

opology bedrocked on fiscal conservatism and responsible representation. Smith has shown by his record that he represents the majority opinion of Texans. He is not the hand-picked candidate of a single special-interest group, as is his opponent. Nor does he represent ideas and philosophies foreign to the minds of a majority of Texans. Rather he represents a continuation of the conservative, responsible government which has led Texas to progress and prosperity.

From a West Texas point of view, Smith is an even more clear-cut choice. He is a West Texan; he understands our problems, our needs and our desires. Smith has always worked hard for West Texas interests in Austin; he has earned West Texans support. San Angeliens in particular should be inclined to feel gratitude toward Smith. He was instrumental in the establishment of Angelo State College and in its subsequent growth and development, he has proven to be a dependable and loyal friend in Austin.

If the majority of Texans vote Saturday, Preston Smith will be the victor—although it should be recognized that his victory is in no sense a shoo-in. Smith ran second to his opponent in the first primary; only three times in the history of Texas has a candidate for governor come from behind in the first primary to win the runoff. But the combined vote for Smith and the candidates who have endorsed him—Waggoner Carr, Eugene Locke and Dolph Briscoe—was more than double the total scored by Smith's liberal opponent in the first primary. The real question, then is whether enough Texans will vote to retain state control in the hands of the majority, whether they will through negligence allow its capture by a candidate representing a militant minority. The bigger the turnout, the larger will be Smith's margin—and the state of Texas will be better for it.

A PARSON'S EYE-VIEW OF SONORA

The summer vacation is here again. Parents are faced with the problem of what to do with their children, and the youngsters face the problem of what to do with their time.

I do not think my parents ever lost much sleep over this vacation time problem; when school was out, there was always a hoe handle just my size waiting for me. And there was always hoeing to be done.

Johnson grass had to be dug out by the roots, grass burrs had to be pulled by hand and burned. To say that my mother never worried about us was a mistake. She worried when we were out with a 22 hunting rabbits, she worried when we were at the old swimming hole, and she always worried about rattlesnakes.

My three brothers and I were by no means angels, and our parents had a right to worry about us when we were out of their sight. But we learned to work. We never so much as dreamed of a guaranteed annual income, all we wanted was a chance to work.

We built fences, the tanks, the barn, garage and house on my father's place, and we did it all the hard way. We took the materials we had at hand and did the best we could with them.

Looking back, I can see where I might have been a very discontented kid if I had been idle. I cannot truthfully say that I always enjoyed the work, some of it was tedious and back-breaking, but I did not spend much time worrying about such things as, "What will I do next?"

Not only did we work hard for everything we had, when there was time for relaxation, again we had to depend on our resources. In the winter on a rainy day, we would shell pop corn grown in my mother's garden, then we would make pop corn balls. We made most of the candy we ever ate; in those days.

In the summer when we could get ice out from town, we would make and freeze home made ice cream. We read everything we could get our hands on, including the Bible.

One reason I suppose I like the Psalms is because we used to have contests during revival meetings to see who had read the most chapters. The shorter Psalms became very familiar to me.

It is not an ideal life—and much of it I would not care to go back and relive. My parents did not watch television during the time I was growing up; but, if they had, they would not have needed the reminder every night at 10 o'clock, "Do you know where your children are?"

Methodists, this parson vainly and vainly hoped that someone would comment as he shook hands after the service, "We're glad you are planning to return another year." One by one they filed by and no one said a word.

Frances offered this consolation, "I think it is a good sign no one realized he was even supposed to wish for your return. Everyone seems to be taking it for granted."

No matter how secure a Methodist minister may feel, he knows he is subject to appointment at every annual conference, and there is always a possibility that he will be assigned to a different post to the one he is in at the time.

No matter how the other Methodists may feel, Frances and I are delighted with the prospect and expectation of being re-assigned to Sonora. The next town might not have a place on it's newspaper staff for a seeing-eye parson, then what would I do with my day off?

With one or two exceptions, our prospects for a garden were real good, but the caterpillars are a-bout to eat it all up. I have to leave my compadre, J.D. Cook to fight the battle of the invaders all week by himself.

Don't forget the united Vacation Church School that begins Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock at the Methodist Church. For the three age groups, kindergarten through sixth grade, there are eleven qualified teachers in addition, a number of teen-age assistants.

Former Sonoran, Claude T. Driskell, Is known as 'Clock Collecting Colonel'

This story appeared in a recent issue of the Air Force Times. It tells of an interesting hobby of a former Sonoran, Col. Claude Thomas Driskell, graduate of Sonora High School and son of Mrs. Tom (Juliet) Driskell, who still lives here.

How expensive can a four-dollar clock be? It could run as high as \$2500 according to Col. Claude T. Driskell, of the 4th Weather Wg., Ent AFB, Colo., if its purchase were to lead to the series of investments he has made in the past decade. The colonel collects and repairs antique clocks—a hobby he readily admits can involve a great deal of time, study and money. Over the years he has worked on approximately 36-50 clocks.

Interests in his early teens ultimately led to his collection of clocks. At that time he was an amateur machinist and made model car parts, model plane engines and gearings of different types. As years passed, he developed into a potential watchmaker and later became quite proficient at watch repair. He soon found out, however, that he couldn't have friends and repair watches gratis.

One Friday afternoon while attending Texas Technological College, he walked into his dormitory room and found some 21 watches his friends had left for repair. At that point, he gave up watch repair and did not enter into the horological field again until much later.

"I became interested in clocks," Colonel Driskell relates, "because it was easier for me to see the clock parts than it was the tiny watch parts. My wife gets the credit for the purchase of my first clock."

