Most people believe they are not eligible for Medicare benefits until they are 65. And they are rightalmost. Actually they are eligible for Medicare beginning with the first day of the month they be-

But those whose birthday falls on the first day of a month can be covered by Medicare for the entire month preceding their birthdays. That is because a person day before his birthday.

An application to establish full Medicare coverage must be filed during the three-month period before the month one becomes 65 to assure entitlement for that same


month. But anyone who has a birthday on the first of a month cannot wait until the preceding month to file. For example, one who was born February 1, 1904, needs to file an application no later than December, 1968, as legally he will be 65 on the last day of January.
