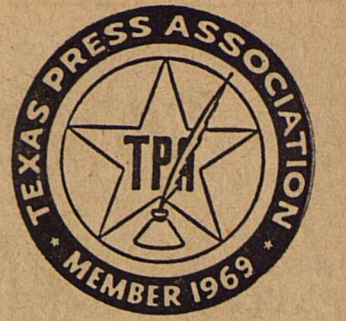

Last Rites Held For Pioneer Area Ranchman

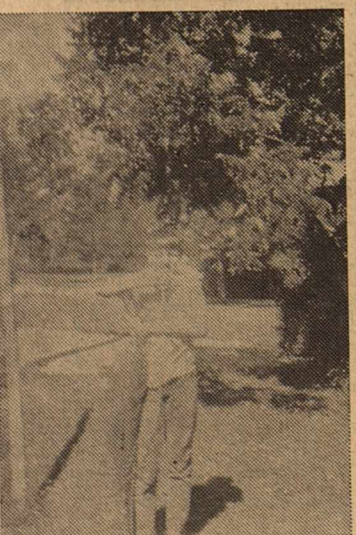

His family moved to Baker's Crossing on the Devil's River, in 1880, and he spent his adult years as a rancher there.

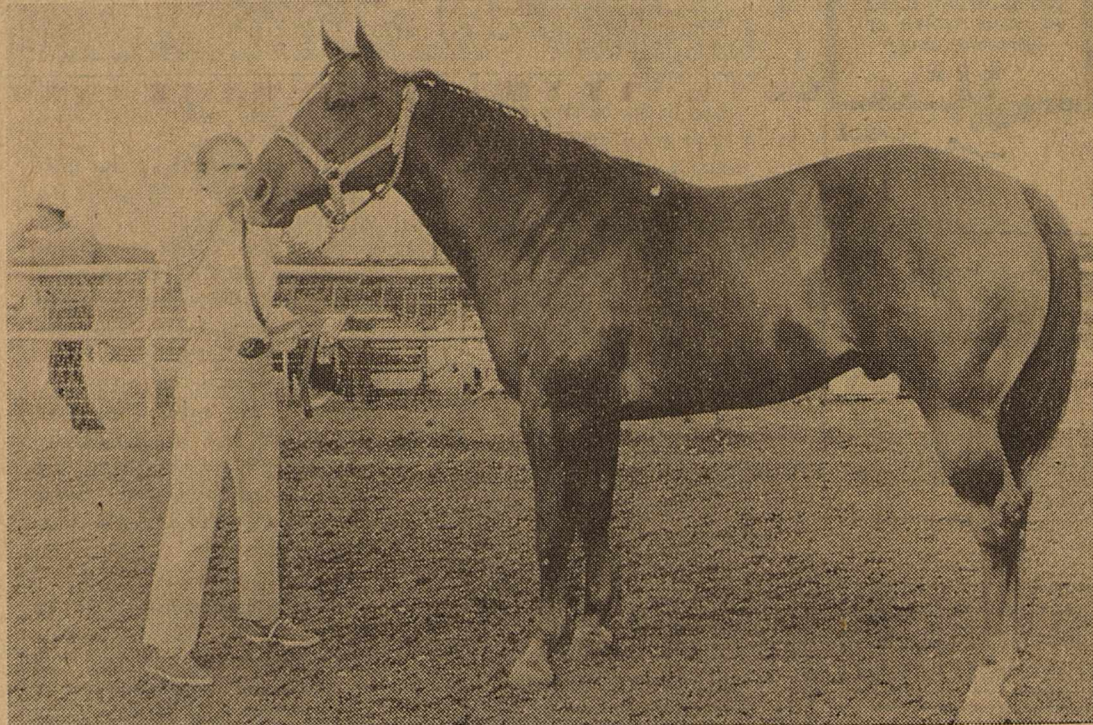

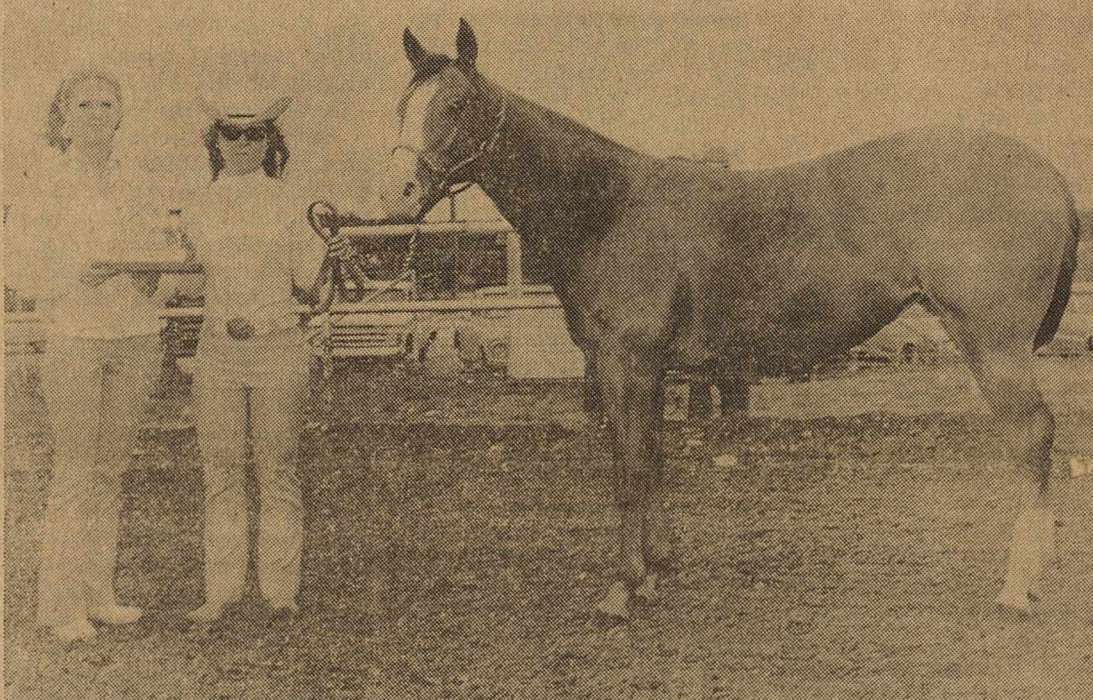

Rex Lowe Declines To Accept Position As Superintendent of Sonora Schools

Rex W. Lowe in a letter addressed to Armer Earwood, president Board of Education and citizens of Sutton County, stated that he declined to accept the position of superintendent of Sonora Schools.

School Board members met Tuesday at 8 p.m. to formulate plans and discuss procedures for obtaining a superintendent for the schools.

In his letter Lowe said: "Please accept my request not to report for duty as Superintendent of Schools for the Sonora ISD on July 1, 1969. I have been asked to accept the Assistant Superintendency Schools of San Angelo, subject to Board Approval. After serious consideration, I decided to remain here for professional and health reasons.

Your asking me to serve again is the highest honor any educator can possibly receive, and I accepted in the deepest and most sincere belief that I could be of some benefit to the school age children of Sutton County.

Weekend after weekend, I made trips to Sonora, talking to its citizens and teachers in an attempt to set the stage for a rewarding and wholesome year. Maybe these weeks of work and effort will have some salutary effect in the future.

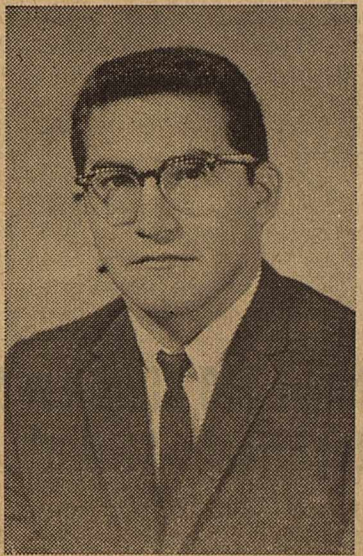
To return to Sonora with its attendant responsibilities would not have been in the best interests of Sutton County youth or my family. The realization that I could not return to serve Sonora youth and its citizens was a shocking and traumatic experience. Not to be able to pick up the gauntlet and meet the challenge is a soul-searing experience that never leaves an individual the same again. Man comes this way only once; to by-pass an obstacle or to avoid a thorny problem can either be wise, cowardly or foolish. I realize that some will be harsh in their judgment because the question can rightly be asked—why accept and then refuse. I can only say that I accepted

