For Water System, Paving --

Council Calls Bond Election

A \$100,000 bond election has been called by Bovina's city council.

The election, if it carries, will provide funds for city water system improvements, another paving program, and for long term financing for major city facilities and equipment.

The election has been called for Saturday, January 15. The polls will be in the American Legion Hall.

Members of the city council have been considering such a bond election for the past few months. Details have been worked out during the past few weeks. The official action for calling the election was taken at a called meeting Tuesday (yesterday) afternoon.

Majority of the bonds will be water and sewer revenue. A total of \$60,000 of the \$100,000 total will be of this type. This money will be paid off from water and sewer revenue -- not from taxes. The funds will be used to provide water system improvements, primarily more water storage.

Another part of the three-part election will be for \$20,000 in tax bonds, also. This money will be used to pay the city's portion in a proposed paving program. This money will be used only if it is needed, city officials point out.

The third part will be for \$20,000 in tax bonds, also. This money will be used to pay the indebtedness on the new fire station, fire truck and street sweeper. By this amount of money being voted, the city will have a longer period of time to pay this indebtedness and thus will be in better condition financially, according to Mayor Boyd Gilreath.

Voters will vote on the three issues separately. It will be possible, for instance, for the paving bonds to carry and the fire station and water and sewer bonds to fail. Any one of the three may carry or be defeated without any bearing on the others.

Bob Estes, president of First State Bank of Bovina, will handle the bonds for the city if the propositions carry.

"Issuing the bonds will cause no apparent need for an increase in taxes," Mayor Gilreath points out. "If the town continues to grow at its present rate, the natural growth will be enough to take care of the bonds as they mature. The paving bonds could possibly create a need for a slight increase in our tax rate, which is considered 'very low' at present."

The city's present tax rate

is \$1.15 per \$100 valuation. The assessed tax value is 25 per cent of actual value. For instance, a \$2,000 house has an assessed value of \$500. Multiplied by the tax rate of \$1.15, city taxes on such a house would be \$575 per year. A raise of 10 cents in the rate, to \$1.25, for example, would increase the yearly taxes \$3 -- to \$37.50 per year. The maximum tax rate is \$1.50.

"Our city is in serious need of water storage," the mayor points out. "During a dry spell last summer, our supply of water storage was dangerously low

and we were almost at the point of having to prohibit the use of water for irrigation. Unless we add storage, this situation will get worse as our population increases."

The need for another paving program for the city has been known by some property owners almost since the last blocks of paving were added a few years ago.

The fire station bond issue would be a financial convenience to the city. It would be able to pay off present indebtedness over a longer period of (Continued on Page 2)

ASCS Announces Program Deadlines

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- The following news release concerning dates and deadlines for the 1966 farm program was prepared by Prentice Mills, Farmer County ASCS office manager.)

Farm operators and other persons (including landowners) should take notice of the dates and facts mentioned here.

1. Persons interested in transferring cotton acreage by sale, lease or other means are reminded that their application for such transfer must be filed with the ASCS Office by January 3, 1966. This, of course, means the transferring ASC office.

2. The final date for releasing cotton acreage or requesting cotton from those acres released is January 28, 1966.

The sign-up period under the 1966 Cotton, Wheat, Feed Grain and Cropland Adjustment Program will start on January 24, 1966 and end April 1, 1966. The exception is that persons desiring to participate in the Cropland Adjustment Program will be until May 30, to sign agreement.

3. Dates of yields, payment and base acreages will be called to farm operators by the middle of January. Probably sometime in the 14th and 20th day of month.

Crops Good, Town Grows

After midnight Friday, the Year 1965 will be folded back into the pages of history. In Farmer County and in Bovina, '65 was considered a good year.

Agriculturally, the year was one of the better ones as production was high on almost all crops produced here. There were, however, some disappointments for farmers, but they weren't considered major ones.

The growth pattern for the town, which was established several years ago, continued to be followed. School enrollment hit a record high. A number of new residences were constructed. Also, a new city fire station-warehouse was built and put into use. First State Bank moved into its ultra-modern new building in December. Construction was started on a new post-office. The overall outlook was good for the community and its people.

The year saw a bi-district championship in girls basketball and the Bovina Mustangs earned the right to represent District 1-B in football playoff action for the second consecutive season. A progressive step was noted when the announcement was made that Bovina High would compete in Class A after the present school year.

