City Commissioners Pass Fire Ordinance

The City Commissioners met Monday and adopted a fire prevention code and an advisory fire marshal ordinance to be effective immediately. Purchases of 4 protective clothing suits for firemen and 200 feet of fire hose were other suggestions made by J. C. Luttrell and Darcy Carroll. Commissioners approved the suggestion to paint the fire station inside and out.

Bob Cole, representative for General Telephone Company of the Southwest, heard counter-proposals made by the Commissioners on the increase in local telephone rates. The Commissioners' proposal, allowing General about one half of their requested hike, would put the following rates into effect: \$11.50, business-one party lines; \$5.75, residence one party lines; and \$9.00, rural business lines. General has asked for higher rates but will take into consideration the rates proposed by City Commissioners.

Suggestions to pave and widen Popular Street were approved in the Monday meeting.

Santa Fe Depot In Eldorado Due To Close

The recommendation that the Santa Fe railroad station be closed in Eldorado heard no protests at a hearing Monday morning. A special accountant for Santa Fe testified in Austin that the station is showing a loss.

Superintendent J. P. Spears of Slaton said that there are no regularly scheduled trains through Eldorado, and only about three pass through town every week.

Spears said that in the future Eldorado customers could deal with agencies at San Angelo and Sonora.

Bill Roberts, station agent in Sonora, said he had received no notification from the company on the closing of the Eldorado station. He said the declining business for railroads was the contributing factor in these matters.

The Church of the Good Shepherd will not hold services Sunday, August 11, it has been announced. On August 18 the church's regular worship schedule will resume, with morning worship beginning at 8:30 a.m. Coffee and doughnuts are usually served after this service.

Royce Miears underwent surgery at Baylor Hospital in Dallas Saturday for an injury to his knee received during the Sonora-Ozona football game last fall.

According to Freeman Miears, Royce's father, he was dismissed from the hospital Monday and will be back in Sonora later in the week.

Grass Fires Cause Concern in County

With the continuation of hot, dry weather, Sutton County ranchers are becoming more and more concerned over the recurrence of other range fires similar to the one at the Leonard Gibbs ranch last week. There have been several other grass fires in Sutton County.

Fire Marshall Darcy Carroll urges everyone to use car ash trays and to give extra attention to any camp fires. Carroll says these two things are the major causes of grass fires.

Sutton County has three trucks with high pressure hoses and nozzles available to fight grass fires. Carroll says ranchers with stock sprayers should keep them full and available at all times. Most of the sprayers hold enough water to extinguish a small fire if caught in time.

Registration Set For Kindergarten

Parents who wish to enter children in the Central Elementary Kindergarten are asked to register these children on Tuesday, August 13, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. To be eligible for kindergarten, a child must be five years old on or before September 1, 1968 and the parent must present a birth certificate at the time of registration.

The Kindergarten fee is \$10 per month, payable at the beginning of each month. A pupil may withdraw at any time, but once he does so, he may not re-enter.

Central Grades 1-6 Register Monday

Parents having children in grades one through six who will be new to Central Elementary school are asked to register their children Monday, August 12, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. For children entering grade 1 for the first time, and not having attended Central Elementary Kindergarten, a birth certificate will be needed at the time of registration. To enter grade 1, a child must be six years old on or before September 1, 1968.

"Registration is not necessary for those pupils who attended Kindergarten through sixth grades at Central Elementary last year, but we would like for parents of pupils who are new to the community to register their children early, thereby assisting us with our pre-school planning," said Central Elementary principal Clay Cade.

Connally Visits Fort McKavett On Texas Forts Trail Dedication

Gov. John Connally was presented an honorary membership certificate to the Menard County Historical Society on his recent tour of Texas Forts Trail when he visited Fort McKavett. Mrs. Lawrence Williamson of Menard made the presentation to the governor, who jokingly replied, "I'll accept this if I don't have to live here." Connally blushed copiously at the faux pas, but recovered quickly and laughed with everyone else when Mrs. Williamson told the Governor that Fort Concho museum officials said he could be a "Colonel" if he wished to retire to Fort Concho after his governorship, but she assured him he could be a "General" if he retired to Fort McKavett!

Connally's dedicatory trip of the Texas Forts trail started in Brownwood and ended 18 stops and two days later. His dedication was the fourth of the 10 travel trails designed to take Texans and visitors to scenic and historic spots.