with the deepest sincerity. No man ever lived who never made a mistake; mine was a mistake of the heart and not of the mind. My desire to serve was sincere. The final decision that I couldn't was heart-breaking.

In any case, the action was not taken lightly nor for selfish reasons. When one has served a school for twenty-one years—the best years of his life—no action concerning its future is taken lightly and without the most agonizing emotion. In any case, each of us is "just a speck of reason afloat on a sea of emotion."

My family's roots go very, very deep in the soil of Sutton County. If I have embarrassed or hurt anyone, I apologize with all my heart. No blame can be attached to the Board as it hired me in good faith—in the belief that I would come, and my resignation in no way reflects to their discredit. The men who serve on your Board of Education are fine

H.E.W. Official Discusses Plan For Utilizing Sonora Schools

Although the June 1 deadline for elimination of Sonora's dual school system was cancelled by HEW authorities, the system will eventually have to be abolished.

In a meeting May 15, HEW officer Ed Kelson of Dallas, discussed the recommendations made by Title IV team for utilizing the public schools and made suggestions to board members. Attending the meeting were board members George Wallace, L. P. Bloodworth, Armer Earwood, Bill Morris, Gene Shurley, Bill Tittle, Bob Teaff, and superintendent, Ralph J. Finklea. Rex Lowe was also present at the meeting.

Kelson discussed two of the alternate plans the Title IV team had suggested as methods to be studied to bring the school system in compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Basically Plan I calls for all students in grades kindergarten through three, approximately 310 students to attend the L. W. Elliott school which has facilities for housing 340 students.

Also included in the plan, all students in grades four through six, would attend Central Elementary; grades seven and eight to Junior High, and grades nine through twelve to Senior High School.

Another plan, known as Plan II, calls for all students in grades kindergarten through six, approximately 525 students, be assigned to Central and Junior High schools. These two facilities have the capacity to house 538 students.

