Mr. and Mrs. John McClelland Sr., and John R. McClelland Jr., of Houston attended the exercises.

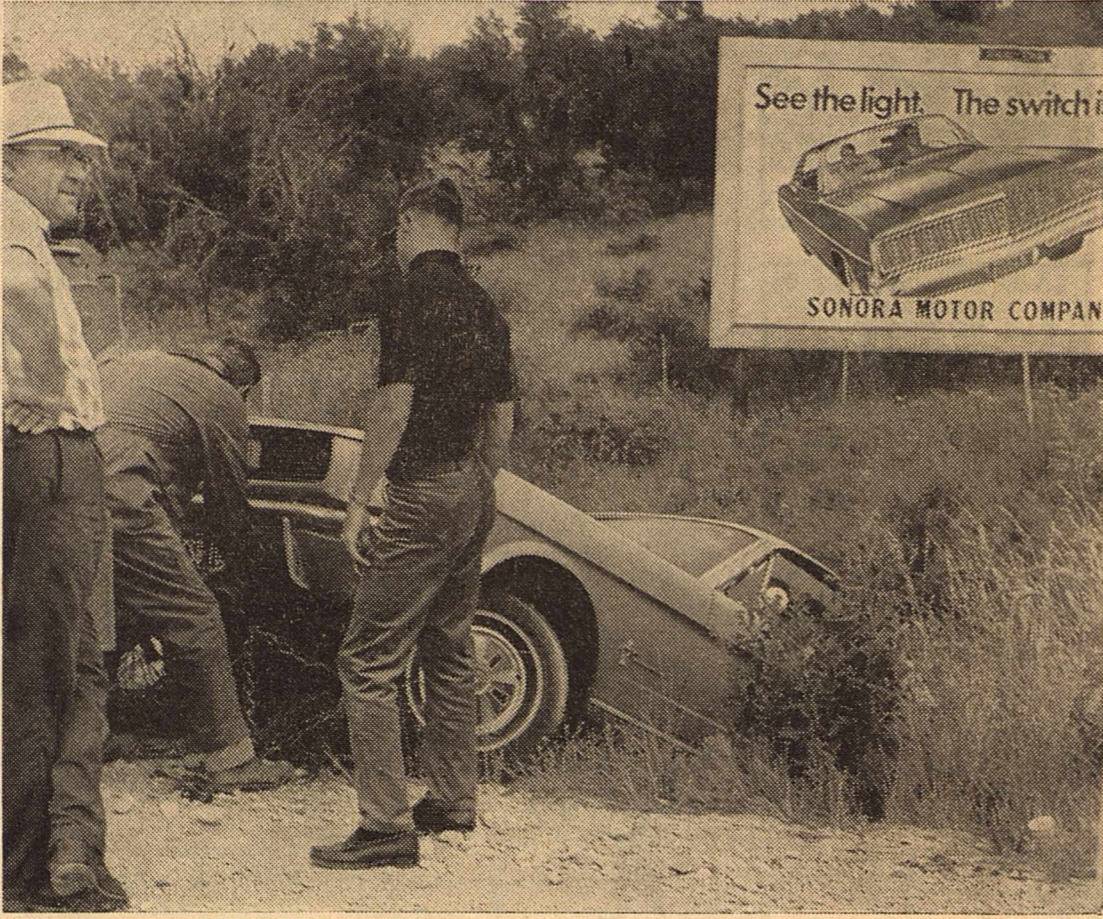

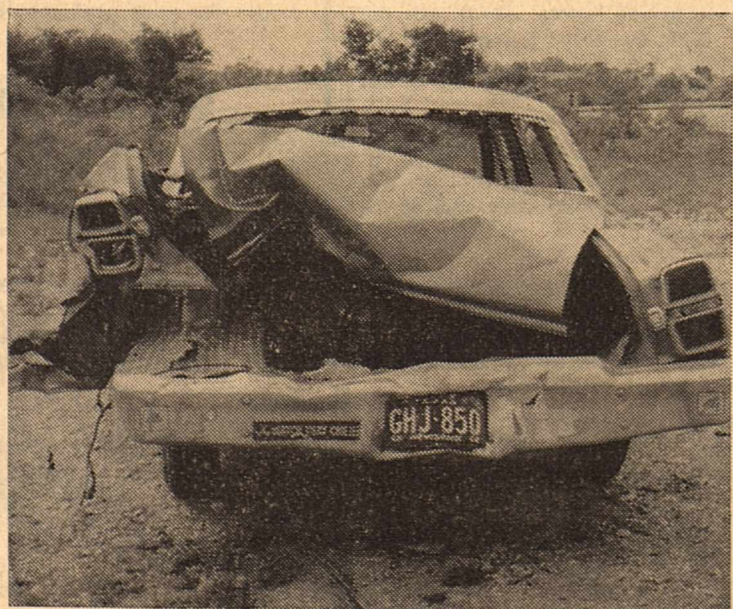

Rash of Auto Accidents Plagues County's Weekend

Highway patrolman Bill Webster had his busiest weekend in Sutton County in a long time when eight cars, a bus, and a parked truck were all involved in numerous accidents in various parts of the county from Saturday morning to 4:30 p.m. Sunday afternoon. Highways in the area were slick due to intermittent fall of light moisture during the two days.

