"In Coahuila, the increase is 30 area times that of last July; and in Sonora, infestations are averaging 10 times greater than last summer. The Nuevo Leon increase is seven times that of last July; while Chihuahua is reporting four times as many cases as last summer; and Tamaulipas, three times as many outbreaks," Dr. Gartman adds, basing the statistics on July case reports compiled in Mexico.

These increasing Mexico cases and ideal weather for fertile fly propagation are compounding the eradication problem in the southwestern Unites States, Dr. M. E. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of field operations, explains. Attempts are being made to maintain the 2,000-mile barrier