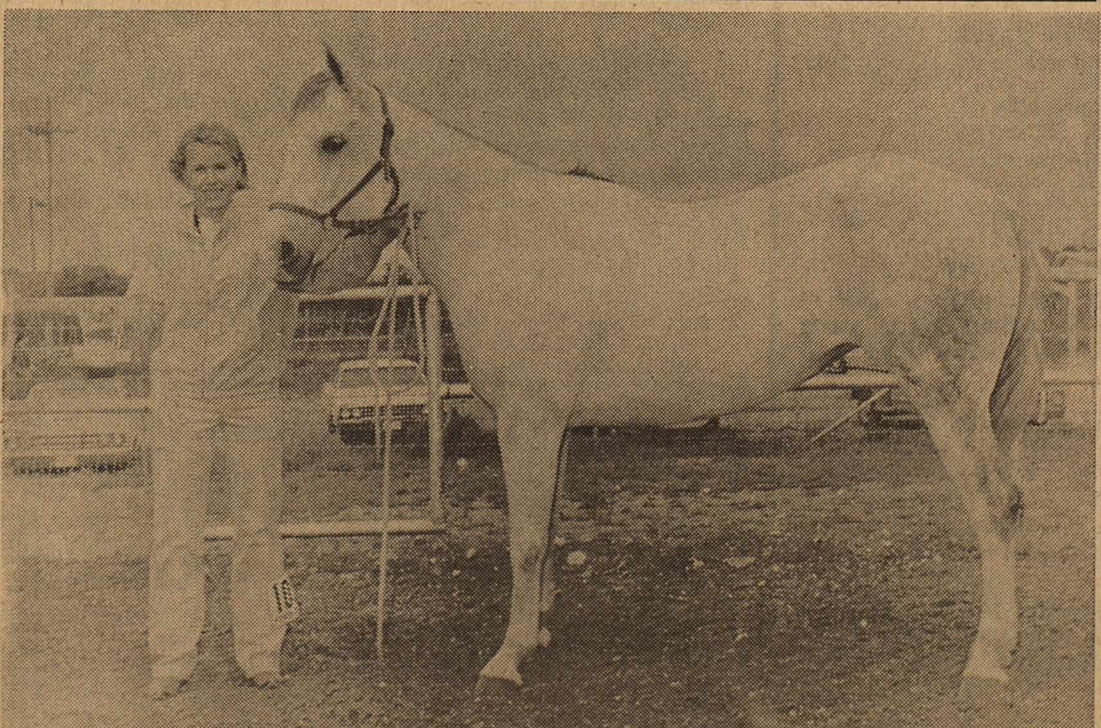
All students in grades seven and eight, about 175 could be assigned to the Elliott School. All students in grades nine through twelve would be assigned to Senior High School, as they have been in the past.

Kelson pointed out that these two plans were not the only methods available to the school district for achieving compliance. Also discussed was the possibility of closing Elliott school, though the Title IV team perceives some additional problems would occur if this plan is carried out.

The closing of Elliott school with the 1964 Civil Rights Act, may provide the easiest route from the standpoint of present popular acceptability, but they feel the long range soundness of this move is questionable.

The anticipated enrollment for 1969-70 is 1,003 students, and present permanent facilities have a capacity for 1,326 students. This figure is based on sixteen classrooms in high school; nine at junior high; fourteen at Central, and twelve at Elliott.

Plans are being studied by the board members to adopt the most feasible plan for the community as a whole. Transition will have to be made, possibly in the near future, and the problem facing the administration is how it can best be accomplished, according to Armer Earwood, president of the school board.

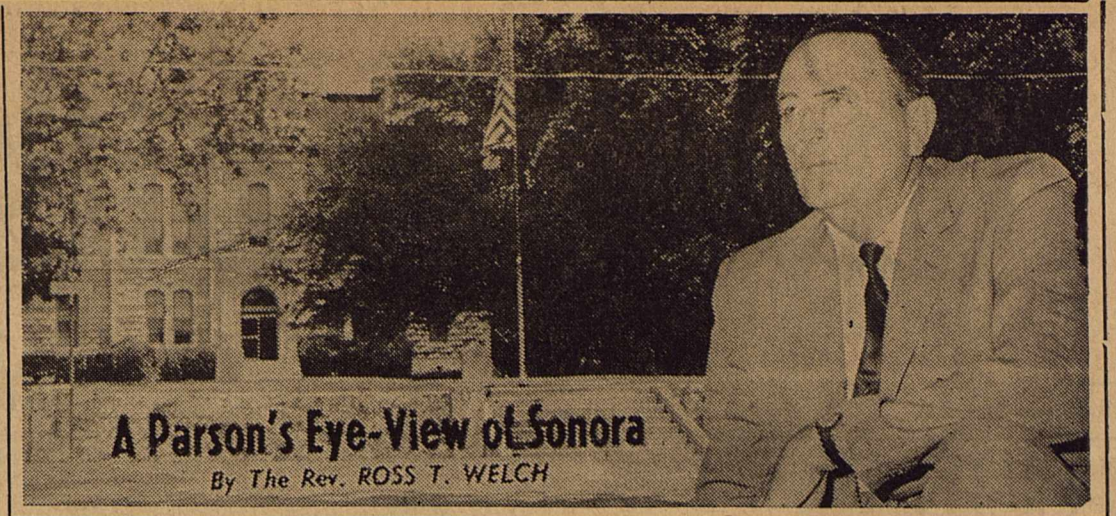

A Parson's Eye-View of Sonora By The Rev. ROSS T. WELCH

This is the hardest column that I have put together in the three years I have been writing for the Devil. This is the last. Next Sunday evening we leave for the sessions of annual conference at Corpus Christi, at which time we will be given a different appointment. After the conference we shall return with just enough time to move.