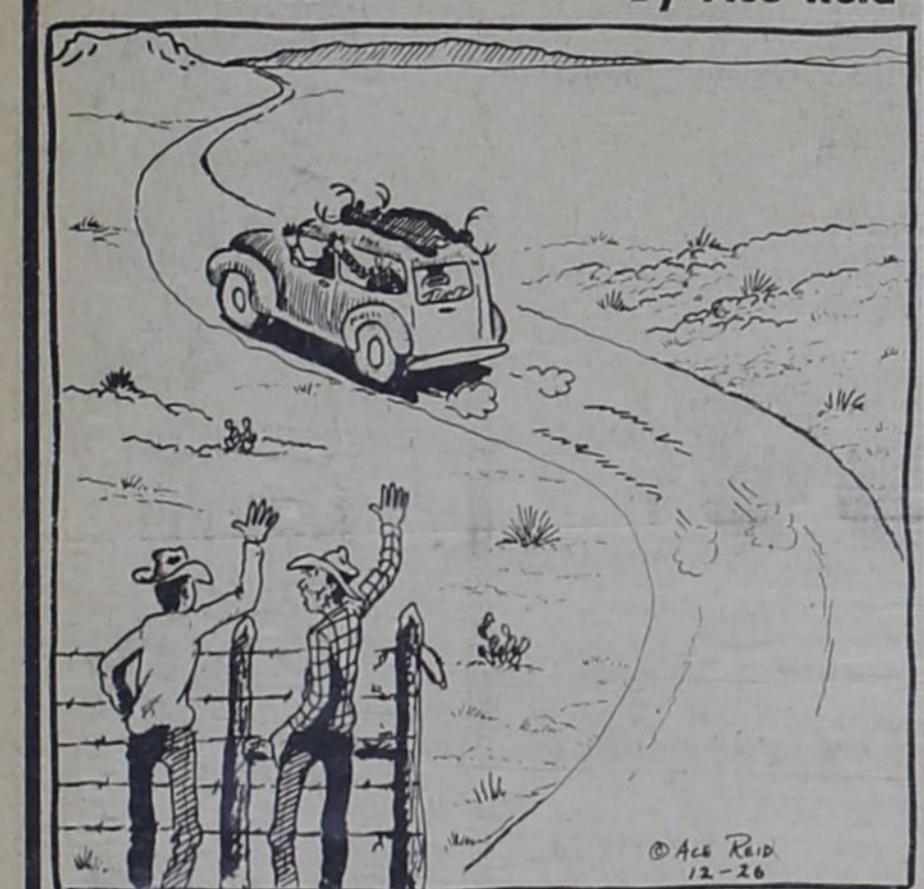

Bovina And Rhea!

On The Farm In Parmer County

By JOE VANZANDT
County Agent

We are planning a series of county-wide farmer meetings to help keep everyone up-to-date on the latest development in agriculture this winter.

The first meeting is Thursday night, January 13, at 7 p.m., in Bovina School Cafeteria. We have three extension specialists for this meeting, James Valentine, Area Soil Chemist; W. N. Lyle, Area Irrigation Specialist; and James Murphrey, Area Farm Management Specialist.

These men will be discussing fertilizers, fertilizer recommendations, and new developments in the fertilizer industry. Value of soil and plant food lost in water run off and practical methods to reduce this will be discussed along with value and management of crop residues. Also, the management of fertilizer and water applications to get the highest net return from various crops will be discussed.

We urge everyone concerned, both farmers and businessmen, to attend this meeting on January 13 to hear the latest on fertilizers, irrigation and management of these two crop inputs. Meetings on herbicides, diseases and insects will be held in February and March. Also a meeting for livestock producers mainly on beef cattle developments will be held in February.

By attending this series of meetings a person can learn about recent developments and the latest recommended production practices that have been produced by research to be practical.

LIVESTOCK LOOKOUT FOR 1966

Prospects for livestock prices for the coming year are quite bright. Lower cattle numbers, a smaller calf crop, and a reduced slaughter level should hold fed cattle and feeder calf prices well above year-earlier levels.

Also, 1966 may well represent one of the most profitable years experienced by sheep and lamb producers since the early 1950's.

Still lower supply of hogs during the first half of 1966 will again allow hogs to set new record high prices. For the last half, prices will be influenced by how fast the apparent expansion in hog numbers builds up. But, based on past production cycles, there is real danger of over-expansion and low prices in 1967.

CATTLE LICE

Cattlemen should be on the lookout for the annual invasion of lice on their livestock. These pests can take a real bite out of profits unless they are controlled.

We suggest that livestock producers get a copy of Extension publication, MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry."

This publication is "chuck-full" of information on insecticide formulations and how to use them in controlling flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs.

Get a head start on lice this fall and winter by starting a sound control program now. The above bulletin is a good guide for such a program and is available without cost from my office.

maximum maturity being not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, for the purpose of improving and extending the City's Waterworks System, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Article 1111, et seqq., V.A.T.C.S., each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate of not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Bovina, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing and equipping a fire station building in and for said City, and the acquisition of a site therefor; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the AMERICAN LEGION HALL in the CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

- L. M. GRISSOM - Presiding Judge
 - A. B. Wilkinson - Alternate Presiding Judge
- If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than two (2) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.
- ABSENTEE VOTING** shall be conducted at the City Secretary's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 58th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3