At Fort McKavett, Connally met local and area residents in the old school house of the fort and took a tour of one of the three buildings the state owns at the fort site. County Judge John Winslow and Mrs. Williamson introduced the governor and presented him with a plate inscribed with a brief history of the fort. Local residents displayed collections of numerous relics and bottle collections found in the area of the fort. Larry Blair is the park superintendent in charge of the fort, and he and Mrs. Blair have been living in Fort McKavett since early June, when he was assigned to the fort.

Fort McKavett was born of the Mexican War and California gold rush. Robert Weddle of The Menard News gives an account of the fort history in his booklet "Fort McKavett, Where History Comes Alive."

The treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, which ended hostilities with Mexico, stipulated that the United States would stop the Plains Indians from raiding across the Rio Grande.

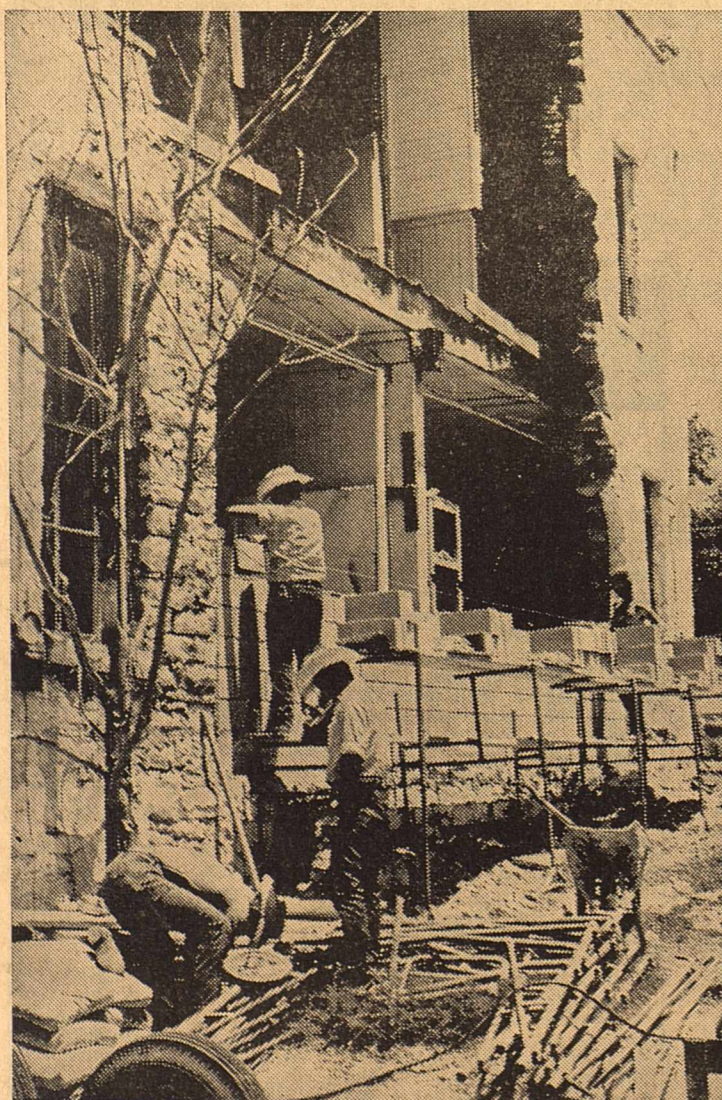
In 1848 when gold was discovered in California, the United States Army faced the task of finding trails to take the gold seekers across the continent, and of inventing ways to protect them. Outposts which were established had the multiple purpose of trying to keep the marauding Plains Indians out of Mexico, of protecting the emigrant trains in their westward march, and of making the frontier safe for settlement.

Fort McKavett came into being March 14, 1852. The military post first was known as Camp San Saba; the name later was changed to honor Captain Henry McKavett, a New Yorker who had fallen in the battle of Monterrey, September 21, 1846. During the 1850's of officers who were to distinguish themselves in the War Between the States served at the fort.