"My wife derives a great deal of pleasure from attending furniture auctions. At one such auction in Germany, as the result of either her scratching her nose or rubbing her hands to keep them warm, I bought my first clock. The auctioneer apparently interpreted her gesture as the winning bid of \$4 on an 1830 grandfather clock which didn't run."

After the second trip to the clock repair shop and after scrutinizing the mounting costs of keeping this old timepiece running, Colonel Driskell decided to do the job himself. Relying on his background of watch repair and new knowledge of clocks gained through research at the local AF library, he embarked on his own to rework the old clock.

According to the colonel, that was "the biggest mistake I ever made. Since that time I have invested an estimated \$2500 in clock-making tools and equipment and worked on (in my spare time) some 1500 grandfather clocks, 1500 later clocks, 800 wall clocks and 1200 and some-odd mantel clocks."

Clock collecting, he reports, is an interesting hobby from the mechanical standpoint, and he has done a good deal of work tracing clock movements. He has traced this evolution from the Dutch perfection of the attached pendulum (in about 1680 in Amsterdam) to the modern radiation-decay clock which is "probably the most accurate and the most expensive clock ever manufactured," he said. It is also possible to study the evolution of the grandfather clock by examining his present collection.

"It is difficult to be associated with a large number of clocks," Colonel Driskell said, "without becoming a compulsive purchaser of them." His collection reached maximum size in 1958 when he owned 475 clocks.

"Realism was bound to set in however," he continued, "which resulted in a de-escalation of the collection. I couldn't stand to see

the damage these old masterpieces suffered as a result of moving with the Air Force." Today, he has about 70 clocks which he feels are the cream of the crop of about 5000 "timekeepers" which have passed through his hands over the years.

The colonel started collecting clocks in late 1946 and has kept track of time ever since. The best way to accurately date a clock, he notes, is mechanically. It is a process for experts at which he does not feel entirely competent.

Listening to clock collectors describe their clocks has led to some of the most tragically comic situations he has ever encountered. Yesterday in Switzerland and on Clerkenwell Street in London exact duplicates of clocks made in 1580 to 1610 were turned out. Next year, some people will consider them genuine antiques. Even experts are occasionally caught.

"Clock collecting is a lot of fun," Colonel Driskell concluded, "but to a serious collector, it is extremely difficult and takes a great deal of study. A library of 50 or more books and a lot of research in both the mechanical and the furniture making fields is a necessity."

Special Coverage Protects Against Loss Involving Uninsured Drivers

What problems does the average Texas motorist face when injured by a driver who isn't insured?

Very few, if he has "uninsured motorists coverage" in his automobile insurance policy, reports the Insurance Information Institute.

This coverage, available in all 50 states, provides that the policyholder may collect from his own insurance company if he or passengers in his car are injured by someone who has no automobile liability insurance. The coverage includes injuries by hit-and-run motorists.

In Texas, insurance companies are required by a recently enacted law to offer uninsured motorists coverage to purchasers of automobile liability insurance. The cost is \$4 per year and the cover-

age can be declined. Uninsured motorists coverage also applies to injuries suffered by the policyholder or residents of his household if struck as pedestrians by an uninsured or hit-and-run driver.

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Taxpayers Ask IRS
Q—My son is taking a job this summer and plans to put most of the money he earns in the bank to pay his college expenses in the fall. If he earns over \$600, will we lose our dependency exemption for him?
A—If your son is under 19 or is a full-time student, the amount of money he earns will not disqualify him from being claimed as your dependent as long as the other dependency tests are met.
Q—My son is going to work this summer. How can he get a social security card?
A—Application for a social security number should be made on Form SS-5. This form is available at local Social Security and IRS Offices.

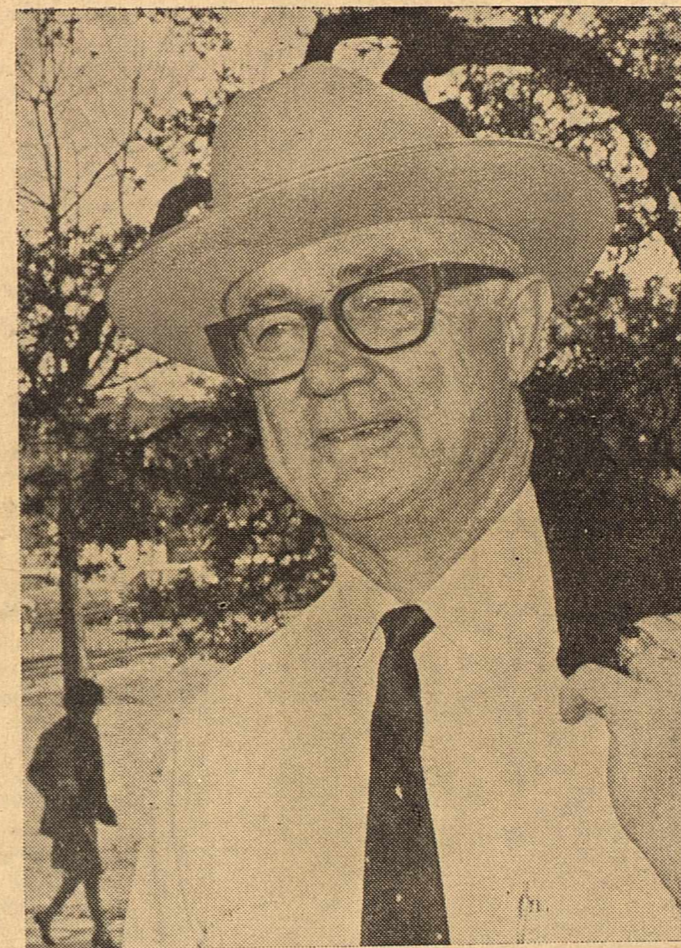