It is not easy to write a weekly column. Deadlines come with startling regularity. Perhaps a parson should not be a columnist anyway, he probably reveals more about himself than others ought to know.

In the course of three years any writer makes a good many mistakes, and the preacher is the one person in the community who should make few. On the other hand, it has been a lot of fun. I feel I have friends across the nation and in the military service—wherever this Devil goes. I seldom meet strangers who live in Sutton County or have ever lived here. I may not know their names, but when they say, "I read your column every week," we stand on common ground.

I have tried to encourage and promote everything worthwhile in the community that I have known about. I have attempted to lend support to those persons who are working to make Sutton County a better place. If I have ever spoken adversely, it was meant to be helpful criticism. We have enjoyed Sonora. Compared to South Texas, where most of our ministry has been, this climate is almost ideal. Most of the people here have been friendly and generous. We have felt that we were part of the entire community, not just of one congregation.

We do not know where we are going. This will be decided in the aforementioned conference session. We do not know who will come in our place. We can only wish for them the utmost success and a long and happy pastorate here.

Last Friday I visited with Dr. Howell at the Baptist Memorial Hospital in San Angelo. He looked

very well and was in good spirits. I had to do most of the talking, only occasionally would he articulate. Before I left, I said to him, "Everyone in Sonora will be asking, 'How is Dr. Howell? Can he talk?' Why don't you give me a message I can take back to all your friends?" After a pause, he said very plainly; "Tell them I'm OK." I have not had an opportunity to talk with his physicians, but to the layman's eyes it appears our beloved senior doctor is making progress.

Most everyone agreed that the setting for last Saturday night's Junior-Senior Banquet was one of the nicest ever achieved in Sonora. Members of the senior class were curious that so much should have been achieved in such short time. Behind their amazement there is a story, which I shall not tell in full, lest I be accused of bragging too much on my wife. Suffice it to say that as soon as Christmas was behind us, Frances started worrying, planning and working for this banquet. The parsonage has been a sort of Santa Claus' workshop ever since. If guests came to spend the night, they — too — were set to work. Foul, fish or flower—you name it; we made it. Most of the time I was a reluctant assistant—Frances did the work. This is not to minimize what other sponsors and the room mothers and the members of the junior class did. When it was necessary, they worked willingly and effectively. Credit is also due the Fling Ding Association for use of some of their props. But casual observers might not be aware that literally months of planning, purchasing and preparation went into the 'big night' that many of the seniors missed entirely. Classmates were delighted to

see Dick and Lucy Bundy back for the banquet and dance. Most of the seniors were in their respective churches the following morning—and for that they are to be commended. The back yard of Mrs. Alice Jones was a lovely setting for the reception Sunday evening following Baccalaureate, honoring senior Jane Sawyer. Someone said that apollo ten was supposed to pass close to the moon shortly after 9 p.m. but—so far as we know—no one saw this event. Letter Mail Postage Due Raise Increase Effective July 1

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Sonora, Postmaster Trainer said today. Trainer said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winston M. Blount in Washington, D. C. that the record \$1.2 billion deficit compelled President Nixon to seek postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added public tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked

that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit which would otherwise be paid by taxpayers, the postmaster said.

For bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increases will reduce the 1970 postal deficit by more than \$600 million.

The postmaster listed these other details on the proposed increases:

First - class mail: Letters and post cards would be increased one cent, to 7 cents an ounce and 6 cents a piece, respectively, July 1. Airmail postage would remain at 10 cents.

Second - class mail: A handling charge of three-tenths of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1. This would yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 percent increase in addition to the 8 percent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970.

Third - class mail: For single

pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to a uniform rate of 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6 cents. The 1970 increase would lift revenues by \$46.8 million annually.