Webster said the first accident occurred when a motorist hit a parked Western Gillette truck, damaging the front and rear of the car when it spun into the truck. Damage to the automobile was estimated between \$600 and \$700.

Returning from investigating this event, Webster was called to a point east of town where a car had gone into a ditch. Deputy Sheriff James Hough also went to the scene of the accident.

A driver coming over the hill onto the scene, and seeing the flashing red lights of the patrol car, slammed on his brakes. His car went into a one-and-one half spin on the rain-slick pavement, hitting the patrol car and the deputy's car before the motorist could bring the automobile to a stop.

In the meantime another driver applied his brakes when he came over the hill and saw the rash of automobiles piled up. Consequently the car following closely behind rammed the rear of his car, causing damage to both automobiles.

Scenes to be herald by the arrival of boats will include the time of the Indians, conquistadores, first mass settlement in 1869, arrival of the railroad, coming of Laughlin Air Force Base, and building of Amistad Dam.

Mrs. John M. Jones is chairman of the historical survey committee under whose supervision the celebration is organized. Civic organizations and clubs of the town are sponsoring "Old Town Del Rio," with Mrs. Gordon Walton chairman and Mrs. Noble Taylor co-chair.

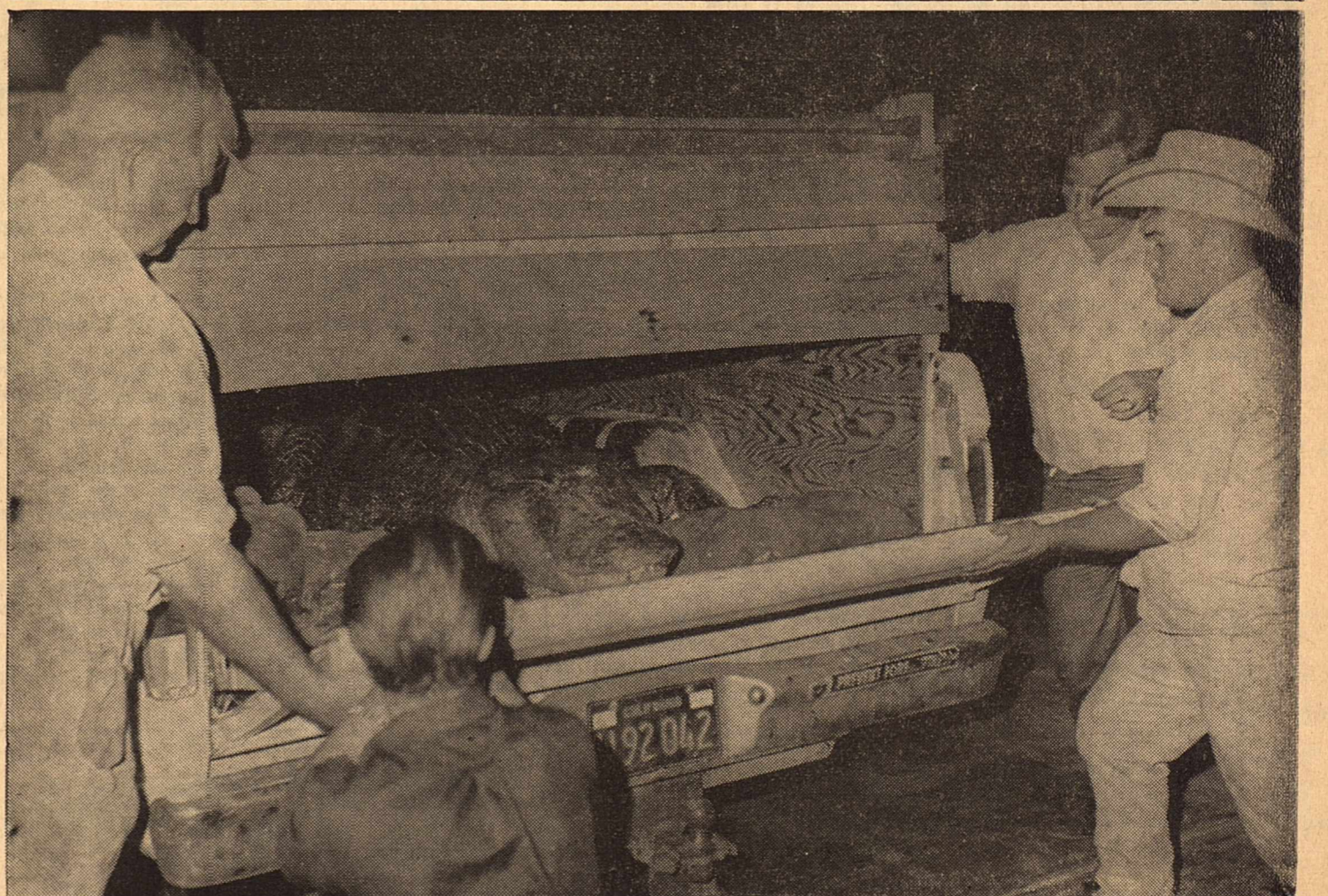

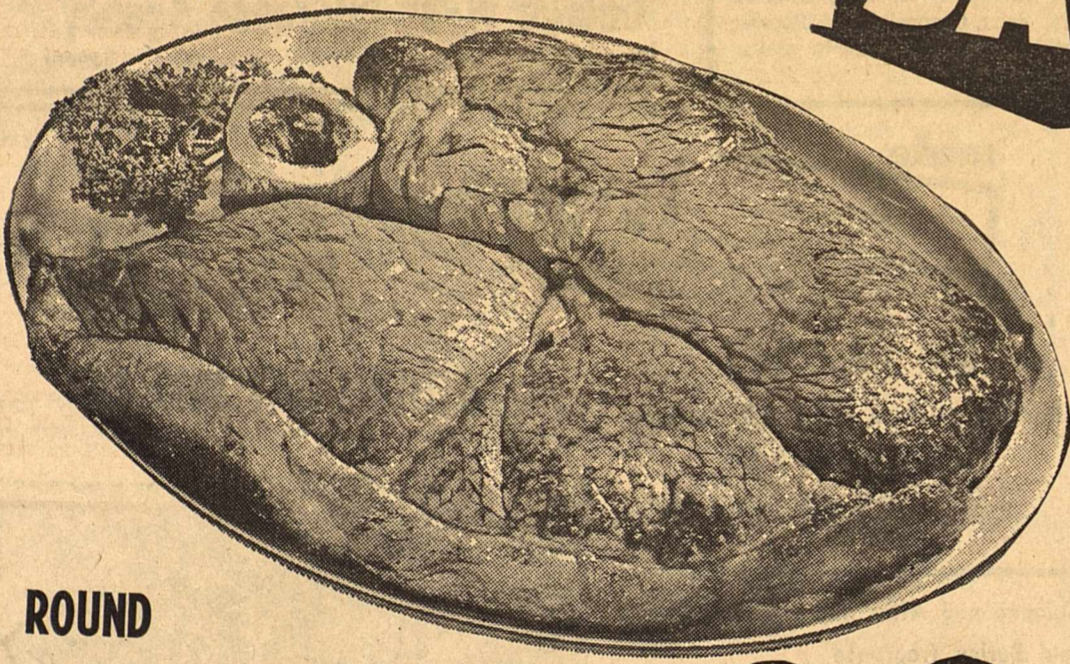

After the wedding, some twenty-five out of town guests were served a buffet dinner in the church basement. The newlyweds will make their home in San Antonio, where both are employed.

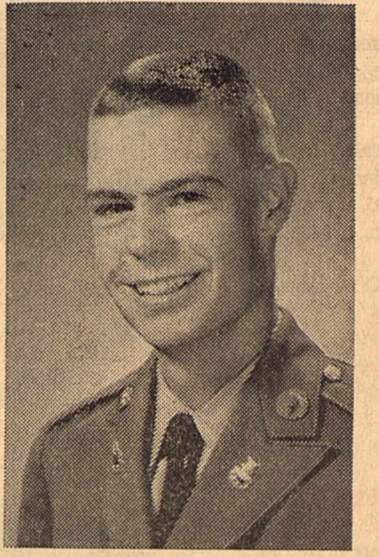
Schwiening Family Has Annual Reunion

Snakes Move Slowly
Snakes seem to move fast, but actually their maximum speed has been clocked at about five miles per hour.

Pheasant Hunting in Texas

Ever wonder about a baby elephant? It isn't weaned until it is about five years old.

Duel-Purpose Ice
A good way to have plenty of ice water when traveling is to fill milk cartons with water, freeze them solid, then place them in the water in your ice box. They keep the water cold and when all the water is gone the melted ice in the cartons can be used as drinking water.

Purposeful Beaks
Most shore birds have long, slender beaks, so they can dig for their food. But the Shoveler-type ducks have flattened beaks so they can scoop up their food from the mud.