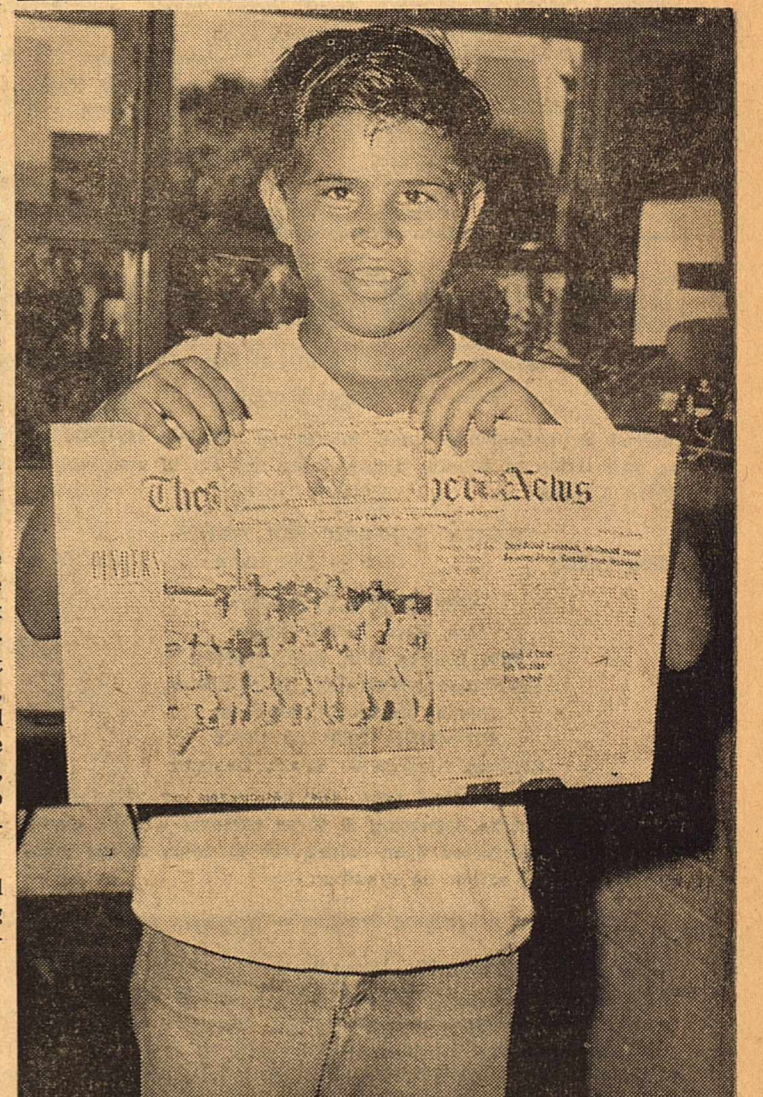
The fort was closed down in March of 1859 and abandoned, but in 1866 the special commission of the U. S. War Department called for reactivation of the fort and for establishment of Fort Concho in San Angelo. In March, of 1868 the Fourth Cavalry moved to Fort McKavett and the post again came to life.

In the autumn of 1874 the army finally drove the last large band of Comanches into the reservation at Fort Sill, and impending doom gathered over the frontier forts. Soldiers remained at posts like Fort McKavett for a time to make sure the Indians did not break out, and to keep peace until local authority was established, but the end was inevitable. In 1882, the Sixteenth Infantry marched away from McKavett, leaving one company behind. In June of 1883, Company D also marched off to Fort Concho to rejoin the regiment.

Amendments Analyzed

THE CONSTITUTIONAL amendments appearing on the ballot at the general election on November 5, 1968, are the remaining 14 of a total of 20 proposed by the 60th Legislature during the regular session in 1967. Six of the 20 amendments have already been considered and adopted by the Texas electorate. With the adoption of those six amendments on November 11, 1967, the Texas Constitution of 1876 has been amended a grand total of 184 times.

The six amendments adopted last year contained provisions, in brief, as follows: (1) gave permissive authority to counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than depositing it in separate funds corresponding to tax levies for each of four constitutional purposes — general fund, road and bridge fund, public improvement fund, and jury fund; (2) permitted participating by municipalities in operation of mental health, mental retardation, and public health services; (3) extended the veterans' land program by authorizing the sale of \$200,000,000 of state bonds to purchase lands for sale to veterans; (4) authorized counties to pay medical, doctor, and hospital bills of law-enforcement officers injured in line of duty; (5) authorized the Parks and Wildlife Department to issue and sell general obligation bonds in the amount of \$75,000,000 to finance acquisition and development of lands for state parks and recreation areas; and (6) permitted non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective positions under the state or United States government where there is no conflict of interest and where the state will benefit.

Each of the 14 proposed amendments to appear on the ballot on November 5, is hereby analyzed. The arguments "For" and "Against" are the arguments most commonly offered by proponents and opponents of each proposal, and each is listed here to aid the reader in the study of the proposed amendments.

Amendment No. 1— Relating to the Employees Retirement System of Texas and revising existing provisions concerning the management of the retirement, disability, and each compensation fund for officers and employees and the administration of the system.