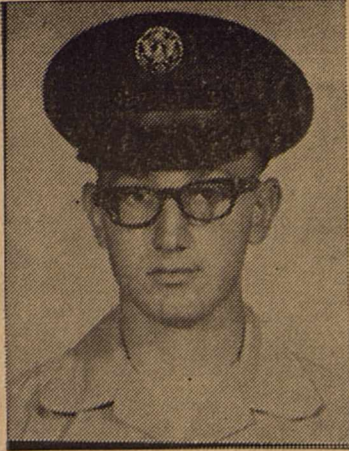

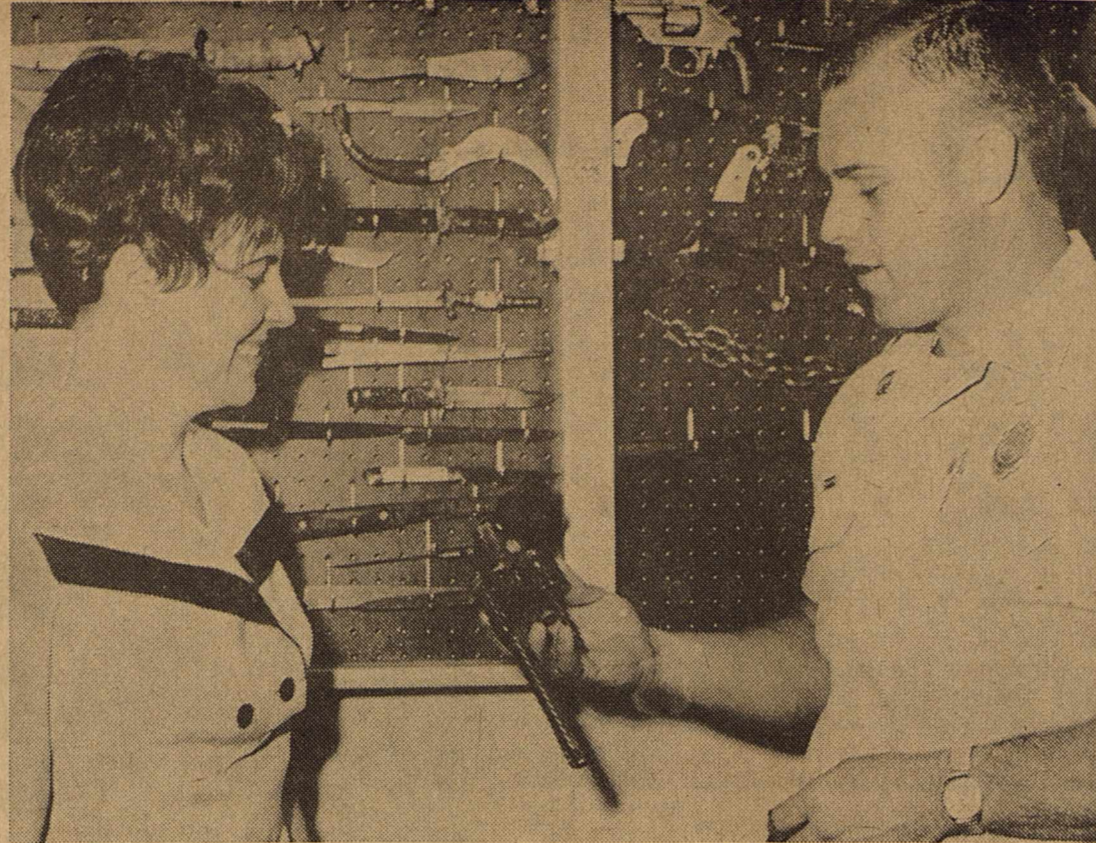

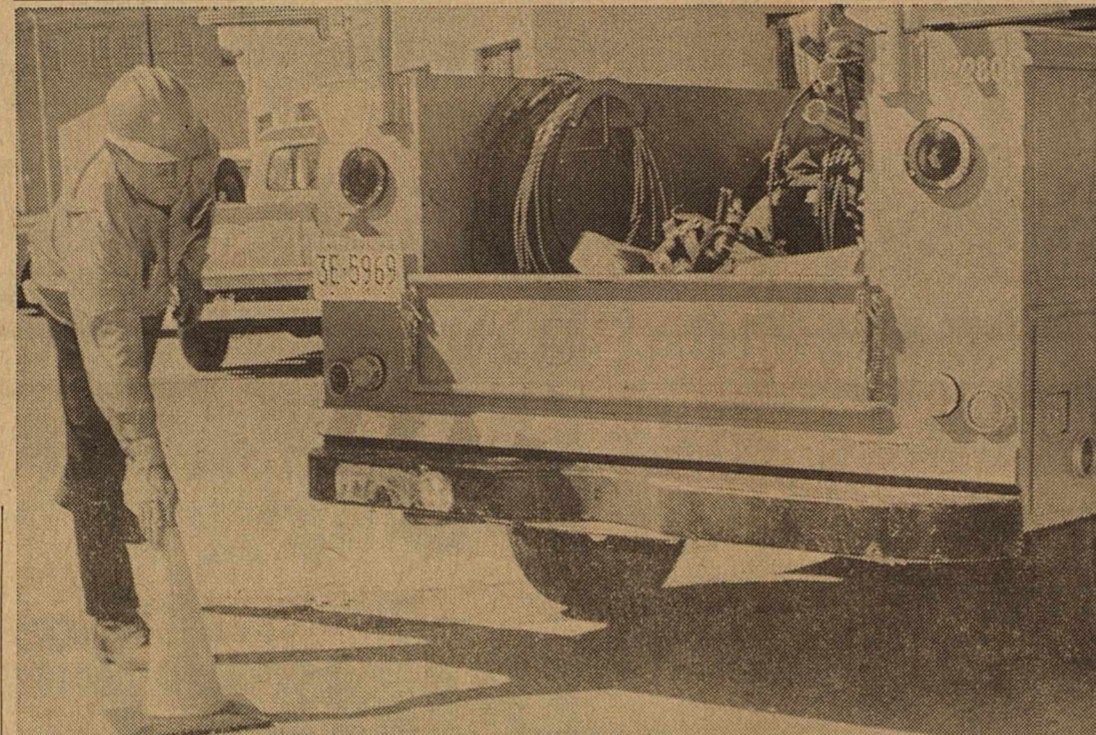

Moisture Conditions Now Favorable For Aerial Spraying of Mesquite

by E. B. Keng, S.C.S. Technician

Good moisture conditions during April and May have produced a bumper growth of mesquite leaves. Research has shown that good growing conditions are important in getting the best control treatment from aerial spraying with plant hormones.

Aerial spraying of mesquite with 2-4-5T has started in the Edwards Plateau soil and water conservation district, and will continue through June. The hormone spray, 2-4-5T is widely used in aerial spraying of mesquite.

When moisture conditions are good, as at the present time, 2-4-5T will usually kill over 95 percent of the top growth. The root kill, however, varies from about 5 to 30 percent in this area. The mesquite re-sprouts and in

5 to 7 years the area must be treated again.