Guns Don't Cause Crimes
Great Britain has very strict gun

laws, but its crime rate is increasing much faster than that in the United States.

Perfect Shotgun Scores
Think you are pretty good with a shotgun? Only seven perfect scores of 100 have been posted in the Grand American Handicap at Vandalia, Ohio, since trap was started 67 years ago.

Water Use Rising Fast
Water usage is increasing more than twice as fast as America's population. Consumption in 1900 was around 40 billion gallons daily. Now it's around 350 billion daily.

Hunters Travel Widely
U. S. hunters traveled nearly 10 billion auto-passenger miles in 1965. Half of that distance was just to hunt small game.

Avoid Jelly Fish
Be careful of jelly fish when you are on the coast. They propel their way through the water by alternately expanding and contracting their bodies. Their contact with the human body means a very painful and sometimes fatal experience.

Grizzlies Once in Texas

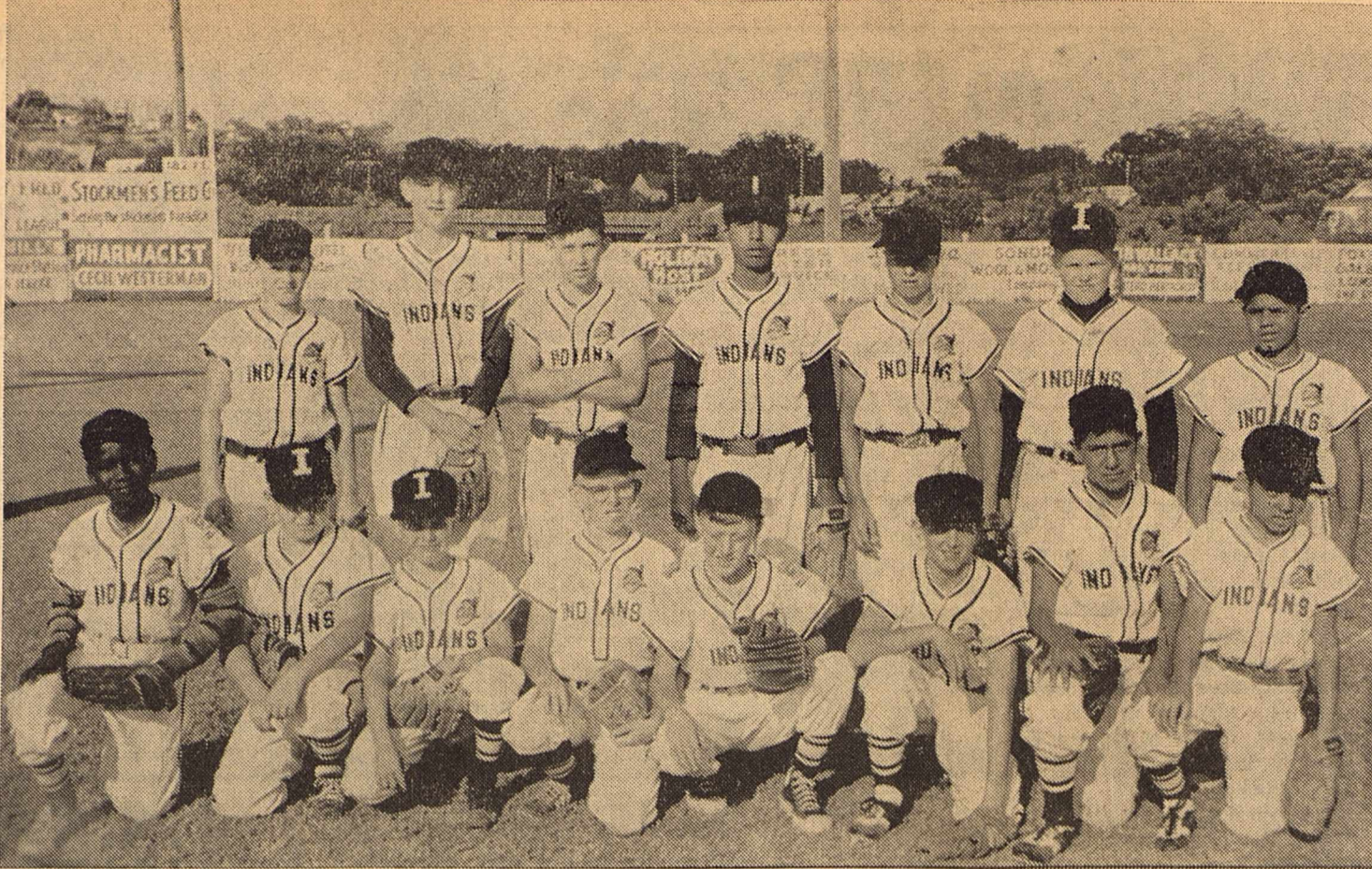