Arguments: For: 1. In the modern concept of employment, pensions are an absolutely indispensable complement of wages. As they are earned and contractual by nature, not free gifts, it is important that public employees have confidence in the perpetuity of the retirement system. By establish-

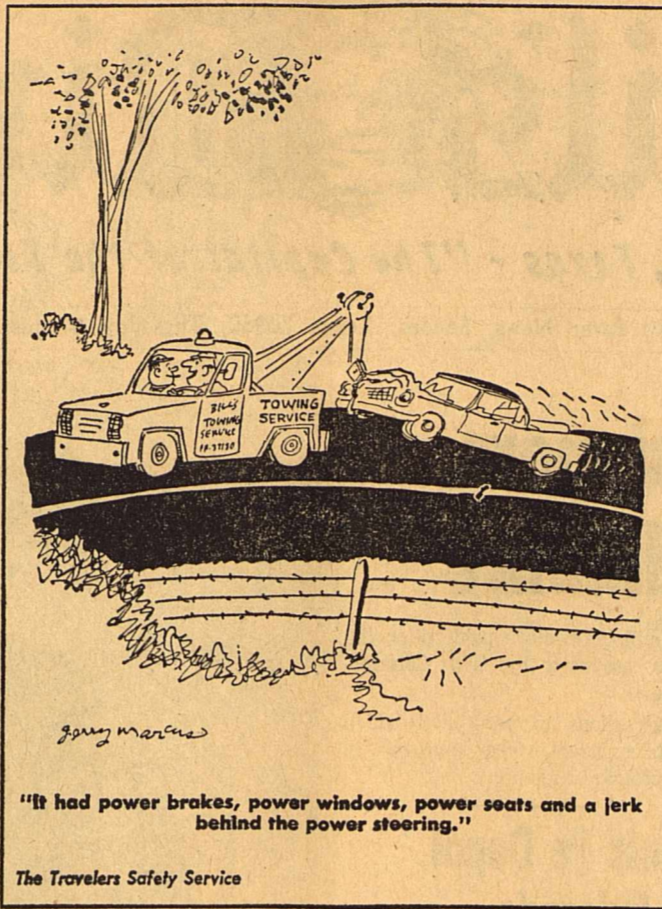

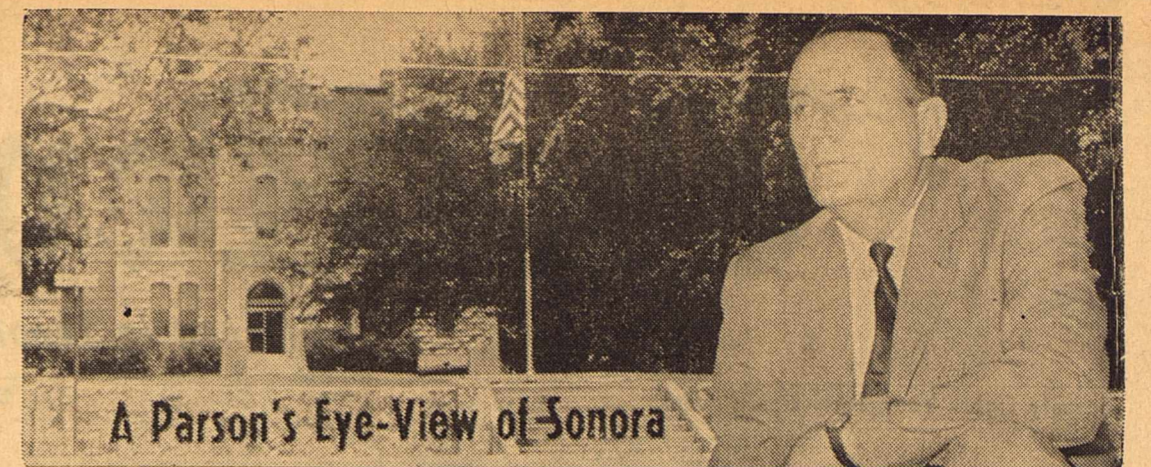

2. Included in Boston Fund's 19-67 study of college and university endowment funds were 17 funds, each with assets in excess of \$100,000,000. Only two of these funds had less than 50 percent of their money in corporate stocks. The range of corporate stock holdings was from 39 percent to 76 percent and the average was 59.5 percent. This compares with 30.6 percent for the Permanent University Fund. Clearly, the current restrictions on the operation of the Permanent University Fund are not in keeping with investment policies widely accepted and practiced by the more successful college and university endowment funds. The elimination of the 50 percent restriction on the ownership of corporate securities is a necessary step to the modernization of the operation of the Permanent University Fund.