The poor root kill from aerial spraying, plus the high cost of basal chemical treatment, dozing or root plowing, has led ranchmen to give financial assistance to increased research to find a better and cheaper method of killing mesquite and other brush. A statewide effort is being made to obtain donations of 1c per acre per year for a five year period to accelerate brush control research.

Sutton County ranchmen are showing substantial interest in the new research drive, according to W. B. McMillan, county brush control chairman. Some 74 ranchmen have already donated \$6,080 for the project which represents 1c per acre on 608,000 acres.

A 90 day deferment period following mesquite spraying is

strongly recommended. This rest enables the better grasses to take full advantage of the moisture released when the mesquite leaves are killed. If the grass is closely grazed the moisture will be primarily used by unpalatable weeds and grasses.

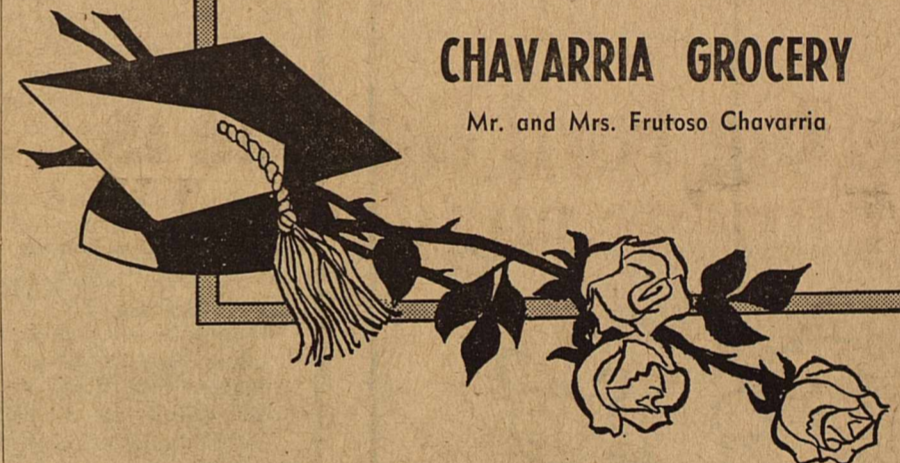

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding twelve dollars (\$12) per day during each regular and special session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment proposed by the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall receive the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership. "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive ministry of such church or religious society, and any other yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes stated or retained permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state; and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized hereunder and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state. (f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and c of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 12 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 6 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional amendment shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals retain or obtain self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy individual shall not exceed the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individual shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such matching services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat or care for any defect or abnormality in any manner not to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be used per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

Dimmit County recored a single screwworm case on Thursday near Carrizo Springs. Real County in the rough and rugged Hill Country, recorded its first case of the year on Wednesday. Kimble and Crockett Counties reported cases earlier this summer.

Mission Screwworm Eradication Program officials remind all livestock owners to continue to use preventive practices to reduce case outbreaks. Ideal

weather conditions exist for fertile fly propagation and more cases, they warn. This is also a good time to spray for sheep lice and ticks. Infestations of these parasites have been heavier than normal this year in Sutton County.

