His family moved to Baker's Crossing on the Devil's River, in 1880, and he spent his adult years as a rancher there.







In a meeting May 15, HEW officer Ed Kelson of Dallas, discussed the recommendations made by Title IV team for utilizing the public schools and made suggestions to board members. Attending the meeting were board members George Wallace, L. P. Bloodworth, Armer Earwood, Bill Morriss, Gene Shurley, Bill Tittle, Bob Teaff, and superintendent, Ralph J. Finklea. Rex Lowe was also present at the meeting.

Kelson discussed two of the alternate plans the Title IV team had suggested as methods to be studied to bring the school system in compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Basically Plan I calls for all students in grades kindergarten through three, approximately 310 students to attend the L. W. Elliott school which has facilities for housing 340 students.

Also included in the plan, all students in grades four through six, would attend Central Elementary; grades seven and eight to Junior High, and grades nine through twelve to Senior High

Another plan, known as Plan II. calls for all students in grades kindergarten through six, approximately 525 students, be assigned to Central and Junior High schools. These two facilities have the capacity to house 598 stu-


All students in grades seven and eight, about 175 could be assigned to the Elliott School. All students in grades nine through twelve would be assigned to Senior High School, as they have been in the past.

Kelson pointed out that these two plans were not the only methods available to the school district for achieving compliance. Also discussed was the posibility of closing Elliott school, though the Title IV team perceives some additional problems would occur if this plan is carried out.

The closing of Elliott school with the 1964 Civil Rights Act. may provide the easiest route from the standpoint of present popular acceptability, but they feel the long range soundness of this move is questionable.

The anticipated enrollment for 1969-70 is 1,003 students, and present permanent facilities have a capacity for 1.326 students. This figure is based on sixteen classrooms in high school; nine at junior high; fourteen at Central, and twelve at Elliott.

Plans are being studied by the board members to adopt the most feasible plan for the community as a whole. Transition will have to be made, possibly in the near future, and the problem facing the administration is how it can best be accomplished, according to Armer Earwood, president of the school board.

# **Can The University Survive Present** Dissension In Regards To Law And Order?

is the current discussion about the rights and wrongs of protest demonstrations on the nation's campuses, and the question of whether the university will be able to survive or not.

In a recent issue of "This Week" the paper asked the Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh of Notre Dame to again give his views on the demonstrations. Hesburgh had expressed his views to Notre Dame's students, faculty and parents of students in a letter. President Nixon praised his views and has since maned Hesburgh chairman of the United States Commission on Civil Rights.

Hesburgh states that the best salvation for a university in the face of any crisis is for the university community to save itself, by declaring its own ground rules and basic values. He says

Uppermost in everyone's mind they shoul be enforced first with moral persuasion, and then with suspension and expulsion for participants in any movement against the university life and values. He emphasises this is particularly true in the case of violence, vandalism and mob action.

He feels that if persuasion and academic sanctions fail to stop the rioting or acts of vandalism, then it is the university's place to call for outside assistance. He feels they are the best judge of when that need arises, and should not hesitate to call for help-no more than they would ask for help in a three-alarm fire on the

Some university presidents feel that they would loose the respect of the university community if they call in the law, he adds, but he notes that argument is without grounds. Without the law the school could be lost, and more important a larger society outside the campus losses respect for the university when these things are allowed to go un-

A good point he raised was-if someone invades your home, do you dialogue with him or call the law? It is quite true that without the law the school is a sitting duck for any small and irresponsible group from the outside or inside of the campus that wishes to destroy or terrorize it.

Notre Dame was criticized on their stand by one university president who felt we are too quick to attack the young and blame the young. But Hesburgh feels that far from blaming the young, he believes that today's students are more informed, more widely read, better educated, more idealist, and perhaps more ready to dedicate themselves to good rather than selfish goals. Even the most far-out students are trying to say something, and all universities recognize the right and validity of protest and dissent regarding the outstanding issues of the day, especially war

Displays of force and violence do not solve the problems as they exist, and issues should be discussed in a civil and rational way that does not interrupt the life of the colleges and univer-

Hesburgh warns students that unless the universities are allowed to control the schools others will step in and do the controlling for them, and he feels that this would indeed be a supression of liberty. A greater achievement of justice with more compassion for all, and real love between generations are some of the things he feels are necessary to keep from destroying the university life as we have known it.

# **Moisture Conditions Now Favorable** For Aerial Spraying of Mesquite

Good moisture conditions dur- treated again. ed a bumper growth of mesquite leaves. Research has shown that good growing conditions are important in getting the best control treatment from aerial spray-

ing with plant hormones.

Aerial spraying of mesquite with 2-4-5T has started in the Edwards Plateau soil and water conservation district, and will continue through June. The hormone spray, 2-4-5T is widely used in aerial spraying of mesquite.

When moisture conditions are good, as at the present time, 2-4-5T will usually kill over 95 percent of the top growth. The root kill, however, varies from about 5 to 30 percent in this area. The mesquite re-sprouts and in