PUBLIC NOTICE
 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE
 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

Section 3. The constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices, shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

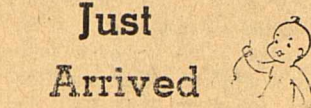

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJRI)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature determined, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided, further, however, that such monies and services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers by vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit for any defect whatsoever in or upon the eye or the visual apparatus of the eye, or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 10 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationary and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

"Section 1-j. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJRI24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJRI32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session; which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, for each county seat nor hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing for the investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for continuation on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for its proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to provide for the continuation of the system to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement until he has completed ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service; but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund."

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members of the state shall not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

(a) Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such fund shall be the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each person by the state."

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas as the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith, the general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as may be conferred upon it by law, and shall have the duty to make reports to the Legislature and the Governor of the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System, including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks; of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase; and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

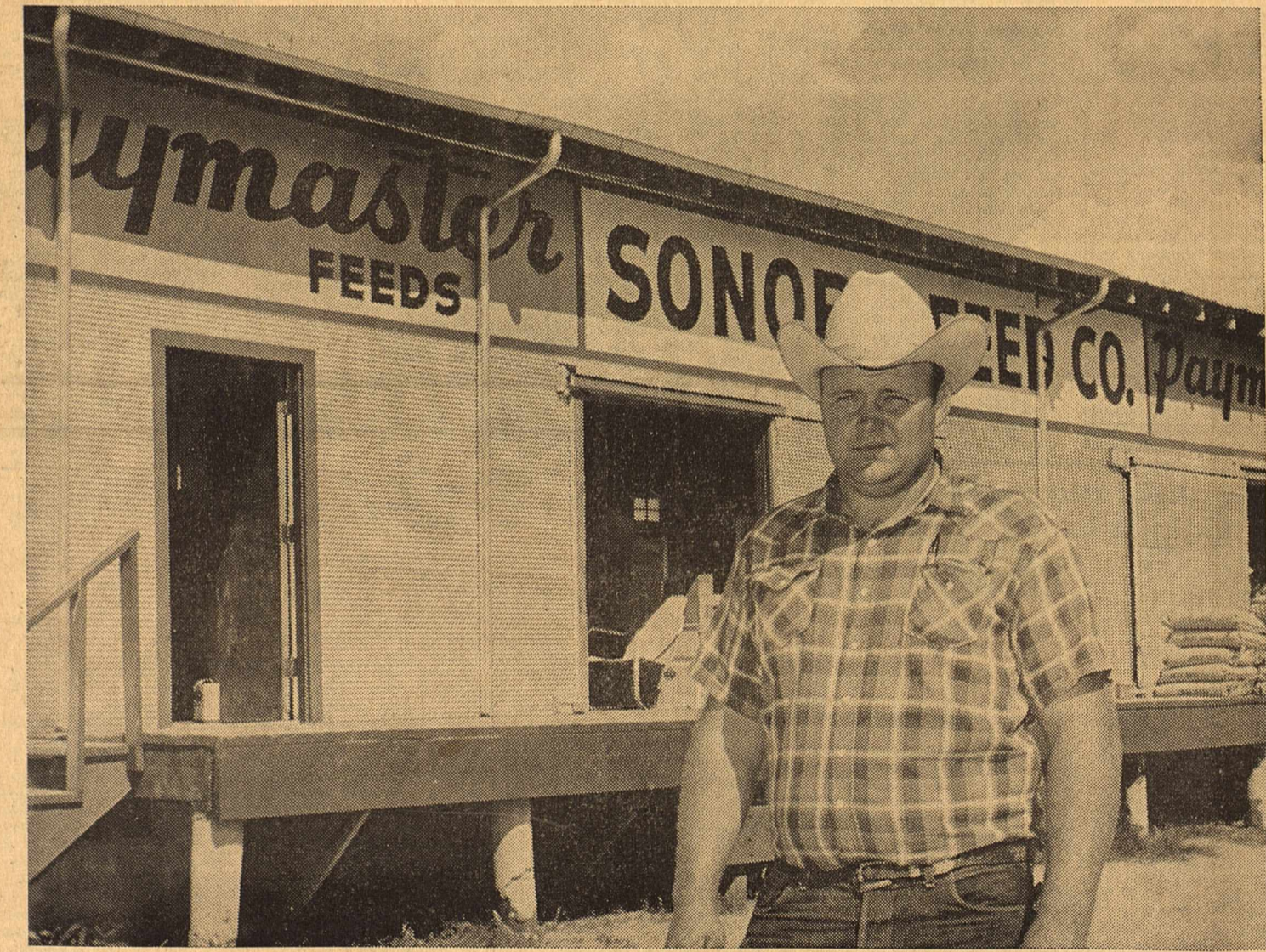