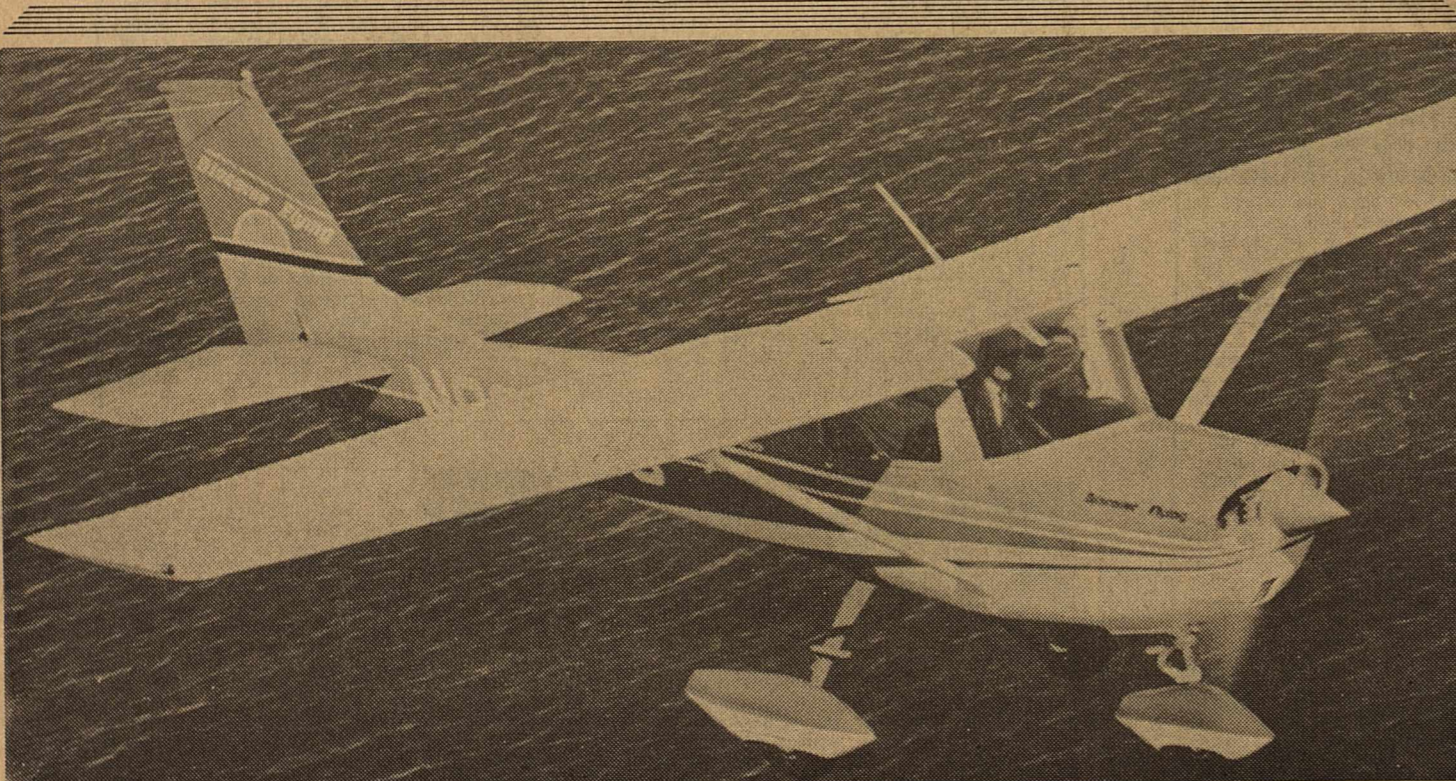

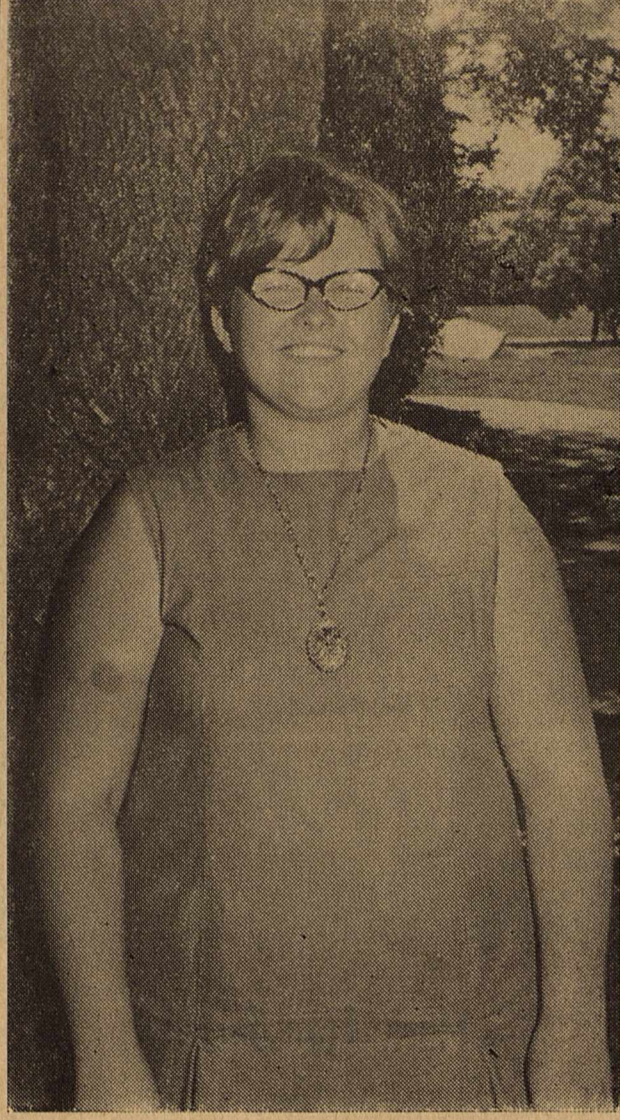
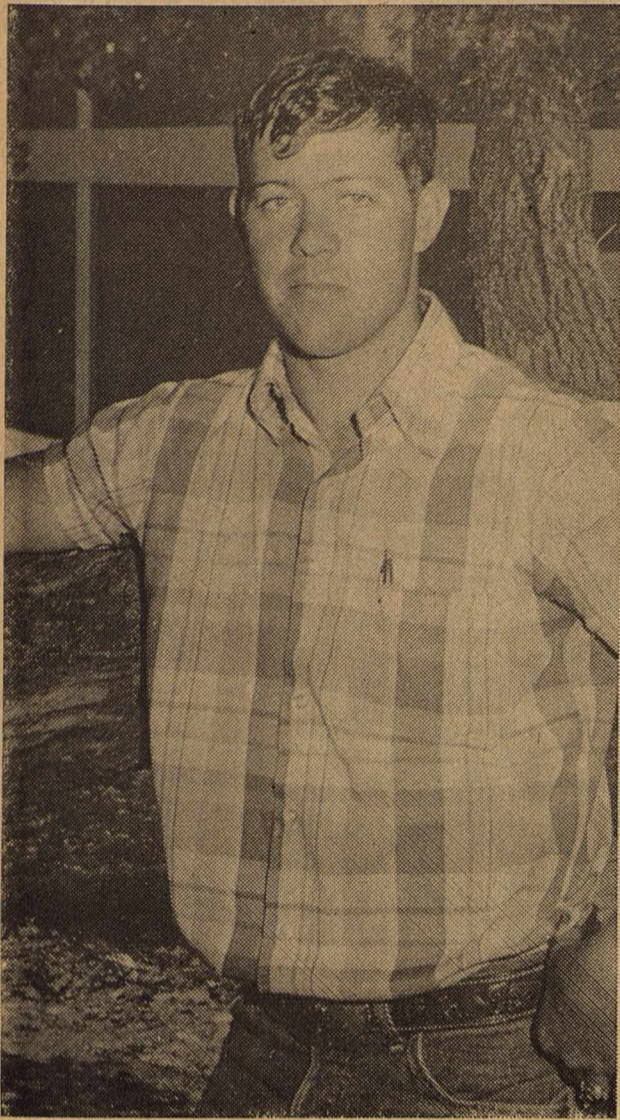

JERRY BRYANT is ward supervisor at Big Spring Mental Hospital. He says that writing research themes for Smith Neal is the reason.

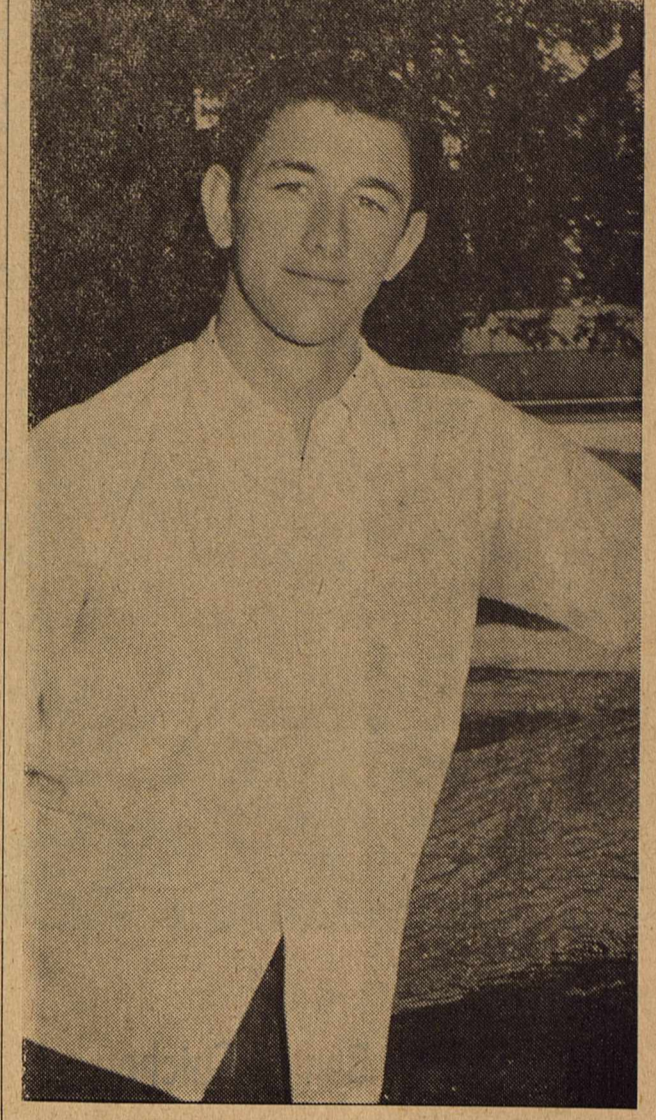
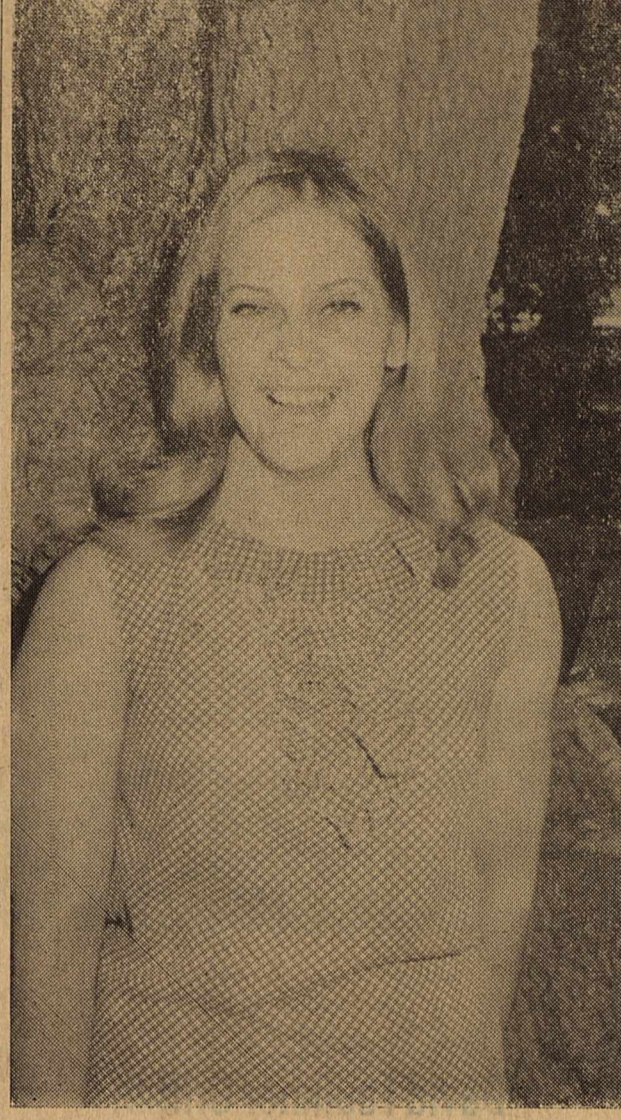
